HOW FANTASTIC SUMS ARE BUILT FROM SMALL SAVINGS

THE story often has been recounted of the fabulous increases in values that have come since Peter Minuet, on May 6, 1626, purchased Manhattan Island from the Indians for trinkets valued at \$24. If the same amount of money had been set aside at that time and had been kept intact, with its accumulations of interest compounded at six per cent semi-annually, it would now be approximately one billion dollars.

The present wealth of the United States is given as \$320,000,000,000. Yet all of this incomprehensible sum could have grown during the same 300 years from the comparatively insignificant amount of \$6,500 with interest compounded semi-annually at six per cent.

In a certain New England city there recently was received for deposit at a savings bank a check for \$70, with the stipulation that it was to be left untouched until the year 2224, when, at the bank's current interest rates, it will have amounted to \$14,000,000.

It is interesting to know that, if the rates were six per cent, the heirs would have turned over to them, in the year 2224, \$3,500,000,000, with a few odd hundred thousand dollars left over.

If an individual were today to set aside for his heirs or for some philanthropic purpose the sum of \$1,000, to remain untouched for one hundred years, with interest at 6 per cent compounded semi-annually, the amount on hand at the end of the century would be \$369,360.

Perhaps it is well to have these interesting facts brought to mind in order to disprove the statements so often made that colossal accumulations are possible only as the result of some good stroke of fortune.

What has been related as to the possibilities of savings and compound interest can, in the same manner, be applied to the more modest practices, because the principles involved are the same. Small savings are as prolific as large ones.

SCIENTISTS FIND MICE THAT SWIM WITH EASE

NEW CASTLE, Pa., June 20.—Aquatic mice, capable of diving and swimming like porpoise, or running across the fields like other rodents, were discovered in the Pymatuning Swamp, Crawford County, by a group of thirty-five Pittsburgh scientists who visited the swamp recently.

These mice show no resemblance to the usual aquatic animal, according to George Sutton, bird man with the Carnegie Museum, as they do not have the webbed feet generally found. They appear to belong to the red-back mouse family, but there is no record of such a member of this family since this mouse dives, swims under water and comes to the surface and breathes with the tip of his nose above water.

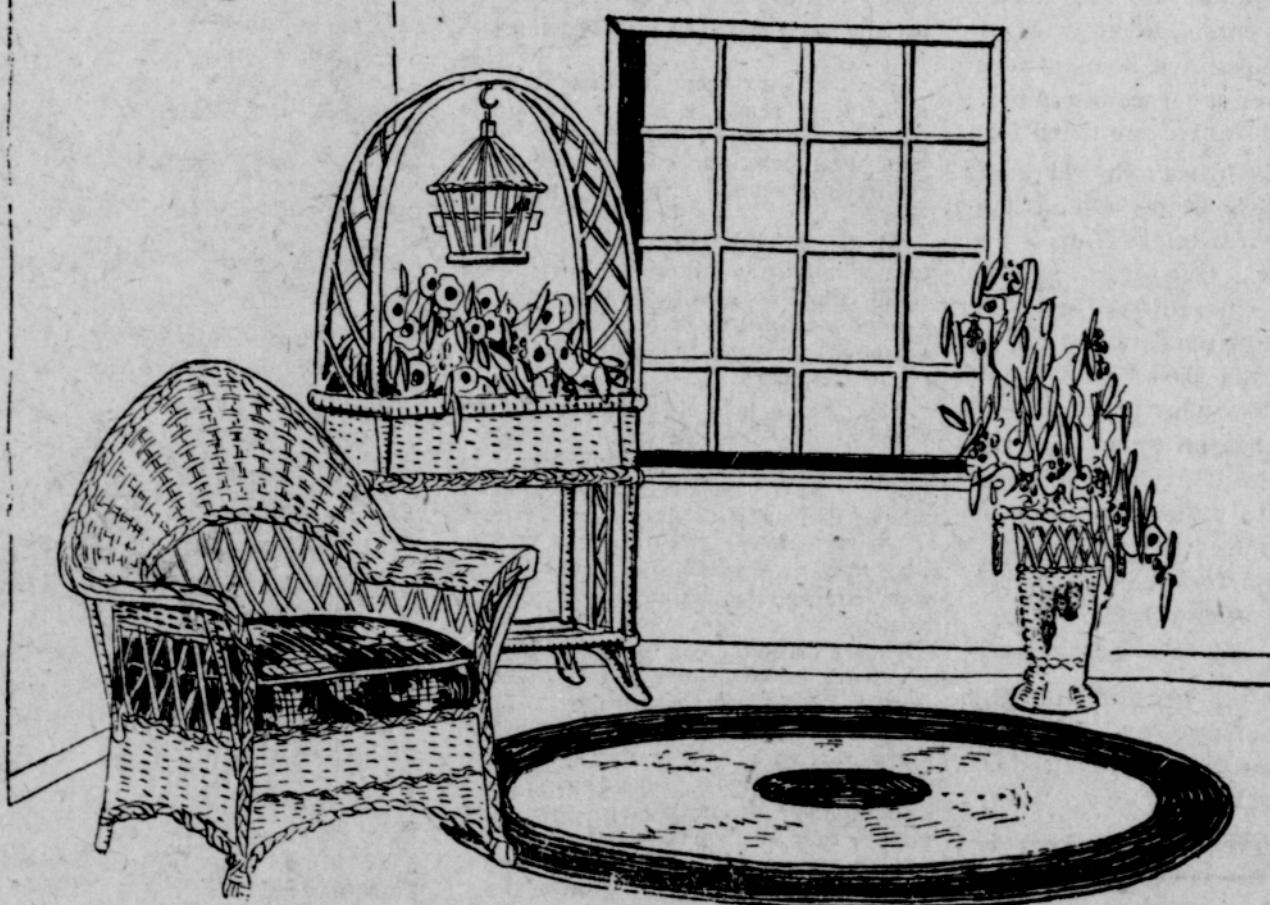
CONFIDENCE VOTED IN

YREKA, June 20.—More than 30 head of cattle have been killed by poison placed along the Southern Pacific right-of-way in Siskiyou county under the company's orders to destroy weeds. Johnson to take some action to remedy the situation, and notifying head offices of the Southern Pacific of the condition, were adopted by unanimous vote.

SUGGESTS METHOD
FOR TAX REDUCTION

State Board of Health Bulletin Says \$4,000,000 Can Be Saved Annually

The following appears in a recent bulletin of the Oregon State Board of Health:

The investment of adequate appropriations for effective disease prevention in the state will save at least one-tenth of the cost of disease and dependency. This would mean a saving of at least \$4,000,000 annually. Where can you find a better investment?

All Public Health effort must be paid by taxation. Taxation is a compulsory contribution levied upon persons, property, and business for the support of the government. The seven rules of taxation are equality, certainty, convenience, economy, productivity, elasticity, and stability.

A tax for disease prevention is equally beneficial, it helps every individual in the community. It is elastic because the more the health of the citizens, making them able to contribute their portion to the support of the government.

It is convenient because there is a diminished chance of accruing losses on account of disease.

It is economical because it is much cheaper to prevent disease than to have it.

It is productive because it enables more people to pay taxes.

It is elastic because the more money spent for health taxation the more healthy citizens there will be to pay the tax.

It is stable because it guarantees the health and income of the wage earners.

It is true that public expenditures are increasing more rapidly than the population. But expenditures that directly benefit the people are really investments and not expenses.

Sickness causes a tremendous expense, which can be prevented to a certain extent. It is crazy extravagance to propagate criminals, the insane, epileptics, paupers, and delinquents as we are now doing. Hygiene can cut the numbers of these classes. It is our high intelligence which keeps us from employing hygiene?

Disease is an enemy, and although it may be largely prevented, we do not strive for the ounce of prevention which is greater than the pound of cure.

If you wish to increase the taxes neglect the public health. Lower taxes by preventing disease. Conserve the public health and conservation of natural resources will follow. Raise the

health of the wage earner and he will do the rest.

Every citizen owes it to himself and to his community to take an interest in the health of the place in which he lives.
