Health Hints by the Father of Physical Culture

The fundamental reason for eating is to supply strength and fuel for the body, but the direct, immediate cause of the demand for food is found in appetite and the ability to enjoy food. If we knew nothing about why food is necessary, we should eat just the same, because of appetite. Normal appetite is the expression of hunger, but appetite may express hunger, or it may express some condition of irritation that produces an artificial craving mistaken for hunger. There is a fundamental difference between hunger and appetite. Hunger represents the absolute demand of the body for nourishment; appetite merely means a desire and capability of relishing food even when it may not be needed. Natural hunger appetite can always be obeyed safely and freely. The gratification of the abnormal or unnatural appetite is certain to be followed by harmful results in the long run, if not at once. Abnormal or artificial appetite may often be stimulated by the use of condiments, alcoholic beverages, hot sauces, and other means for tickling the palate. One of the best ways to make sure that your appetite is the expression of true hunger is to avoid these appetite stimulants. If you will confine yourself to foods containing only the flavors which Nature has given them you can depend upon it that your appetite will be normal. The first and most important of all dietetic rules is, follow your appetite. It is understood that this means a normal appetite. It is a crime to eat without appetite under any circumstances. Thousands of people go to the table because it is meal time. They eat because dinner is ready or breakfast is served, but if they followed their own instincts, they would not touch a bite. There is an old notion that one must eat to keep up his strength. But strength from food depends upon good digestion. It is only when the stomach is ready for food that the digestive juices are secreted and good digestion made possible.

CUPID FIGHTS DRAW WITH RENO DIVORCES

RENO, Nev., July 3.—Kid Cupid fought a practical draw with Old Man Divorce in Reno during June, after being badly worsted every month for the past five years by the great separationist. Sixty divorces were granted and fifty-nine marriage licenses issued. Only fifty-seven divorce actions were filed during the month. Divorces have shown a steady decline this year from previous periods. Many of the Eastern people seeking separations are reported going to Paris, Yucatan, Mexico and other points in preference to Reno.

EIGHT WEED RESIDENTS ARE FINED \$500 EACH

YREKA, July 3.—Eight Shastians entered pleas of guilty and paid fines of \$300 each and one decided to stand trial when arraigned at Weed on liquor charges. The charges were the outgrowth of a raid made by federal officers two weeks ago, and all the men fined had entered pleas of guilty the week before in the federal court at Sacramento, and were fined amounts ranging up to \$500.

REGISTRATION RECORD IS BROKEN ONCE MORE

The record for out-of-state tourist registration was again broken when yesterday 210 cars secured permits. About nine-tenths of the machines were from California. Middle Western states had a large representation, while but few came from the East or from New England.

SAN FRANCISCO TO BE HOST TO BRITISH TARS

SAN FRANCISCO, July 3.—What probably is one of San Francisco's greatest hospitality armies is being recruited for the entertainment and reception of the thousands of officers and enlisted men who will be this city's guests when the British fleet calls here July 8, 9 and 10. It is estimated that the British fleet, together with those warships of the American fleet which will be here to welcome it from overseas, will bring approximately 12,000 visitors into port.
