Guard May Be Asked

If necessary, Persia will be required to furnish a guard for the American embassy and the American legation, it was announced today.

Imbrie, with Mr. Seymour, another American, were attacked in broad daylight while visiting a fountain in Teheran. They managed to make their way to a vehicle, but were overtaken, and again insulted. Major Imbrie's injuries proved fatal, while those of Seymour were severe.

Under the 1856 treaty with Persia, America is given extraterritorial right, and the protection of consuls is stressed, so America has grounds for the most vigorous action.
