DEMOCRATS ARE UNABLE TO NOMINATE

Eighty-Second Ballot Finds McAdoo and Smith Still In Bitter Fight

DELEGATES RELEASED

Convention Votes to Release All Delegates From Pledges; McAdoo Opposes

NEW YORK, July 7.—Except for rest received by tired delegates the adjournment on Sunday of the Democratic national convention was without a hitch.

McAdoo Vote Drops

A drop in McAdoo's vote to a point below 500 alarmed his managers and they shot William Jennings Bryan into the break

The totals of the eighty-second ballot follow: McAdoo, 413; Smith, 365; Davis, 70 1-2; Underwood, 48; Glass, 78; Ritchie, 16 1-2; Robinson, 29 1-2; Bryan, 41 2-2; Owen, 21; Saulsbury, 6; Walsh, 7; Ferris, 12; Roosevelt, 1; Daniels, 1; Barnett, 1; Ralston, 4. Carter Glass started to gain at the eightieth ballot when the Missouri delegation swung its strength to the Virginian.

Delegates Released

At the end of the eighty-second ballot the convention adopted a resolution releasing all the delegations from pledges and instructions of any kind in connection with any candidate.

Convention Adjourns

NEW YORK, July 7.—After taxing six ballots, making \$3 in all, the Democratic convention adjourned to reconvene at 8:30 tonight and at which time it will endeavor to work out of the impasse it has been in for a week.

McAdoo was Whittled Down

from 511 votes on the seventy-eighth ballot to 418 on the eighty-third and last ballot.
