REFLECTING TINTS OF SUMMER Dainty and colorful, with a hint of the tint of Summer flowers, the frock to the left is developed in one of the lovely French cotton fabrics. It is of tubular shape, the lower edge of the skirt being trimmed with two plaited flounces of plain voile edged with ribbon. Ribbon is used to bind the neck and short kimono sleeves. Medium size requires 3 1/4 yards 36-inch figured and 2 1/2 yards 36-inch plain material, and 7 yards of ribbon.

A glorious shade of peach cotton crepe is used to develop the second frock, which has the kimono sleeves lengthened with deep lace cuffs. Crepe de Chine or crepe satin may be used with equal effectiveness to reproduce this model, which, for medium size, requires 4 1/4 yards 36-inch material. The collar has tab ends embroidered with the wearer's initials.

STUDENT EARNINGS AT OREGON ON INCREASE

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, July 8. — Income from regular and odd jobs brought \$46,074 to the students of the University of Oregon during the year 1923-24, an increase of \$8678 over the year 1922-23, as shown by the report of Mrs. Charlotte Donnelly, employment secretary of the Y. M. C. A. The income to students from regular jobs for the fall term was \$10,479, while odd jobs brought the sum up to \$11,979. The total for regular and odd jobs during the winter term was \$11,439.

During the spring term regular employment yielded \$11,556, while the approximate return from odd jobs was \$1,100, making the total for the spring term \$12,656.
