ASSERTS WOMEN FAIL TO WIELD POWER OF VOTE

Rotarian Head Says Unfair Ways in Competition Is Source of World Strife

MOLINE, Ill., June 17.—"Woman has thus far failed politically. She has failed to realize her vote; she has failed to realize her potential strength; she has failed to realize on her opportunities."

"A body of thinking women over two million strong, as represented in the general federation of women's clubs, has yet found no means by which to wield women politically. No issue has found woman ready to lend her interest and her co-operation to it."

These, in part, are the charges flung at the American clubwoman and the feminine voters throughout the nation by Mrs. George T. Palmer, of Springfield, Ill., president of the Illinois Federation of Women's Clubs and a nationally known figure in club circles. Mrs. Palmer, strong in condemning those of her sex who are afraid to go to the polls to give the world the feminine vote of political graft, bargaining of votes and other governmental corruption, scored the indifference of the woman voter in all political problems. Women, she declared, control immeasurable power in deciding what kind of a government our nation shall have following the next convention.

Novelty Has Worn Off
"The toy part of the vote is gone," said Mrs. Palmer. "But until women learn to desert their bridge games and their Mah Jongg tables they might as well never have received it."

"Woman can, if she will, determine the kind of a government we have. She can, by the force of her concerted effort, compel each of the major parties to select men for public office who are above reproach."

"Four years ago I thought it best that women gradually become incorporated within each of the parties. Now, it appears, she would have done better if she had formed a bloc. Women are unwilling to assume responsibilities with their privileges, it appears."

"Too much trouble, is their excuse. At the last election only one woman in four cast her ballot."

"Of course, woman is inclined to be, in a measure, non-partisan. She votes for the man. The parties cannot compute their political strength as they have in the past, for the woman vote is

an unknown quantity."

Says Women Stand Pat
Mrs. Palmer believes the American woman is inclined to stand by and do nothing.

"There occurs to me on one issue that perhaps might unite them," Mrs. Palmer continued, "and that is law enforcement. But even that is a thing with crumbling edges. Enforcement of the law means but one thing to me, and that is enforcement of the Volstead act. Some women oppose it; some of the women's husbands oppose it."

"What woman's political future will be is difficult to say. In the coming Presidential campaign she will not be a factor, for the machinery is man-made, party machinery. But if woman performs her duties of citizenship, discharges her responsibilities, she may claim some of the honor."

BETTER BUSINESS ETHICS PROPOSED TO LESSEN WARS

Illinois Club-Woman Leader Finds Her Sex Do Not Realize Political Strength

TORONTO, Can. June 17.—"Until men meet on the common ground of correct business methods there can be no world fellowship of business men," Guy Gunkler, of Philadelphia, president of Rotary International, told delegates attending the international meetings of Rotarians here today.

"Ethical conduct of business, emphasized and spread throughout the world, will greatly diminish the inclination and disposition on the part of the peoples of the different nations to fight one another. Unscrupulous business methods have been a potent cause of many international misunderstandings, and war has frequently sprung from unethical business manipulations and desire for monopolistic control."

"When the Rotary campaign for ethical business conduct spreads and is accepted and is of world-wide recognition and enforcement, one of the greatest and most serious hidden underlying causes of jealousy and war will have been permanently removed."

"For Better Code of Ethics"
"The major Rotary activity for the immediate future will be an increasing and increasing activity for better business methods and their standardization in codes of ethics. In countries where crafts are organized, with great national associations, the greatest opportunity for achievement will be found in Rotary's campaign for written codes of correct standards of business practice."

"Rotary has set its hand to the plow for correct business methods. Our goal is a code for every business and profession."

"In my opinion, Rotary's most lasting contribution to the world will be found in the realm of business—in the making of a happier, more contented, more kindly, more co-operative and more honorable business world. With an honorable business world, happiness, contentment, kindness and co-operation must and will prevail."

"With correct business methods worldwide, the business men of all nations, meeting on this common ground, will establish great international friendships and good-will—friendships which will harbor everlasting peace. "Compete on Equality"
"One of the ultimate objects of written codes is to standardize conduct so that all fellow-craftsmen in any line of business can compete with one another on an equality of opportunity. Where men compete on different business standards there is no equality of opportunity."

"To illustrate this unfairness, the business man who provides his workmen with right wages, reasonable hours of service, sanitary workrooms and conveniences, etc., and who maintains high ethical standards in all of his business relations has a much higher overhead and cost of production than those who are delinquent in such business virtues. Again, when he seeks to make sales on the right basis of qualities of products, delivery and efficient service, he is oftentimes in competition with those who base sales on unethical allowances, rebates, or commercial bribery. VETERANS NEED NOT WRITE TO WASHINGTON

Adjutant General Issues Information on War Compensation Procedure

The following statement has been issued by the adjutant general's office in Washington, D. C., for the information of veterans of the world war concerning adjusted compensation:

"It is not necessary to write to the war department, the navy department, or the United States Veterans' Bureau for blank forms of application for adjusted compensation, or for any information concerning it. Full information with regard thereto will be published in the public press and detailed information will be contained in these circulars that will accompany each application.

Blank Distribution
"When the blank forms of application and the circulars shall have been printed, they will be immediately distributed throughout the country to the post offices to the posts of the American Legion and other veteran organizations, to the American Red Cross chapters, and to the army and navy posts and stations, for immediate delivery to all persons who desire to apply for the adjusted compensation."

"It is expected that copies of application and circulars of instructions will be available for distribution on or before June 30, 1924."

"Cash payment of the adjusted compensation to those entitled to \$50 or less will not be made prior to March 1, 1925. The adjusted service certificates will bear date January 1, 1925, or later, but, under the law no loan can be made on the adjusted service certificates until two years after the

date of such certificates.

To Handle Claims Promptly

"The war department, navy department, and the United States Veterans' Bureau have made extensive preparations to handle promptly all claims for the adjusted compensation. This great work will require the undivided attention of every employee, and it will be impossible to answer individual inquiries concerning the matter. Such inquiries would not only be useless, but to answer them would delay action on the claims. Claimants will aid materially if they will fill up the blank forms of application to the best of their ability in accordance with their own knowledge or recollection of the facts, and refrain from writing to the war department, navy department, or the United States Veterans' Bureau concerning adjusted compensation."
