WHAT DID THE METHODISTS DO WITH AMUSEMENTS?

CHICAGO, July 6.—What did to the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church do with the amusement question? Did it lift the ban on theatre-going, card playing and dancing? The revised amusement paragraphs, which will appear in the Methodist Discipline and also in the Methodist Journal which is now being prepared by the General Secretary of the Conference, Dr. R. J. Wade, Chicago, Illinois, follow:

Paragraph 69, Section 1: "Improper amusements and excessive indulgence in innocent amusements are serious barriers to the beginning of religious life and fruitful causes of spiritual decline. Some amusements in common use are positively demoralizing and furnish the first easy steps to the total loss of character. We therefore look with deep concern in the great increase of amusements and on the general prevalence of harmful amusements, and lift up a solemn note of warning and entreaty, particularly against attendance upon immoral, questionable and misleading theatrical or motion picture performances; against dancing; and against such games of chance as are frequently associated with gambling; all of which have been found to be antagonistic to vital piety, promotive of worldliness, and especially pernicious to youth. We affectionately admonish all our people to make their amusements the subject of careful thought and frequent prayer, to study the subject of amusements in the light of their tendencies, and to be scrupulously careful in this matter to set no injurious example. We adjure them to remember that often the question for a Christian must be, not whether a certain course of action is positively immoral, but whether it will dull the spiritual life and be an unwise example.

Section 2: We instruct our Board of Temperance, Prohibition and Public Morals, or its successor, to lead the church in a campaign of education which shall reveal to our people, both young and old, the dangers lurking in the amusements against which we warn. We instruct the above-named Board, or its successor, to produce and disseminate from time to time such scientifically prepared literature as shall awaken our people to the individual and social consequences of improper and excessive amusements. We direct all our Bishops, District Superintendents, and Pastors to call attention to this subject with solemn urgency in all our pulpits; and our Editors, Sunday School Officers, Epworth League Officers and Class Leaders, to aid in abating the evils we deplore. We deem it our bounden duty to summon the whole Church to apply a thoughtful and instructed conscience to the choice of amusements, and not to leave them to accident, or taste, or passion; and we affectionately advise and beseech every member of the Church absolutely to avoid "the taking of such diversions as cannot be used in the name of the Lord Jesus."

Paragraph 280: In cases of neglect of duties of any kind; imprudent conduct; indulging in sinful tempers or words; "taking such diversions as can not be used in the name of the Lord Jesus;" or disobedience to the order and Discipline of the Church; on the first offense, let private reproof be given by the Pastor or Class Leader, and if there be an acknowledgement of the fault and proper humiliation, the person may be borne with. On further offense the Pastor or Class Leader may take with him one or two discreet members of the Church. On continued offense let him be brought to trial and if found guilty and there be no sign of real humiliation, he shall be expelled.

Health Hints by the Father of Physical Culture

The sanitary influence of active exercise is so unmistakable that it has never been altogether disputed, though its importance is still strangely under-rated.

Nearly two thousand years ago the medical philosopher Asclepiades substituted gymnastics for drugs, and Dr. Boerhaave repeatedly called attention to the remedial effect of outdoor labor in cases where medicine had failed to bring relief. "When I reflect on the pathological immunities of hard-working people," he says, "I cannot help thinking that most of our fashionable diseases might be cured mechanically, instead of chemically, by climbing a bitterwood tree, or chopping it down, if you like, rather than swallowing a decoction of its disgusting leaves."

The organism of the human body has, indeed, been aptly compared to a vessel moved both by steam and sails, but still more closely resembles the ingenious motor-boat of a Belgian engineer who utilized air-currents to recharge the batteries of an electric propeller. In a calm the ship for a while continues its course with the assistance of the stored-up power, but under the impulse of a good breeze the engines worked under high pressure, besides being aided by the number of sails. Even thus the activity of the internal organism can for a time dispense with the stimulus of well-directed exercise but manifests the potency of its assistance with a promptness that precludes all reasonable doubt about the connection of cause and effect.

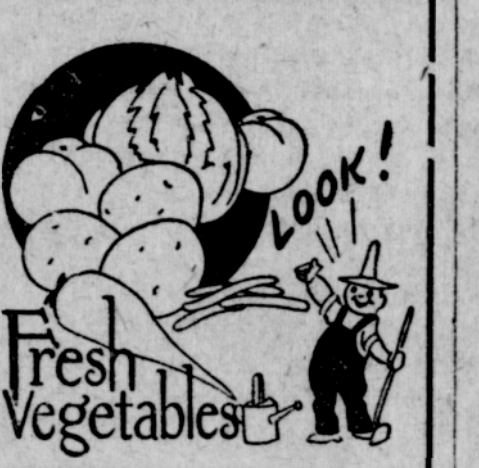
Exposure to a blood-chilling atmosphere makes the generation of animal warmth a question of vital importance, and ten minutes of vigorous exercise will raise that warmth from twenty to thirty degrees. Walking up a hill of two hundred feet suffices to increase the pulse and relieve oppression of the chest and other premonitory symptoms of heart-disease.

Scrupulousness can be cured, or rather palliated, by narcotics for a while. The eventual effect of the drug is to aggravate the evil. Outdoor exercise will remedy the trouble, not only more cheaply and reliably, but also without the risk of distressing after-effects.

AUTO DRIVER DIES AT WHEEL NEAR RIDDLE

ROSEBURG, July 6.—Coroner M. E. Ritter was called to Riddle today to investigate the death of H. L. Call of Hornbrook, Cal., who is believed to have died at the wheel of the automobile he was driving before the machine went over the grade on a rough mountain road between Riddle and the Levins mining ledge. Call was a member of a party of mining engineers who had been looking over the location, and with a companion was on the way to Riddle.

The man riding with Call noticed that the machine was swerving on a very dangerous piece of road and turned to speak to the driver, who was slumped down in his seat apparently unconscious. The passenger jumped as the car went over the grade, and quickly procured a physician but Call was dead.

Five O'Clock Coffee Sponsored By Fashion Authority

A delicious accompaniment to her five o'clock "coffee" are individual coffee cakes, for which Mrs. Ray has consented to give us the recipe. Here it is.

- 2 cups flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
4 tablespoons sugar
3 teaspoons baking powder
4 tablespoons Crisco
1 egg
1/2 cup milk



While hot, brush over with thin lard made with 1/2 cup confectioner's sugar moistened with 1 tablespoon hot water.

OIL FORTUNES WON FROM SMALL LOAN

OLAHOMA CITY, July 4.—Like big oaks from little acorns grow, so do large fortunes sometimes spring from small capital in the oil fields of the Southwest.

Several years ago, when "wildcatters" were punching holes in Oklahoma soil with varied luck, two ex-Texas cowpunchers borrowed a small amount of money from their parents and sank a drill in the petroleum-bearing sand. The result was a "strike"—the historic Glen pool—and the cowpunchers, R. A. Chapman and Robert McFarland, were started on their way to riches and to become oil magnates. The other day Chapman's father died, and an appraisal showed he left an estate valued at \$5,000,000, most of which came to him as a result of the little loan

by which the first big oil well was made possible. The father P. A. Chapman, resided at Waxahachie, Texas, and most of his estate is in Texas, but Oklahoma has just collected \$12,500 inheritance tax on the basis that \$700,000 of the Chapman estate is in this State. His estate, however, is small in comparison with that of the two cowpunchers, whose properties are valued at approximately \$50,000,000—all made from the little loan negotiated many years ago.

UMATILLA WHEAT CROP DECIDEDLY UNDER NORMAL

PENDELTON, July 7.—Umatilla county this year will produce a crop of about 4,000,000 bushels of wheat, according to Henry W. Collins, local buyer, miller and also wheat grower. He estimated 200,000 acres in crop this season and an average yield of 20 bushels. Last year's production, based on warehouse receipts, was 7,000,000 bushels.

Harvesting is already under way on about one-third of the farms in the west end of the county, and some outfits have started near Pendleton, which is about centrally located in the wheat belt. Farmers in the West-end district are expected to start threshing in earnest today, and during the week harvest will get under way in other sections of the county.

KICK OF MULE FATAL TO PENDELTON MAN

PENDELTON, July 6.—The kick of a mule inflicted several days ago while he was at work on the ranch of his brother near Echo proved fatal to John Puller, when he died in St. Anthony's hospital yesterday. The body has been forwarded to Bellingham, Wash., for interment.

HARRISBURG, July 6.—Walter Kapping, 14, of Junction City dived into the Willamette river near the railroad bridge a mile south of town about 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

"I can stay longer under water than you," he said to a boy companion. He never came up. Will Hay of Harrisburg recovered the body about 4 o'clock. Young Kapping was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Kapping.
