EXPECT NEW RECORDS
IN OLYMPIC TRYOUTS

Cream of American Athletes to Be Skimmed for Team That Will Go to Paris

BOSTON, June 13.—The business of separating the cream from field resources began today and will end tomorrow, at the Harvard Stadium, with the holding of the final and ultimate tryouts for the American Olympic team. Only the finest athletes in the gift of American track and field sports will be eligible. Given favorable weather, records will be worth a dime a dozen, or slightly less.

Those in most serious danger are listed as follows, in the order of their vulnerability:
Sixteen-pound shot put, the discus throw, the running broad jump, the 400-metre hurdles, the high jump, the 800-metre run and the 100 and 200-metre dashes.

Joie Ray, Jimmy Connelly, Ray Baker and Lloyd Hahn, for instance, will go to the post in a heart-quicken rush through 1,500 metres, but none of them seem to have the speed necessary to get under Paavo Nurmi's record for the distance. Neither can America figure to produce distance runners capable of beating the 5,000 and 10,000 metre standards, nor a walker worthy of record time at the Olympic distance.

High Hurdlers are Inept
And, by the same token, none of our pole vaulters have shown capabilities that approach Holt's record; our high hurdlers seem to be usually inept when considered in comparison with Thomson Simpson, Kelly and others who have gone before; our 400-metre men appear to be neither Meredith nor Reidpaths; and the American javelin throwers, while improving, are yards off the best performances by the Finns.

That ends the sad part of the tale, however. At the Intercollegiate, two weeks ago, Glenn Hartranft and Ralph Hills finished a fraction of an inch apart in the shot put, with record-breaking tosses, and in the early season Hartranft was just a half inch shy of Ralph Rose's world record. He has beaten it in practice and may do so officially today or tomorrow. Hartranft already has the world's record for the

discuss to his credit.

In the running broad jump Hubbard, Comins and Rose have beaten twenty-four feet consistently throughout the season, with the first two ranging well up around twenty-five feet. Another inch or so, and the old record will be no more.

Test in Low Hurdles

Another mark in chancery is the fifty-four seconds of Frank Loomis for the 400-metre hurdles. Ivan Riley already has beaten it a second or more, and tomorrow he must run around no less than Brookins, of Iowa, greatest low hurdler the sport has known, in order to win. The distance is new to Brookins, but he is deemed not only to have the speed but the strength to go on beyond his normal stretch of 220 yards.

Ray Watson, having come back like a bad check, is reckoned to run close to Meredith's record to 500 metres, particularly since he will be chased into the tape by such as Helfrich, Enck, Watters, Marsters and other hasty gents. Watson beat 1:53 less than two weeks ago.

Paddock, Murchison, Hill, Bowman and other stars, will match shanks in the sprints, with the chances favoring a new record at 200 metres. Paddock holds the present mark at 21 1-5, but since the distance is two yards short of 220 yards, it would seem as though the field might be capable of better things than that. The 100-metre mark is about as low as human legs can make it, however.

McNARY IS 51,854

AHEAD OF BAKER

SALEM, June 17.—C. L. McNary, for United States senator, won over George L. Baker of Portland by a plurality of 51,854 votes, according to the official canvass of the ballots cast at the republican primary election held in Oregon May 16. K. K. Kubli, also a candidate for United States senator, received 11,453 votes, while H. H. Stallard polled 3,982 votes.

M. C. George, with 92,130 votes, polled the highest vote for republican presidential elector. Other successful candidates for this honor received the following votes: A. W. Gowan, 88,224; J. O. Stearns, 87,589; Harriet Lane Richards, 78,496 and Daniel Boyd, 74,126.

W. C. Hawley, republican, for representative in congress from the first congressional district, received a total of 37,540 votes, against 14,408 votes received by Peter Zimmerman of Yamhill county.

JAP DENIES PREPARATION FOR CONFLICT

Story of London Daily Times Is Declared False

ISLANDS NOT WANTED

Asserts His Nation Supports League of Nations; Glad Singapore Abandoned

TOKIO, (by mail).—Statements that Japan is preparing for war by 1930, that her membership in the League of Nations is a sham, and that her real idea is expressed by her militarists who aim at complete mastery of the Asiatic side of the Pacific Ocean—all of them published in the London Times from the pen of Mr. Geoffrey Drage, a British student of military affairs—were refuted by Lieutenant-General H. Ugaki, Japanese Minister of War, in an exclusive interview granted the International News Service. The statements of Mr. Drage aroused considerable comment in Tokyo, and brought caustic criticism from high officials in the Ministry.

"We are hardly prepared for

this slander at a time when our nation is still staggering under the blow of the September earthquake," said General Ugaki after he had read the Drage charges. "Even if we had not suffered under the blow of last year, and were prepared to go about getting ready for another war, we should not have given the credit of maintaining the same honor of other nations signatory to the Washington Arms Treaty. Instead of developing our military strength with the same energy Japan employed in preparing for war with Russia," as the writer claims, we have reduced our army personnel most materially, dismissing 2,200 officers and 56,000 enlisted men. "I am willing to pledge my word of honor that Japan is not preparing for any war; nor is she looking to any particular chance for an aggressive action against any country of the world at any foreseeable future date."

The Minister's interview was among the first in which he has discussed the Washington Conference treaties, Japan's fulfillment of these measures, or his attitude toward the Philippines as a possible menace to Japan—all of them holding a particular interest to Americans. While he dwelt extensively on the charges emanating from the European capital, and while he took up the Singapore naval base plans by Great Britain, plans which, he stated, were "well left unfulfilled," General Ugaki did not fail to take up the attitude of other powers and express his wonder as to whether or not America, for one, was "thinking along the same lines which the London Times permitted to appear in its columns."

Denies Japan Wants Philippines

"I can see no eventuality which would lead Japan to wish for conquest or annexation by peaceful means, of the Philippines," said the Minister of War. "We Japanese have come to regard the Philippines bugaboo as a worn-out cry of professional alarmists. We were glad when we knew that the Labor Cabinet of Mr. Ramsay MacDonald, in London, had decided against the Singapore naval base scheme, but this had nothing to do with the American islands in the Pacific, despite the various claims to the contrary even in Japan."

"The London writer even pulls the Twenty-one Demands out of the grave, but to do this at a time when the world is inhaling the fresh air created by the Washington Conference is merely a matter of resurrecting the name of Japan. Japan wants

peace. For Japan knows as well as any nation could know that only through continued peace can we recover from the economic losses of the recent disaster and attain a status of prosperity."

"That a newspaper of the character of the London Times should print and comment not unfavorably on such opinions as those expressed by the English writer is mystifying to us, when there are evidences in plenty before the world that Japan could not even think of a war for the next fifty years."

Says Japan Backs League

"And then on what grounds, except because of his own morbid imagination, could the writer claim that Japan has no sympathy with the League of Nations? Japan is seriously at work doing as much as any other nation to make the League of Nations an efficient organ to insure the peace of the world."

"Japan still takes the League seriously and is ready and anxious to dispel any doubt that may exist that this organ, founded at Versailles, was always doomed to failure."

The present Minister of War rose to his position in the Kiyoura Ministry after serving as Military Attache in Petrograd before the Great War, studying in Germany after the dethronement of the Hohenzollerns, and serving under General Tanaka in the last, or Yamamoto Cabinet, as Vice-Minister of War. While his position is more or less untenable at present due to the great possibility of the passing of the Cabinet of Kiyoura, after the May elections in Japan, he will, as a leading member of the military, or Chosin, clique, continue to have a great influence on the external activities of Japan in the future.
