Primitive nations can dispense with physical training-schools as the creatures of the wilderness dispense with houses and clothes, but city-dwellers need a substitute for the lost opportunities of outdoor exercise.

And that remedial use of gymnastics requires the supervision of an expert teacher. It is not enough to provide an assortment of training-school apparatus and trust visitors to use it to good advantage.

Violent muscular efforts can exhaust the vital vigor of the organism to a degree which—for a short time—may take away the appetite, and make it advisable to defer respiration for a little while; but even a direct rush from the gymnasium to the dining room would be hygienically preferable to the opposite mistake.

A well-developed system of physical culture offers remedies for almost every disorder of the human organism, and for all but the most hopeless malformations.

As a preliminary, gymnasium pupils should be advised to postpone the principal meal of the day to the late afternoon, and at least half an hour after the conclusion of their exercises.

Opening Swimming Pool—"The opening of the new free Rogue Elk swimming pool at the Rogue Elk Camp, was the occasion for a real good time.

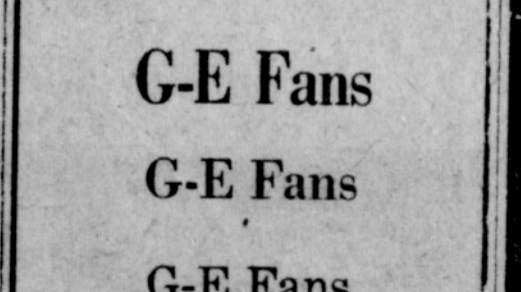
A large number of young people enjoyed the pool and later all took part in a marshmallow roast, given by F. M. McDonald, of the popular Rogue Elk Store.
