MONEY TALKS

THE DISAPPEARING CENT

Is your family one of those in which, after the first baby came, every stray penny was to go into the baby's bank? If so, you will agree with the treasury department in wondering what becomes of all the pennies. Every year some 80,000,000 of them are coined, and while a certain number keep in circulation and others return to the treasury in one form or another, most of them disappear.

It is wrong to speak of pennies in this country's coinage, treasury officials have always insisted, as the penny is a British coin, normally of twice the value of one of our cents. But the cent has ever been a penny to most people, and it is hard to educate them to say cent.

The cent is the barometer of business. It is interesting to note that during financial depression a large number accumulates in the treasury. Even a big storm or a strike will cut down the number of cents in circulation, for

RECORDS REVEAL UNHAPPY FATE OF THE DRIFTERS

ARE you a drifter?

Would unexpected unemployment or adversity find you among the dependents?

When you reach old age will you be independent or will your relatives, friends, or the public have to take care of you?

Studies made in various parts of the country at different periods during the past 50 years show that from 30 to 90 per cent of our people leave no estates at the time of their death, and only a comparatively small additional number leave accumulations of any appreciable amount.

An examination of court records in a large Eastern city showed that 89 per cent of the adults who died during the period under investigation left no estates at all; that more than 92 per cent left less than \$1,000, and that more than 93 per cent left less than \$10,000. Another investigation revealed that 8 per cent of all persons 65 years of age were independent or self-sustaining.

Every careful inquiry of the kind has revealed that a large percentage of our people are wholly or almost entirely dependent on current wages or salaries for their livelihood, and that unexpected unemployment would render their conditions deplorable.

Cold figures are of value only when we study their significance. The brief array of statistics here employed is quickly suggestive of thousands of human interest stories of men and women who have frittered away their earnings during the golden years of youth and middle age, and, utterly without realization, have drifted into the shadows of dependent old age.

If you would save yourself this unwelcome fate, don't be a drifter.

EX-SHERIFF ANDERSON

GIVES TANLAC CREDIT

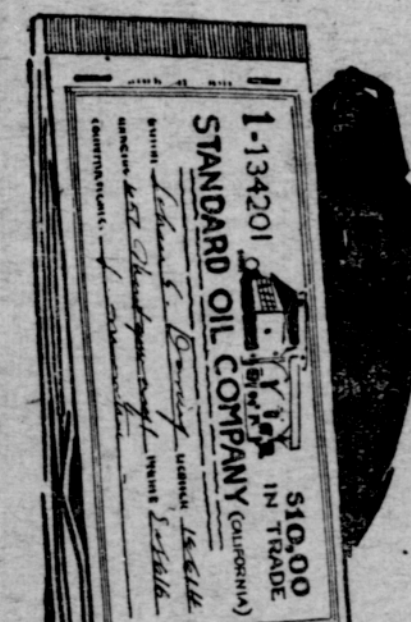

SINKING WELLS TO
AID WATER SUPPLY

Astoria—Paper mill assembling 300-ton logging machine.

HAINES, June 24.—The water shortage in the Powder river valley this year has resulted in the installation of many pumping plants by ranchers who heretofore have depended upon irrigation water from natural sources. Head lettuce and other crops usually grown on small tracts make the pumping of water for irrigation feasible.

From five to ten acres of lettuce, onions or celery can be irrigated from wells sunk at small expense and several growers in the Haines community who expected to continue the production of the smaller crops were putting in pumping plants and water systems.

Vernonia—Complete sewer system and water filtering plant in course of construction at combined cost of approximately \$60,000.
