TOURIST TRAVEL IS ON INCREASE AGAIN

Saturday registrations of out-of-state motorists at the Chamber of Commerce totaled 174. This is the next highest mark made this year, ten more cars being registered June 18. Health Hints by the Father of Physical Culture

Disease is induced by exposure to undue cold or heat, impure air, lightning or electricity. People are affected by high altitudes and aerobically suffer when they ascend above a certain elevation.

A great cause of disease is the custom of overheating the body by too warm rooms, and too heavy clothing. This seems to be an American proclivity. In England, where the inhabitants exercise more freely and lead more vigorous lives, one will find drawing rooms from ten to fifteen degrees cooler than those of their American cousins. The way is shown in so many American faces comes from lack of exposure to fresh air and sunshine, dearth of exercise, and living in hot rooms.

Build up warmth in the body by accelerating the circulation by using the right sort of food; by refusing to coddle yourself in warm places under the delusion that you are making yourself comfortable. Live out of doors as much as possible, and thrive upon the oxygen that is essential to keep the fire burning within your body. Fight the tendency to wear more clothing than is needed, lest you become so cold-blooded you will encumber yourself with so many clothes that circulation and general health will be interfered with. Excessive clothing is inclined to stop the pores and partially paralyze their activity and thus one becomes far more liable to colds and other complaints.

The barefooted boys and girls that one sees in Scotland on a winter day know nothing of colds or the many other ailments that our pampered children, living in hot-house parlors, have to fight all the time. It is a fact that the more the body is hardened, the less susceptible one is to disease and the more vitality he will generate. Linen makes better underwear than wool, because it more quickly absorbs the impurities, and therefore allows the pores to retain their activity. Next to linen, cotton makes the best underwear; and these materials can be worn with comfort during the coldest weather.

Endeavor to get hold of the great principle here involved, viz, that he who pampers himself in the assurance that he is thus taking care of himself is doing the very opposite of what he desires.

DEMOCRATS HONOR THE LATE PRESIDENT HARDING

NEW YORK, June 29.—In its report to the Democratic national convention late yesterday, the resolutions committee, submitted the following resolution paying respect to the memory of the late President Harding.

The text was: "In political campaigns the American people are divided into opposing parties; after the election they are as one man in allegiance to the government and in loyalty to the nation's chief executive."

"As Democrats we stand uncovered beside the grave of Warren G. Harding, late president of the United States, vie with his most devoted friends in expressions of regret at his untimely death and share the sorrow that it has brought into his home."

The resolution was proposed in the committee by William Jennings Bryan.

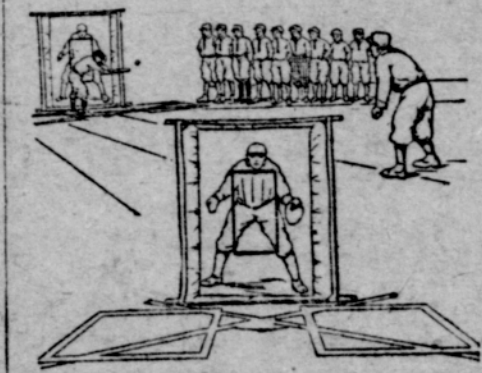

Dummy of Baseball Catcher Aids Indoor Practice

With the aid of a small indoor cage, containing a target placed back of lines to represent the home plate and



the batter's position, baseball pitching practice may be obtained regardless of the weather. The target is made of heavy canvas and is attached by metal eyelets to a portable frame, six feet high and four feet wide. "The life-size figure of a catcher is painted on the canvas and a scoring chart below gives rating for balls and strikes, in training. The 'strike area' is plainly indicated on the figure of the catcher in heavy red lines. As the ball hits the canvas it rebounds and on a smooth surface will roll back to the pitcher for another delivery. The target is also an aid in batting practice and for coaching individual pitchers or squads. It is made in two sizes, one for girls or boys in elementary schools and the other for students in colleges."

"Trick" Furniture Saves Rent and Space in Apartments

With the constantly increasing demand for economy of space because of the high rentals demanded for city apartments, the building of what is known as "trick" furniture has developed into an industry, and its design has challenged the ingenuity of inventors in all parts of the country. 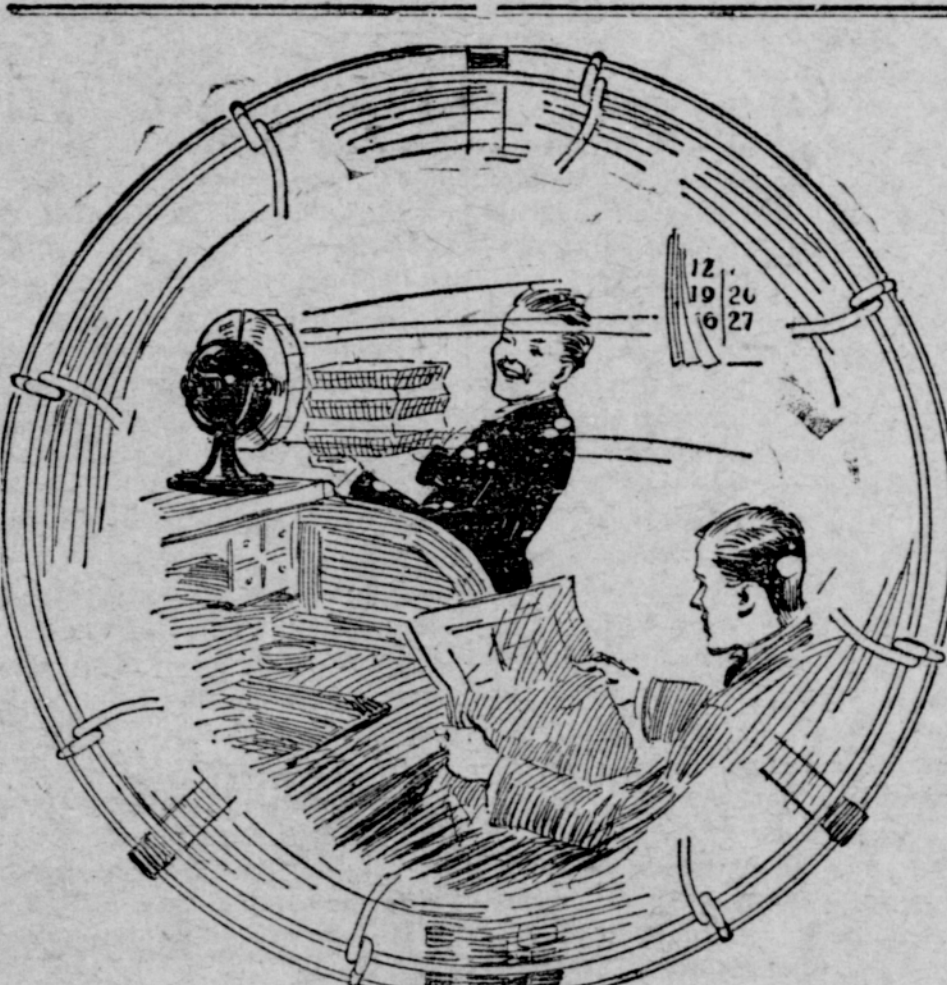
Market for Gas

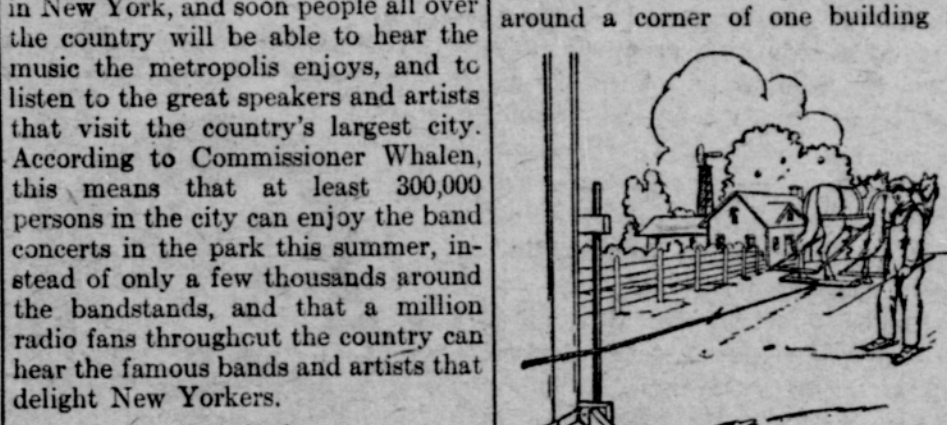
In order to hold the brush securely. At the ends of the brace are two small holes that were previously used to hold spring wires. Small wire nails are driven through these holes into the wooden part of the brush so that it cannot turn when in use. After on side of the brush has been worn down the nails are simply removed, the brush turned around and again fastened as before.

New York Plans Great Broadcasting Station

Good Use for Old Carpet Sweeper

When a carpet sweeper no longer sweeps it is usually thrown away. Upon examination, it will be found, however, that quite some bristle is still left on the roller, which may be used a few more years as a push brush.



shown in the drawing. The brush and the wooden handle are removed from the sweeper box and also the metal brace that holds the handle. The shaft of the brush has a bearing hole at each end which usually fits the two pivots on the brace. It may be necessary to bend the brace together a little

order to avoid another. This causes the rope to rub hard against the corner, not only wearing it out quickly but also bruising the corner.

In one case injury to both corner and rope was prevented by arranging a steel roller vertically along the edge of the building as shown. The roller consisted of a 4-ft. length of 2-in. iron pipe, turning on bolts fitted into the ends. The bolts were in turn held by short pieces of 2 by 4-in. wood, nailed securely to the barn. The roller has been in use for two or three years and has never failed in its purpose.

Putty for Floor Cracks

Cracks in a floor that is stained and varnished may be filled with a putty consisting of 2 parts of glue, 14 parts of water, 4 parts of plaster of paris, and 2 parts of litharge. This putty will take the stain and varnish well.
