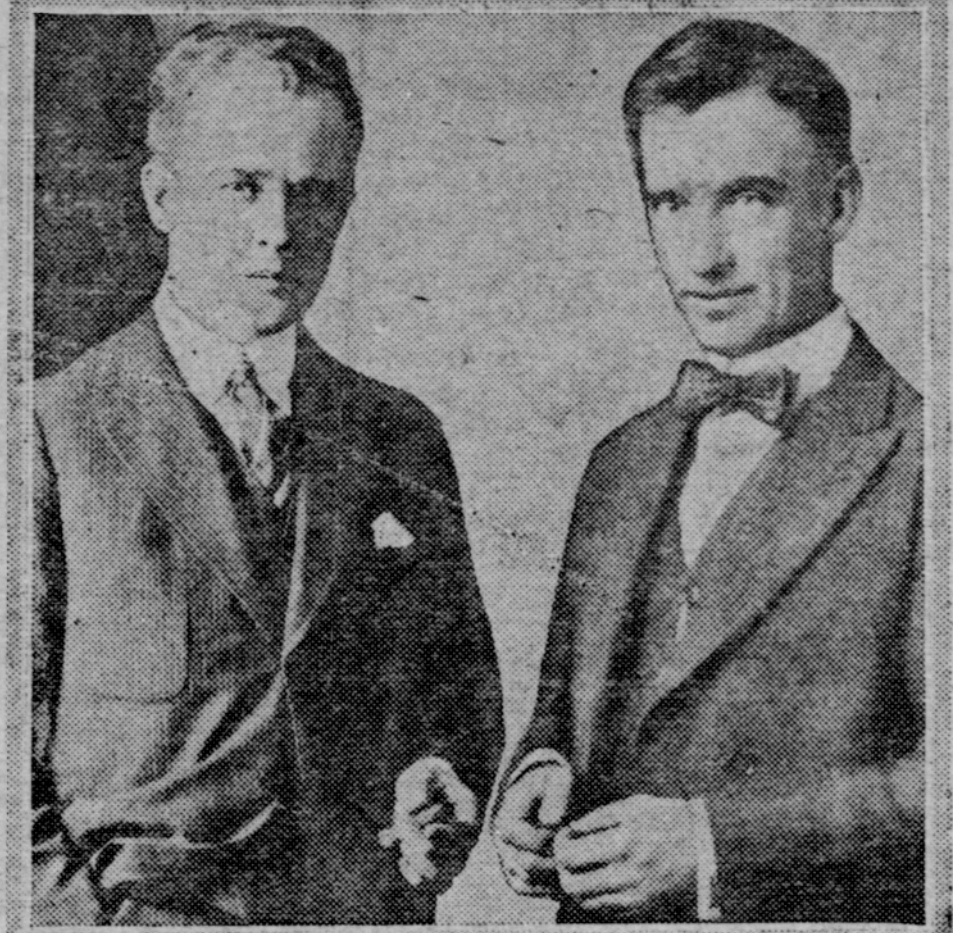
Arrived Yesterday—Wm. D. Bennett, attorney for the Hartman Syndicate arrived in Ashland yesterday from Portland.

OFFICERS TO PRESERVE ORDER DURING STAMPEDE

HAINES, Ore., June 25—It is rumored that a force of federal and state prohibition officers will make Haines their headquarters during the stampede, which is to be held here the last three days of this week.

It is generally understood that prohibition measures are to be enforced here during the entire week and bootleggers and drunks will be rounded up and removed from the streets as rapidly as they appear.

There has never been serious disorder at Haines during the annual outdoor show held here and the officers and Stampede management do not intend that any lawlessness shall interfere with the exhibition this year.

PLANES ARRIVE TO PATROL OREGON FORESTS

EUGENE, June 26—Two airplanes which will act as a forest air patrol during the summer arrived in Eugene last night at 7 o'clock from San Francisco under the command of Lieutenant Lloyd Barnett.

The machines will remain in the state until October 1. They will make Eugene a headquarters point, but will be at the call of the forest service for duty anywhere in the state. The main function of the patrol will be to carry forest service observers quickly to the scene of fires.

Lieutenant Barnett was accompanied by Staff Sergeant Fred Kelly, who piloted one of the machines, and Corporal A. Bellotti, a radio operator.

CONFERENCE VOTES TO CLOSE FUMIGATING PLANTS

RENO, June 26—At a meeting of state sanitary agents held yesterday it was decided to do away with fumigation stations in Oregon, Idaho, Nevada and Arizona immediately. California produce will be shipped under the permit system from unaffected districts and sheep, under federal health certificates, can be shipped to Eastern markets from Lassen, Modoc, Sierra, Plumas, Nevada and Placer counties, California.

At the annual convention of his organization, Jones made his presidential address the vehicle for an attack on Frank Hodges, a former secretary of the Miners'

erman's trials and doing my best to get out of them.”

It's pretty tough to be a member of the House of Lords when a Labor Government is in office in England. Things have now reached the point where the “noble lords” are fearful that they will be overworked.

At the present time the House of Lords meets three days each week that Parliament is in session. Generally the Lord Chancellor takes his seat on the woolsack and the session begins at 4 o'clock in the afternoon. Some days, when there is a lot of business, the Lords don't get away from their jobs until as late as 5:15 p. m. Most days, however, they manage to knock off about 4:30.

Since the Labor Government came in, however, so much work has been dumped on the Lords that it has been impossible to dash away so early in the evening. The question then arose as to whether the House should sit longer while it was sitting or sit oftener. A committee was appointed to investigate the alternatives.

After prolonged deliberation it was decided that it was far better to hang around a little longer on the weedy working days than to insert more working days into the week. Just to show that the Lords are willing to carry their full share of the burdens of legislating, the committee laid down the principle that:

“It is not unreasonable that the House should be prepared to sit normally until 8 o'clock when the amount of business so requires.”

British employers are fearful that the example of the Lords will be followed by the working classes and that a demand for a twelve-hour week, “like the ‘House of Lords’ as,” will become general.

RED SPIDERS DOING DAMAGE IN JOSEPHINE

GRANTS PASS, June 26—The red spider is becoming prevalent in sections of Josephine county and efforts are being made to control the pest. The spiders appeared last year in numerous hop yards here and caused considerable damage. They were noticed several months earlier than usual this season and an expert was brought here from Oregon Agricultural college to take up methods of control. It was found that the use of sulphur was beneficial in eradicating the spider. It is also being found in the truck gardens, beans, cucumbers and such stuff being attacked.
