MAN KILLS SELF HERE
TO SEE OTHER WORLD

SACRAMENTO, June 25—Henry Fuss, 52 years old, a laborer, was found dead yesterday in a room at 816 1-2 J Street. It is believed he ended his life by poisoning.

He left a note saying he was sorry he had done it, but "wanted to see the other world."

His citizenship papers, issued in this county in 1920, were found with a note asking that they be returned to County Clerk Harry W. Hall.

"If he asks where I am, tell him I went to Europe, where I can get some good beer and whiskey," the note said.

Coroner John T. Skelton took charge of the body, and an autopsy to determine the cause of death will be performed.

more chapters and more prestige than at any other time in its history.

"Regain Fighting Spirit"

Last fall at Washington Commander McFarland created a sensation when he appeared before the Senate Committee investigating the Veterans' Bureau and declared the disabled men were disgraced at the alleged subordination of themselves for stories of sensational scandals. Today he repeated his criticism, but urged a continuance of the cooperation of the Disabled American Veterans with the Government agency "without losing the fighting spirit that demands the respect of those with whom you deal and without becoming a mere auxiliary of the Veterans' Bureau."

He was most bitter in his criticism of ultra pacifists.

"Your comrades are coming back into civil pursuits regardless of their physical handicaps and the additional drawbacks of having been economically handicapped since the day they entered the service," he said.

Warning the convention that repeated overtures had been made to merge the organization with other veteran groups, Commander McFarland said:

"D. A. V. is the only true spokesman of the disabled of the nation. Your standing at Washington is unchallenged, your record in constructive work cannot be surpassed and your steady and continuous increase in membership, while other organizations are losing by thousands, is indicative of your future."
