COUNTY OFFICIALS TAKE BIGGEST STILL

GRANTS PASS, July 16.—When Sheriff George Lewis and his deputy, Ernest Lister, raided a place on Jump-off-Joe creek yesterday they captured a moonshine plant and arrested Paul London. A warrant is out for the arrest of Taylor London, said to be one of the men operating the still.

The distillery is one of the largest ever captured in Josephine county, and is of 100 gallon capacity. It consists of two fifty gallon copper vats, is built on a brick foundation, and was heated with gas. The pipe system used in distilling liquor was very complicated. When the still was captured, it was in operation and five gallons of liquor had been run off. The distillery is the fourth captured this week.

TAX DATE POSTPONED UNTIL AUGUST 20

SALEM, July 17.—The state tax commission yesterday issued an order extending the time for payment on the second installment of the state income tax until August 20.

This action was necessary, it was said, because of the failure of the state supreme court to hand down a decision as to the constitutionality of the state income tax law. The time for paying the second installment of the tax previously was extended from June 20 to July 20.

Monday Address

The speaker's address Monday night was taken from Mark 11, 22 to 26 inclusive. The thought being, "That when ye stand praying, forgive, if ye have aught against any," and by so doing, "Whatever things ye desire, when ye pray, believe that ye receive them, and ye shall have them." He stated that the first meeting was merely a preliminary, in the way of getting out the rocks, stumps, trees and all other obstructions in the path for the following evening addresses.

A strong point brought out in the sermon, was when our people came over here and took this country, the Indians had automobiles, railroad tracks, electric lights and everything which we now enjoy, but they had not the knowledge to put it together. They were still living in wigwams with a tallow candle, and riding ponies with a stick on each side. They never rode on a train, or saw an electric light, when everything was at their command as at ours. The thought was, many people spiritually speaking, are still living in wigwams with tallow candles, when they might as well be enjoying God's blessings that is for every one, God said so. Tuesday night, the subject was "Faith," taken from Matthew 11th chapter, 18th verse.

The ruler came to Jesus in faith, and said "My daughter is even now dead." He did not say, "Come, and maybe she will live," he said, "Come and lay thy hand upon her, and she shall live." The text being, Faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the word of God. The speaker stated he

did not know how much faith he had, but he knew he had some faith, because he had seen it work; and when it took such an infinitesimal part of a nit to remove mountains, if there was as much as could be seen by a small magnifying glass in all Ashland, wonders could be performed for Christ now.

Rev. Garr's Experience

Rev. Garr gave an experience in his own life. Of how he had been injured in running to catch a street car, of falling unconscious in the car upon reaching it, which caused a constriction of the intestines, and he suffered for years, and could not eat, till he got so thin that his life was despaired of, and how his physician friend, who was a man of God, came to pray for him, and after prayer, said, "I knew a man in your condition, who took Nux Vomica," and another friend came and prayed for his healing, and after prayer, said, "I knew a man in your condition who took slippery elm bark, and it cured him.
