## AGE-LONG FIGHT TO MODIFY DIVORCE MAY WIN IN BRITAIN

LONDON, June 27.—The age-long fight to modify the divorce laws of England is apparently about to be successful.

Despite strenuous opposition from the clergy, and certain sections of the laity, of the Church of England, a bill enlarging the grounds upon which divorce may be granted has passed the second reading in the House of Lords and seems certain of final enactment. The bill is sponsored by Lord Buckmaster, one of the leading "law lords" of the Upper House of Parliament.

At the present time the only recognized ground for divorce in England is marital unfaithfulness. Under the new bill the privilege of divorce would be extended to cases of desertion, cruelty, drunkenness, insanity, imprisonment for life under a commuted death sentence, and confinement in a criminal lunatic asylum, either for life or temporary.

In debating the bill, prior to the passing of the second reading, Lord Buckmaster, who has led the fight for easier divorce in England for years, declared that the chief purpose of his measure was to relieve human misery. He argued particularly for the adoption of the insanity and desertion provisions of the bill.

The Archbishop of Canterbury, who is allowed to speak but not to vote in the House of Lords, based his objection to the bill on the ground that it represented a backward step from the high principles upon which the moral

life of the nation rested. "The argument that, unless we allow divorce for desertion, insanity and life imprisonment, immorality will become more widespread," he said, "is based on a doctrinaire view of life rather than on practical experience. I distrust these generalizations

which are rash and dangerous. We must not open a door which can never again be shut."

Viscount Fitzalan, a leading Catholic, also opposed the bill, declaring it would "result in the weakening of the moral fibre and character of the English people."

The attitude of the Labor Government toward reform of the divorce laws is now the chief uncertain factor in the situation.

## WHEAT CUT FOR HAY IN UMATILLA COUNTY

PENDLETON, June 27.—Comparatively little of Umatilla county's wheat acreage will be abandoned this year, notwithstanding the severe damage done by freezes in May and the drought that was not broken until June rains came, according to the opinion of Fred Bennion, county agent.

A heavy proportion of the crop in the west end than usual will be cut for hay this year, but farmers will harvest their crops either for hay or for grain on nearly every farm, he said. Threshing will start in the west end about July 1 on a majority of farms. In normal years combines usually begin to hum there between July 1 and 5.

## DEFECTIVE VISION FOUND TO MENACE NATION'S WORKERS

NEW YORK, June 27.—Industry is neglecting the eyes of the workers, greatly retarding national production. It is asserted by the Eye Sight Conservation Council of America. Its conclusions are based upon a survey embracing 170 companies located in twenty-three States and employing more than 1,000,000 men and women.

Summarizing the results of eye tests of a group of more than 200,000 employees, said to be the largest yet studied in the field of eye conservation, the council reports that the average proportion of defective vision is 44.3 per cent.

These disclosures it was stated, "establish an accurate incidence of the proportion of defective vision among the 42,000,000 gainfully employed persons in the United States."

## Production is Retarded.

The Eye Sight Conservation Council concludes that existing conditions place an extra burden upon industry and that production is retarded.

"Eyesight, as an important factor affecting the output of the industries of the United States, is being overlooked," it is asserted. "Comparatively few industrial and commercial establishments are giving any attention to the care of the eyes of their employees."
