WILL UTILIZE BEAVER IN STOPPING LEAKS

HOOD RIVER, July 28. — To prevent leaks in Goose lake, noted goal of fishermen in northwestern Skamania county, Game Commissioner Hufford of Stevenson plans to trap a colony of beaver and release them at the lake soon. It is believed by game officials that these animals will daub the lava rock bottom of the lake and prevent the outflow of water.

The lake, which lost most of its water last year, immediately after the great Japanese earthquake, was filled with thousands of trout. Leaks were stopped by bags of earth and piles of woven tree branches.

FOUR MEAT MARKETS FINED AT PENDLETON

PENDLETON, July 28. — Charges against five local meat markets that they sold sausages and hamburger in which sulphates were used as preservatives were filed Wednesday afternoon in the local justice of the peace court, and today four of them appeared and paid fines of \$25 and costs in each case.

The charges were brought by L. L. Leach of the state food and dairy commission after he had made a trip of inspection in the markets. Those fined were the Pendleton Trading company, Clover Leaf, Mays and Rex market. Charges are pending against the Table Supply market, according to a statement from the district attorney's office.

LITHIANS WILL INSPECT POWER PLANT AT COPCO

The Lithians, not the Chamber of Commerce, were invited by Vice-President Paul B. McKee, to inspect the plant of the California-Oregon Power Co. at Copco, and have accepted the invitation. The object of the invitation is to acquaint the booster organizations of the Copco territory with the vast power plant and improvements constructed by the company, as well as the additional power projects now under construction.

Sunday, August 10, is the date set for the visit.

WOMAN IS WIDOWED TWICE BY GALLOWS

MERIDIAN, Miss, July 28. — When the noose claimed the life of Frank Atkinson here Friday for the murder of H. Bryant, in June, 1923, it made Mrs. Atkinson a widow for the second time by the law. Nine years ago her first husband, Allen Westbrook, was hanged in Pike county for the murder of Mr. and Mrs. Columbus Cleveland, father and mother of Mrs. Atkinson.

PORTLAND TO REBUILD STOCK EXHIBIT BUILDING

PORTLAND, July 28. — Work will be started today on a \$500,000 structure to replace the burned building of the Pacific International Livestock exposition, according to an announcement by O. M. Plummer, general manager yesterday. It is expected that it will be completed by November 1, in time for the holding of the annual exposition.

The building will probably be larger than the one which was destroyed Wednesday. It will be of the same general style, according to officials, who voiced the opinion that the purpose of the show were adequately served by the old structure.

TWO BOUND OVER FOR ALLEGED MURDER

KLAMATH FALLS, July 28. — William Stevers and W. M. Johnson, charged with the murder of Frank Brown at Crescent City, July 4th, were bound over to the grand jury by Justice of the Peace R. A. Emmitt. Bond was set at \$1,500.

Stevers and Johnson were arrested on the night of Brown's death, charged with having beaten him to death following a quarrel over a pint of whiskey.

The two accused men and the deceased were itinerant railway workers.

WILL SHIP 7000 HEAD CATTLE FROM KLAMATH

KLAMATH FALLS, July 28. — J. W. Fitzgerald, general superintendent of the Shasta division of the Southern Pacific railroad, and W. H. Kirkbride, maintenance engineer, passed through Klamath Falls yesterday for Skookum, the present terminus of the Eugene-Klamath road, 75 miles north of here, where plans will be worked out by the rail chiefs for handling new freight tonnage which will be developed this year on the line.

The principal shipments anticipated are 7000 beef cattle being fattened on the Big Marsh and the country tributary to the Williamson river. The cattle shipments will total near 300 cars and extensive stockyard and shipping facilities will be required.

As the result of a squabble Saturday night in Rankin Estes' Pool Hall South Front St., Jack

Clayton and Willard Caldwell, are now in the county jail at Jacksonville. Both men were bound over to the grand jury on \$500 bail yesterday in the local justice court, Clayton on a charge of hitting Caldwell over the head with a billiard cue and Clayton on a charge of pointing a gun at Caldwell.

Clayton claims that he hit Caldwell in self-defense, when he saw signs of Caldwell pulling a gun out of his pocket.

Friends of Caldwell claim he left the pool room, after being attacked by Clayton, returned a short time afterwards with a gun for self-protection.

Night officer J. H. Leggett made the arrests of the two men, both of whom are transients. Witnesses of the fracas included Horace Roberts and Victor Daily.

THE COMPANY

The history of The California Oregon Power Company shows a substantial growth in facilities and earnings resulting from the large sums of money invested in its properties and from the development of the territory which it serves.
