NEWS LETTER

PARIS, June.—John D. Rockefeller's gift of one million dollars to restore the Fontainebleau and Versailles palaces and the Rheims Cathedral has inspired no French millionaire to a similar contribution. Tag days, Red-Cross drives and popular subscriptions are almost unknown in France. Public spirit rarely goes as deep as the pocketbook.

"Rockefeller's gift to France is humiliating," according to an editorial by Monsieur Andre Billy, in Louis Loucheur's Petit Journal. "Heaven keep me from having false pride. But that France should be reduced to accepting the gratuities of foreigners to save her artistic inheritances from going to ruin—say what you will—it is nothing for us to boast about."

"I know well enough that there's been a war, and that we are faced with the necessity of restoring our devastated regions. But the bad condition of Versailles and Fontainebleau doesn't date from the war. It is not only during the last ten years that Versailles has been falling to rack and ruin; it has been going to pieces for half a century. "It is not Germany's fault if Versailles is crumbling to dust; it is the fault of France. This is

true. What is the use of denying it?"

"The Rockefeller gift is more provoking for our pride when we consider the Arthur Meyer book sale, which occurred at the very moment the Franco-American committee was apportioning Rockefeller's donation between the palaces and the Rheims Cathedral."

Editor Billy points out that one volume of Moliere in the collection of the former French millionaire was sold for more than \$10,000.

"If I owned a library worth several millions, the fact that an American thought it necessary to come to the rescue of Rheims, Versailles and Fontainebleau and give eighteen million francs to the French Government would seem particularly disagreeable to me," he declared.

"If I had a library worth several millions I would sell at least half of it to reimburse Mr. Rockefeller for a part, at least, of his donation."

Absent-mindedness on the part of France's statesmen has become so marked recently that the press is beginning to be worried about it. Editors wonder whether intense concentration on the German reparations, worry about the balancing of the budget, or domestic cares explain it.

University professors are usually excused for absent-mindedness, but L'Oeuvre doesn't hesitate to tell how Professor Paul Painleve, when he made his formal call on ex-President Miller and some days ago, forgot all about his waiting automobile. Surrounded by a group of newspapermen, Painleve started to walk home.

It was only by running after his employer for a block and tugging at his sleeve that the chauffeur succeeded in reminding the President that he had an automobile.

Ambassador Hermite, now on his way to take his new post in Copenhagen, and until recently Chef de Cabinet and right-hand man of Monsieur Poincare, is also receiving considerable attention for his absent-mindedness.

The Progress Civile recalls that on Hermite's wedding day he went to the Foreign Office as usual and forgot all about the ceremony. It was only when his bride was waiting at the church that a Foreign Office attendant reminded Monsieur that he had an engagement.

But what threatened to be fatal to Hermite's career happened when he absent-mindedly turned the key in the door of the room of President Deschanel, locking him in. President Deschanel was already suffering from the illness that affected his mind and soon caused his death. Deschanel had a nervous collapse as a result of what he imagined intentional imprisonment, and he never forgave Hermite.

Sugared blood, prepared with aromatic yeast of wine, a dainty African tidbit, was the dessert at the annual banquet of the Society of Acclimatization, in the dining-room of the Gare de Lyons a few nights ago.

Once a year this society gives a formal dinner in which exotic foods from the four corners of the earth are brought together for Paris's most particular gourmets. Hummingbirds' wings and snake steaks leave the realms of simile and become actual food at this annual gastronomic soiree. The only limit put on the chef is not to renege on the dishes of the Cannibal Isles.

Moroccan oyster, consisting of the eggs of the murex fish, prepared in Fedbala, Morocco, was the first course. The "pijerry," the so-called "King Fish of Argentina," famed for its tender meat, came next, accompanied by rice cooked by an Annamite from Indo-China. The rice was moistened with "nucio-nam," the juice extracted from an Oriental fish.

Moroccan couscous had as a vegetable side dish creamed salmon, commonly known as "glasswort." Canadian maple sugar, unknown to the Parisian, prepared the way for the sugared blood, mixed by Doctor Ganducheau. Coffee from Annam finished the dinner.

Prince Joachim Murat is the president of the Society of Acclimatization. Former Ministers Cheron and Capus, President of the Marquis de Noailles and prominent members of the Diplomatic Corps attended the dinner.

First Woman to Hold Down Governor's Job Is but 34

ALBUQUERQUE, New Mexico, Blessed with two-gunned forebears who stalked New Mexico in its raw era, the valor of a fighting grandfather who in the Civil War battle of Valverde emerged in glory, and the keen, modern business acumen of a father who, for 43 years has been connected with the First National Bank of Albuquerque, there is every hereditary explanation for the achievements of Mrs. Soledad C. Chacon, 34, the first woman in the political history of the United States to jointly hold the office of Secretary of State, Lieutenant-Governor and Acting Governor. She became Acting Governor June 10.

Mrs. Chacon, Secretary of State of New Mexico, through the recent death of Lieutenant-Governor Jose A. Baca, automatically assumed the duties of Lieutenant-Governor of New Mexico, together with her unusual task, for a woman, as Secretary of State.

And with Governor James Hinke absent from the State as a delegate to the National Democratic Convention, there also fell on the shoulders of this remarkable woman the duties of Governor.

She Fills Three Offices
Governor, Lieutenant-Governor and Secretary of State—these are the three leading executive offices of the State—and she is carrying them all.

Mrs. Chacon is the daughter of Meliton Chavez, who for nearly half a century has been affiliated

in banking circles here. In addition to her triple burden in the State capital, Mrs. Chacon also presides as assistant cashier in her father's bank.

Her mother, the late Mrs. Francisquita B. Chavez, was the daughter of one of the early pioneers of Spanish origin in New Mexico, the late don Santiago Baca, who was one of the outstanding politicians and business men of his time.

Baca, her mother's father, served as clerk in the Senate of the State Legislature at the age of 17, and later served three terms in the Senate, the last time as presiding officer.

Her Grandfather a Sheriff
Mrs. Chacon's great-grandfather, Jesus Maria Baca, was born in Santa Fe and served as sheriff of that county in the days when law was carried recklessly on the hip in the form of six statutes, a decision for each shell. He later served in the Civil War and was decorated for unusual bravery at the battle of Valverde.

Mrs. Chacon was educated in the public schools of Albuquerque and was graduated from the high school here in 1903, later acquiring her business training in a business college. She was married to Ireneo Chacon, business man, in 1910.

She is regarded as one of the most able politicians in New Mexico, and the Southwest in general, and, with the accumulation of a few more years political lore, hopes to become Governor of New Mexico by popular vote.

FIRE THREATENED OPEN AIR DANCE PAVILION

The many couples who Saturday night stepped to the music of Loveland's orchestra at the Lithian dance pavilion in the park probably do not know how close they came to missing their fun.

Saturday afternoon, as the final touches were being put on the floor with a special machine, a dust explosion occurred, and part of the pavilion caught fire. By hard work, the fire was extinguished without turning in an alarm. One man was painfully burned in combating the blaze.

"Who is that fellow up in the tree?" was the most frequently asked question at the dance Saturday. It was "Pink" Day, called the Northwest's liveliest entertainer, whose singing has already won him many Ashland friends.

"Pink" will be in the same tree tonight, and every night this week, singing the ankle-aggravating melodies that Loveland's orchestra is pleasing the crowds with.
