YEAR'S FIRE LOSS NEAR TEN MILLION

Report filed Oregon Insurance Commissioner Will H. Moore 28 FACE ARSON CHARGE Eight Persons Killed and 25 Injured in State During 1923; Clatsop Loss Biggest SALEM, Or., June 28.—Property damage resulting from fires in Oregon during 1923 aggregated approximately \$10,000,000, or \$11.25 per capita, according to the annual report of Will H. Moore, which was completed today. Mr. Moore, by virtue of his appointment as state insurance commissioner, also is state fire marshal. The report showed that eight persons lost their lives as a result of the fires, while 25 persons suffered injuries from the same source. Deaths resulting from fires during the year were 11 less than during the previous year. Twenty-eight Face Charges Fires investigated by the fire marshal's department aggregated 150, with 28 arrests on charge of arson. Twenty-seven persons confessed to setting fires, while ten others who pleaded not guilty were tried and convicted. There are now 16 cases pending in the courts. Fire prevention work has been carried on by the state fire marshal in all sections of the state, and approximately 75 addresses on this subject were given by representatives of the state department during the year. In compliance with a law enacted at the last session of the legislature the state fire marshal has taken up the work of standardizing all hose coupling in the state, and this undertaking is now well advanced. At the time the report was compiled hose couplings in 43 municipalities had been standardized. Similar activities have been carried on at 11 state institutions and 19 industrial plants. The cost of this work charged against the state was \$3709.92. Insurance Is Heavier Insurance paid on fire losses during 1923 aggregated \$5,357,487.97, or nearly a million dollars more than paid during the previous year. Fires originating from strictly preventable causes during the year resulted in losses of \$959,880.40, the report said. The following table shows the actual losses caused by fires during the past year, together with the amount of insurance paid, segregating by counties:
