EXHIBITS LAVA BEAR TO PORTLAND THRONGS

Picturesque Lake County Resident Says Its Only One in Captivity

PORTLAND, Ore., June 25.—Did you ever see a "lava bear"? Portland residents hadn't until Tuesday, when picturesque Alfred Andrews, the man from Lake county that wears the buckaroo hat came to town and exhibited his "prize" in the back of his flivver.

"The only one of his kind in captivity—That's what he is," Andrews cheerfully confided to groups of curious and dubious who assembled about the animal.

The boys who assembled questioned about the nose which looks "like a wolf's nose." The tall ears and long legs of the animal also made some dubious.

Andrews explained that several years ago a sheepherder in the lava regions found a short, low, long-nosed bear. The creature puzzled him. He looked like a bear and yet he didn't. The carcass was classified as a species never before encountered.

Irvin S. Cobb, magazine writer, hunted lava bears in Lake county two years ago with Andrews as a guide. Cobb saw only the tracks and gave up the quest in two weeks.

Andrews said he might take his "prize" traveling in the circus ring some day.

UNLAWFUL TO ANCHOR WHALES AT MARSHFIELD

MARSHFIELD, Or., June 23.—John C. Kendall, judge of the Coos county circuit court, this afternoon granted an injunction forbidding whaling operators from mooring carcasses of whales at the Empire docks when they have reached the condition of giving off obnoxious odors.

The case was brought before the court in chambers and the plaintiffs set out many allegations. Some of the minor ones were that crabs, held in traps in the bay, were covered with oil substances, so that they were not fit for consumption; that children in the waters of the bay came out with the bathing suits ruined by the effluvia which was thrown off from the whales.

The final hearing in the case will be heard at the next term of the circuit court.

EARNINGS DECLINING SAYS SOUTHERN PACIFIC

SAN FRANCISCO, June 25.—The net railway operating income of the Southern Pacific company for the five months ending May 31 showed a decrease of \$2,950,809 from the figures for the same period last year, the company announced today. The total figure for this year's period was \$13,407,675.

A decrease of \$1,172,007 was also noted for the month of May from the May figures of 1923. Last May the net income was \$2,976,449.

The net revenue from railroad operations for the five-month period this year was \$22,381,018, a decrease of \$3,083,954 from last year's figures.

The net revenue for May was \$4,852,695, a decrease of \$1,205,584. The net income is derived by subtracting certain fixed and other charges from the net revenue.

CHERRY MEN ACT TO KEEP OUT FRUIT WORM

SALEM, June 25.—A quarantine on all black cherries, covering Marion and Polk counties, prohibiting the exportation of

such cherries from the state without rigid inspection and a certificate that the trees from which they come have been sprayed against the fruit worm, probably will be asked of the state department of horticulture before the next picking season, according to prominent cherry men of this district who are deeply concerned over the failure of many growers to protect the local crop this year.

Failure to spray against the cherry worm that is ravaging many orchards here has damaged the entire district by the sale of inferior fruit, these men declare.

HUNTERS SEEK HUGE SNAKE NEAR BEND

BEND, June 23.—A force of hunters were scouring the country near Prineville in search of a huge snake reported seen two miles west of the town. Hogan Hansen, rancher, who first saw the reptile, said it was 25 feet long, and had a head as large

as a ten-pound lard bucket. When he saw it, the reptile was in the act of swallowing a jackrabbit. The snake, believed of the boa constrictor family, was thought to be one of a number turned loose from Redmond last fall. A side show which had exhibited these disbanded for lack of funds and the snakes were held for a time then released.

NEW YORK, June 25.—One of the first sights that greeted the delegates to the Democratic national convention was a golden-beamed electric star atop a tall staff in Madison Square, present-

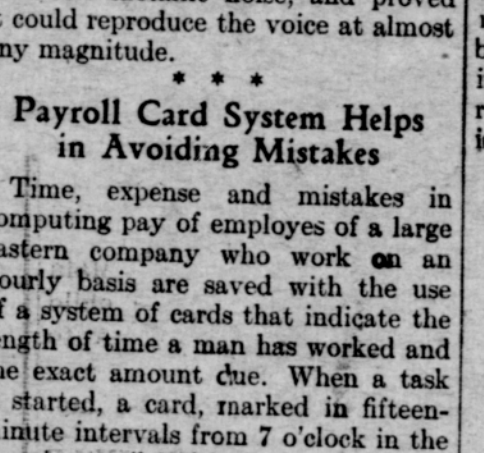

Facilitating Handling of Rowboats

Ordinarily it requires the efforts of two men to launch a rowboat, but one man can easily do the work if the rowboat is provided with a small bronze roller as shown in the drawing. The detail shows how such a roller is attached; a wooden skeg keel is fastened to the main keel at the



stern by means of iron plates and lag-screws, and a recess is cut in the skeg to accommodate the roller, which is held in place by means of two bronze side plates. The roller must, of course, turn freely between these plates. A steel or iron roller should not be used, as it soon rusts and then becomes useless. The roller should be kept well greased in order to obtain the best results.

Two-Element Tube Needs No B-Batteries
Makers of reflex-circuit sets will be interested in a tube that has recently made its appearance. The tube has but two elements, hence its name—the "diode." It is said to combine the clear reproductions of the crystal with the sturdiness and reliability of the tube, and to operate on less than 1 amp. from a single dry cell. No B-batteries are required. It is adapted for use in all reflex circuits, and requires no adjustments for changes in wave length.

Payroll Card System Helps in Avoiding Mistakes
Time, expense and mistakes in computing pay of employees of a large eastern company who work on an hourly basis are saved with the use of a system of cards that indicate the length of time a man has worked and the exact amount due. When a task is started, a card, marked in fifteen-minute intervals from 7 o'clock in the morning until 6 o'clock in the evening, is punched to show the beginning hour. Another perforation is made on quitting. This card is placed upon a master card which shows the labor prices in progression from fifteen minutes up to and including eleven hours through the perforations. For the various kinds of work, seventy master

cards are used in the factory. They are kept in a handy index so that they may be found immediately. The accompanying illustration shows a sample payroll card marked with forty-two hour divisions for the timekeeper's punch.

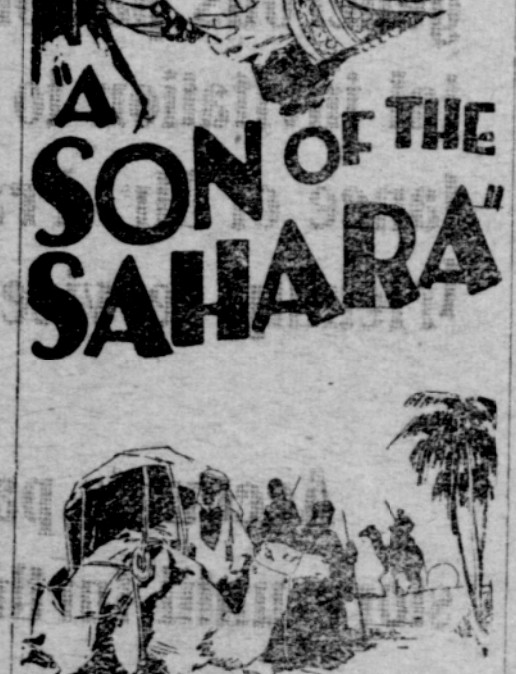
