The loss was \$12,000 with \$6,000 insurance. The home was a two-story house of ten rooms. The Jones family, who resided in Hamilton City, had but lately come up for the Summer.

A brush fire starting from the house, which swept down the bluff to the river, jumped the stream and went up the opposite ridge, was fought by a crew of Southern Pacific workmen.

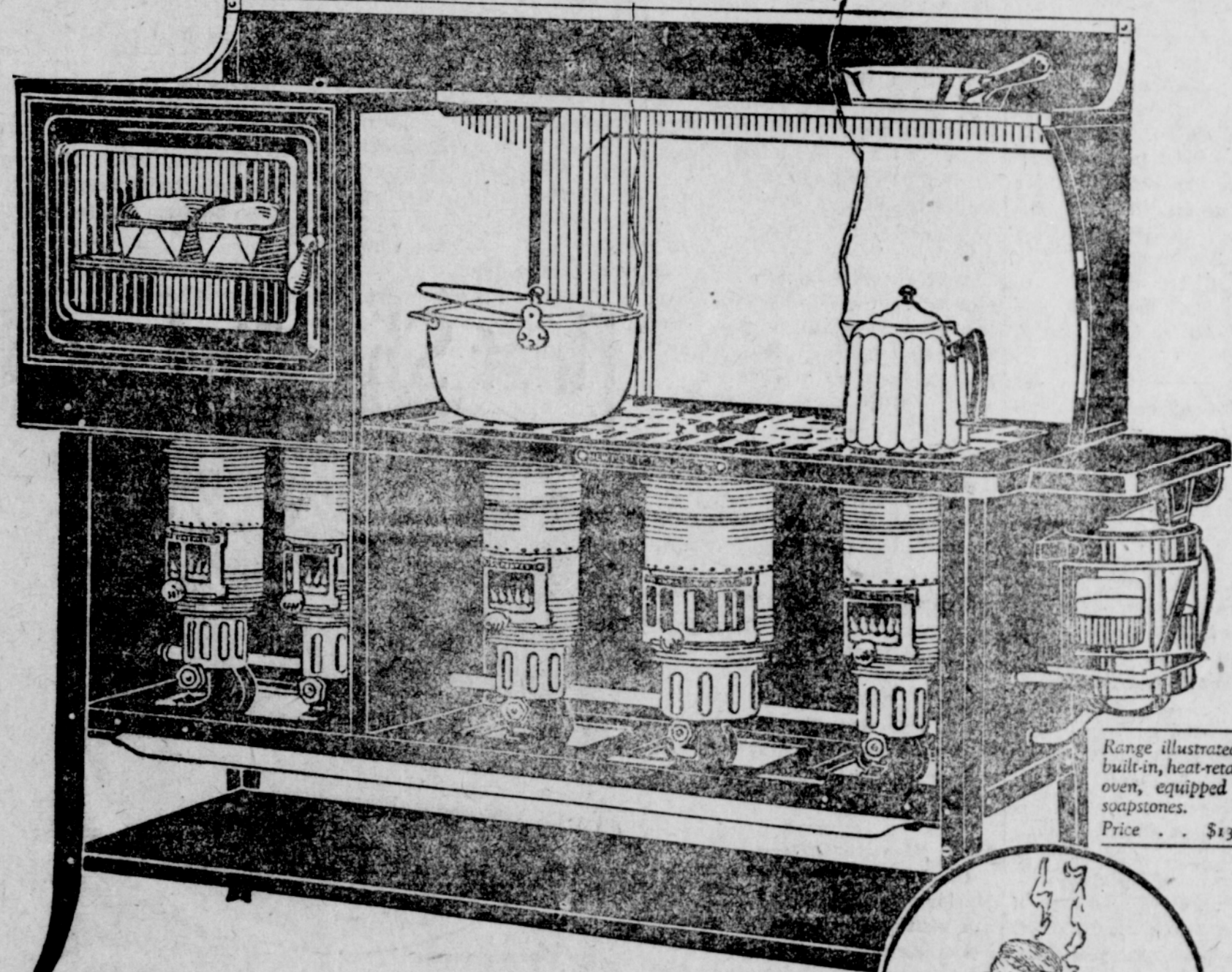

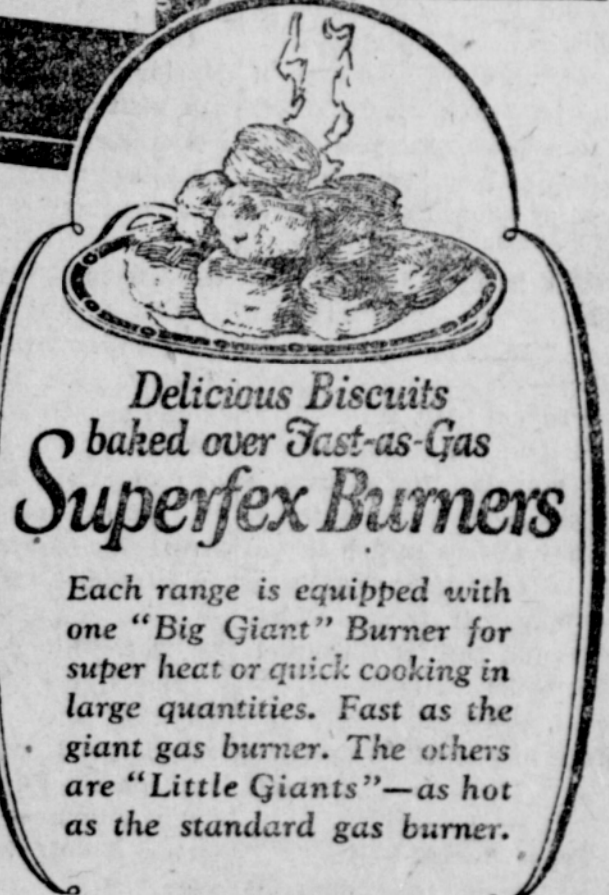
