The Art Of Beauty

The Older Woman

TO look younger than one's age is not necessarily to look more attractive. Each age has its own fascination, and to jettison the charm of maturity for the Fata Morgana of a spurious youthfulness is to sell one's own birthright. But, to make the most of this rare charm, a certain amount of wisdom must be acquired in the use of adjuncts to beauty.

Often the woman approaching middle age becomes panicky—either believes that art and artifice are no longer for her, and declines into a pallid and nondescript obscurity, or goes to the other extreme and plunges into a cosmetic orgy in the effort to retain the outward appearance of youth. Both extremes are wrong. There is no reason why the older woman should not use cosmetics in moderation to improve her appearance, but she will only defeat her purpose and add years to her age if she makes up in a glaring imitation of youth.

The reason for this is obvious. Cosmetics, apart, it is not natural for an older woman to have as high a color in her cheeks or lips as a young girl. Therefore, since the principal of artistic make-up is to adhere as closely to nature as possible, it is unesthetic for a mature woman to display cherry lips and bright pink cheeks, unless these attributes have withstood the years and belong to her naturally.

What rules of make-up then shall the mature woman follow? Obviously, she is of all types, blonde, medium, or brunette, so that no more than for the younger woman can any one type of make-up be laid down. Let her select the rouge and powder suited to her type, as discussed previously in these columns—for the blonde, rouge Mandarine, Naturelle, or Peaches powder. For the Brunette, Ashes of Roses rouge, Eschel or Peaches and Cream powders. It is for her a question of reducing the emphasis. From, say, forty or forty-five on, good taste demands the subdued use of color on the cheeks and lips.

It is extremely important for the older woman to apply rouge where her own natural color is. As a general rule, the color recedes as one grows older, and is found lower on the cheeks than

in early youth. The rouge must be very carefully applied and shaded at the edges so as to leave no hard line. By all means go to the window when doing this, so that the uncompromising light of day will guide you as to the amount of rouge to apply. There are some women who find as they approach middle age that, far from losing their color, they have a tendency to become more florid in complexion. This sometimes is accentuated to an amusing degree after eating, dancing, excitement, or exercise. To tone down this unbecoming flush to a more delicate color, a new powder has been originated, which bears the romantic name of Vert Ophelia. While this powder has a green tone, it is of the most delicate water green, or the palest Nile, such as you might get in a very filmy gauze, and in fact the effect of its use is to pass a very becoming veil over the too-flushed face.

HEROIC RESCUE OF WIFE ACHIEVED BY BLIND MAN

DENVER, July 1. — "Bill" Johnson, forty-two and blind, is the hero of West Denver today. He rescued his wife from drowning when a boat in which they were fishing overturned in Crown Hill Lake. When the woman sank, Johnson, who can swim just a bit, paddled about calling for his wife. She rose to the surface and luckily, struck his arm. Johnson, struggling fiercely, managed to bear her up until his hand grasped the upturned boat. With a heroic effort he threw the woman's arms over the craft and grabbed hold himself. After resting momentarily, Johnson, with only his wife's voice to guide him, struck out for shore and finally reached firm ground again.

SECOND BROOD OF CODLIN MOTHS HERE

The first of the second brood of codlin moth are coming out at this time and a few eggs are being laid in different parts of the valley. In old orchards the brood seems to be coming out earlier than in the younger orchards, especially in the floor of the valley in the Voorheis section. However, the brood will not be going good until about the 5th to the 10th of July, but it is advisable to have the fruit thoroughly covered in apple orchards and in the older pear orchards by the 5th of July. This brood will continue to work until the last of July and fruit should be kept thoroughly coated from now until picking time.

Orchards that were sprayed a week or ten days ago could wait until about the 10th, which will give a cover when most of the moths are emerging. The stuff that has not been sprayed for three weeks or so should be coated immediately. The last part of this brood will be during the latter part of July and the first week in August, and it will be difficult to hold the brood with two applications.

IMMIGRANTS FROM EUROPE TURN TO SOUTH AMERICA

LONDON, July 1. — Barred from entering the United States by the recently passed new Immigration act, European emigrants are turning their eyes toward South America.

Shipping companies serving the South American route report that their vessels sailing to Rio de Janeiro, Buenos Aires and Pernambuco are carrying increased numbers of emigrant passengers, and in some steamers the third-class accommodation is fully booked up for weeks ahead.

Southampton immigration officials report that nearly every vessel in the South Atlantic trade is carrying between four and six hundred emigrants every trip, prominent observers think that sooner or later this fact must affect steamships running on the Europe-New York service, and that there will be a transfer of the struggle for North Atlantic bookings to the South Atlantic.

Some authorities even predict that one or two of the "Big Six" liners may desert the Southampton-New York trade and reinforce the Liverpool-South American route.

HEARING ON WHEAT RATES IS DEFERRED

SALEM, July 1. — Hearing of the petition of through routes and freight rates from the wheat-producing sections of eastern Washington to Puget sound points, which was to have been held under the direction of the interstate commerce commission at Olympia July 8, has been postponed indefinitely. This was announced at the offices of the public service commission today.

The hearing, whenever it is held, will be attended by the three members of the Oregon public service commission.

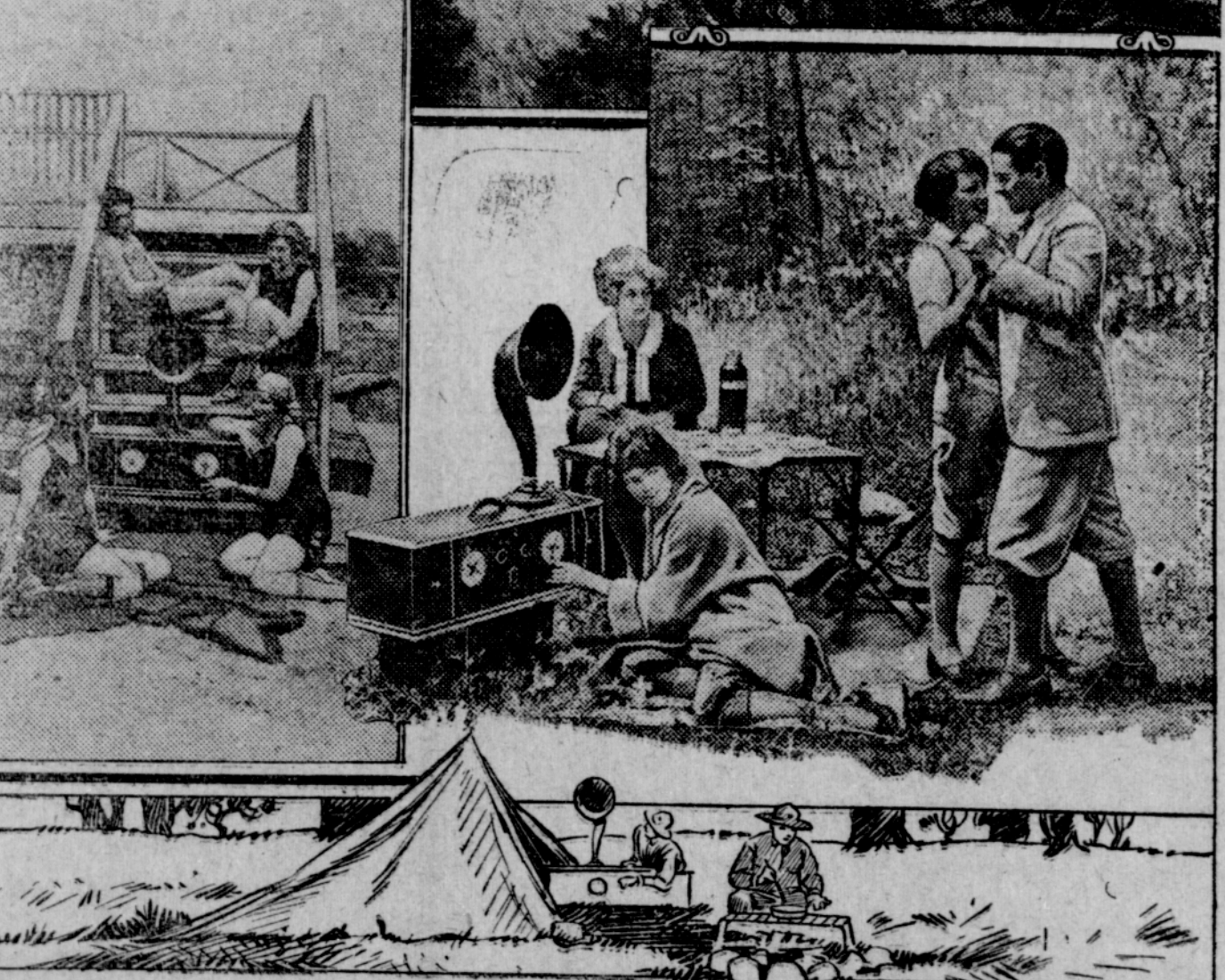

Indoor Pleasures Out-of-Doors



REPORTS from various sources throughout the country discovered the popular theory, based on facts arising out of last year's experience, that radio sets would be deserted by their owners this summer, who take to field, mountain and sea shore at the call of the great out-of-doors. On the contrary, statistics thus far gathered clearly indicate a decided trend among radio enthusiasts toward the use of the compact portable instrument, and an offspring of the home receiver, which is taking its place at the camp, aboard the small boat and in many instances is considered an essential part of the traveling pack of the automobile tourist. Just returned from an extensive trip through several of the eastern states, a prominent radio executive said: "If the enthusiasm shown among radio listeners in the East is taken as an index to the national situation, I should say the radio concert stage has been transferred to the woods." Several reasons have been advanced to explain this landslide of interest in summertime radio. In the first place, it is pointed out, there are more high-powered broadcasting stations in operation this year than last. In fact the entire country is so effectively blanketed with radio that even the remotest corner of the land is adequately served by radio programs. Secondly, fans looking forward to a running description of the athletic classics staged at the larger cities, are making preparations for receiving these popular broadcasts. The broadcasters too, are alert to the special interest in big league baseball returns and many have already set aside a specified time at which they will hurl this precious information to the air.
