WALLA WALLA SCORES IN GRAIN RATE CASE

WALLA WALLA, June 17.—Attorneys for the Port of Portland, Oregon Public Service Commission and Portland Chamber of Commerce failed to materially shake the testimony of H. Morrison, a Walla Walla grain dealer, that competition in the territory south of Snake river had ceased since the 10 per cent freight differential went into effect in favor of Portland.

Morrison, at the second session of the Columbia basin rate case today, offered compilations to show the large flow of grain to Portland, due to the low rate, caused a congested condition in Portland in transporting grain. Portland attorneys attempted to show that whatever delay caused in Portland was due to the introduction of new federal standards requiring the smutting of all wheat before loading for export.

PAST CARS ENTERED FOR THE AUTO RACES

The latest advice regarding entries of the race meet next Thursday and Friday are that Carl Meer of Eugene will enter what he considers one of the fastest race cars in Oregon. It looks now as if Klamath Falls will make an entry of a second car and that there will be two cars entered from Silverton, Ore.

Officials are now going over the rules carefully to ascertain the number of cars that will be permitted to race on the speedway at the same time. Should there be more entries than will be allowed on the track then the spectators will get double their money's worth as there will be double the number of races.

The condition of the track is good and those in charge are working toward having it in perfect shape. Drivers are enthusiastic for what they believe weather conditions will be and it looks now as if the biggest race event ever conducted in Oregon will be held here this week.

UMATILLA COURT SETS SCALE OF WAGES

FREEWATER, Or., June 16.—According to Commissioner Bean of this city, the county court at a recent meeting set a standard of wages to be paid by Umatilla county for the remainder of the year as follows: For a man and team \$5 a day, day laborers \$3 a day, teams \$2 a day.

This action was deemed necessary, due to the fact that conditions at the present time do not warrant higher compensation for labor and that there are many unemployed men in this vicinity at this time.

With crop conditions unfavorable and stringent times apparent, the need for economy is more to be considered now than in years," said Mr. Bean, "and it was considered expedient that Umatilla county should take action in order to stabilize labor compensation, which would not only effect the taxpayers directly but all who have occasion to employ labor this season.

BEWARE OF CIVIL SERVICE SCHOOLS

civil service. Appointment can be secured only through open competitive examination under the civil-service rules. No school can cause a competitor to be certified for appointment out of the regular order, as determined by his examination rating.

The Civil Service Commission states that large numbers of applicants for examination received at its office indicates that many civil-service schools accept as clients and take money from practically illiterate persons who could not possibly pass any kind of examination.

E. I. McKinley, deputy labor,

commissioner of Arkansas, it is said in the joint warning, recently has investigated correspondence schools of this class and authorizes the statement that he has concluded that the majority of them come as near being "fakes" as the postal laws permit. The "schools" that Mr. McKinley condemns are the ones that offer to qualify persons for civil-service positions or make a professional man of a laborer in a few weeks. Mr. McKinley says that schools which prepare for civil-service examinations rank second to "detective schools" in number.
