KENNETT-POLLOCK ROAD AVAILABLE AS DETOUR

KENNETT, Calif., July 10. — What is known locally as the Kennett-Pollock road is now serviceable as a detour for the state highway.

Supervisor William Welsh has had charge of the improvement work that has cost \$8,000. Pollock is on the Sacramento River where the state highway crosses that stream. Welsh now announces that the Kennett-Pollock road is in good condition. All blind curves are wide enough for machines to pass. There are a few places on straight-away road where for 200 feet the road is too narrow for passing, but the passing points are, in plain view.

Tourist travel already is making use of the Kennett-Pollock road. The distance from Pollock to Kennett is seventeen miles. From Kennett to Redding the county road is in fine condition—in better condition than the detours on the east side. Redding is three miles nearer Pollock over the Kennett road than it is by the state highway and the present detours.
