RAZED HILT BUILDINGS WILL BE RECONSTRUCTED

HILT, June 27.—"Hilt will arise from her ashes and be a greater town than ever."

That is generally the comment of the citizens of Siskiyou's northernmost little city which was ravaged by fire last Thursday afternoon.

The Fruit Growers Supply Company, owner of most of the property burned over, has already started preparations for the construction of a new hotel, bigger and better than the one destroyed and will shortly let contracts for many new dwelling houses.

The company has authorized the statement that the fire did not in any way effect the operation of its large lumber plant here.

STATE WANTS OLD BATTLESHIP REPAIRED

SALEM, June 27.—It would be unprofitable to accept the battleship Oregon under an appropriation authorized by the last legislature, until it was placed in proper condition by the United States government, according to a letter prepared recently by George A. White, adjutant-general for the consideration of Governor Pierce.

In connection with his report to Governor Pierce, the adjutant-general sent a letter to the commandant of Bremerton navy yard, where the historic battleship is now anchored, relating to correspondence passing between the Oregon military officials and the navy department. ASHLAND HAS TWO PAGES IN ROAD MAP

In the 1924 Oregon road map, published by the Oregon State Motor Association, Ashland is well represented by two full-page advertisements, one by the Chamber of Commerce, advertising Ashland's Park and auto camp, and the other by the Hotel Ashland, advertising Ashland as The Gateway City.

Grants Pass and Ashland are the only cities with full page advertisements. The Grants Pass page deals exclusively with the Oregon Marble Caves. Ashland's page tells that the Ashland camp ground was the first one in the West, and describes its beauties. The road map is a thirty six page publication, issued yearly showing the roads, their condition, and giving distances.

CANNERY POLICY WITH FRESH FRUIT IS TOLD

In a story which appeared in yesterday's Tidings, telling of the development of Ashland's cannery, a misstatement was made regarding the Ashland Preserving Company's policy in handling fresh fruit.

It is the intention of the cannery to cooperate with the Ashland Fruit and Produce Association in the development of the fresh fruit industry, and to stand ready to absorb the surplus, thus working to the best interests of all concerned.

The cannery will take all fruits and berries contracted, but is willing that the grower sell his crop fresh as long as prices are high, giving him a higher average price and enabling him to plant a larger acreage.

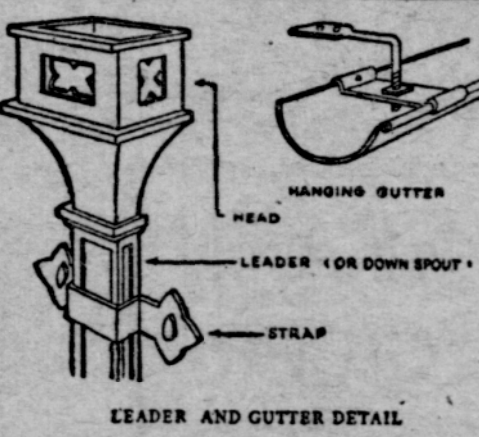

It is estimated that about 250 feet of leaders and gutters are used on every well-built dwelling house. The gutters receive the rain water from the roof and carry it, with the proper pitch, to the gutters which run down the side of the house and usually drain into the sewer or into holes in the ground filled with rocks and broken stone and then covered over.



erection is the same no matter what the material is, the house owner, in the interest of economy, should see to it that his house is equipped with copper leaders and gutters in the beginning so that no renewals are ever needed.

There are several things to remember in equipping a house with leaders and gutters. The gutter must be large enough to take care of all the water and the outlet big enough to accelerate the water's velocity as it enters. The leader

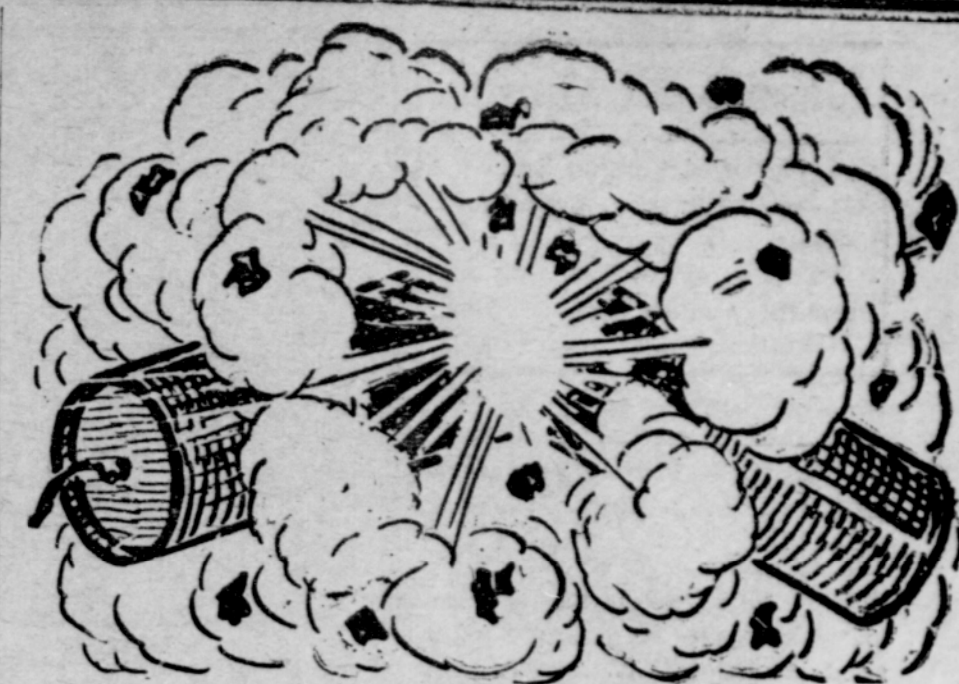
