TIMBER COMPANY WILL ERECT NEW TOWN

YREKA, Cal., July 28.—The Standard Lumber Company of Butte Valley is now digging its pond, surveying and staking out the grounds for its new lumber town, about 16 miles southwest of Dorris, and will likely be known as Standard City, a name that has been aptly suggested. This is according to word received here this week.

The town will be laid out with broad streets and modern cottages will be constructed next Spring and Summer. As about 2,500 people are to inhabit the place as soon as it is ready, a large force of builders will be put on. It is understood that this Fall the new mill of large capacity will be built. The old mill, upon the completion of the new, will be abandoned.

Unique Sticker—

A windshield sticker of unique design has been adopted by Roseburg and will soon be adorning the windshields of many motorists who pass through that city. The sticker was designed by J. R. Harvey, of this city, who is earning somewhat of a reputation as a designer of these. The center of the sticker is an Indian head, very artistically drawn, and with strongly outlined features. The features in his headpiece represent various resources each being named such as fishing, hunting, grain, timber, mining, dairying, etc., seventeen in all being enumerated. Across the top appears the words "Roseburg Oregon" and underneath "Umpqua Valley." "I Am Satisfied", and at the very bottom "Chamber of Commerce."—Grants Pass Courier.

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STATE PAYS \$7,785

INTEREST DAILY revenue consists of 75 per cent of the moneys received from motor vehicle licenses which in 1923 amounted to \$4,069,609.40 and the highway proportion of which amounted to \$4,052,207.05; a tax of 3 cents a gallon on the sales of gasoline and distillate, which in 1923 yielded approximately \$2,078,741.55, and a revenue of one fourth of a mill from state tax, which amounted in 1923 to \$252,374.79. Thus the total revenue of this fund for 1923 was \$5,383,232.39 and this revenue is increasing annually with the increase of motor vehicles.

Revenue Sufficient "The maintenance cost of the state highway system for the year 1923," Myers points out, "was \$1,046,253.00, leaving \$4,337,079.39, which figure may safely be taken as an average and provides ample revenue for interest payment and the redemption of bonds and leaves some surplus for new construction."

SACRAMENTO TEAM

EXPLAINS FAILURE

TO APPEAR JULY 4

That the Sacramento baseball team of the Southern Pacific did not appear in Ashland on July Fourth, as advertised, for the reason that no definite arrangements had been made, and for the reason that the Sacramento team did not have a clear understanding of financial arrangements, and did not wish to be "holding the sack", is the statement of F. L. Briggs, manager of the team, in a letter to H. R. Demmon, manager of the Portland team.

A carbon copy of Mr. Briggs' letter to Mr. Demmon was sent the Tidings, and explains the Sacramento team's position very adequately.

Due to its length, the letter cannot be reproduced in full, but portions of it are printed to explain the Sacramento team's position:

"Beginning with the first letter quoted, would like to draw your attention to some of the salient points in the case, together with my view of those facts:

"In your first letter you state that 'I understand that each team will raise its own expenses.' I understand from very good authority that your team's expenses were paid by business men of Ashland. This is mentioned because of the fact that you never answered the paragraph in my letter of May 28th, asking advice as to what arrangements you had made with the Committee and whether it was your intention to charge admission at the game. You either would not or could not answer my wire asking the same question, which answer was daily awaited until insufficient time remained to figure on making the trip, and it was my belief that you had dropped the matter, not even extending the courtesy of answering our correspondence.

It appeared, and this conjecture is strengthened by the fact that your expenses were paid by the committee, that if this was the only attraction to be held in Ashland on the Fourth of July, that either a purse would be provided by the Fourth of July Committee or else a general admission would be charged and this team certainly had a right to be informed as to what share we would receive if such were the case. It certainly is not the practice of baseball teams to travel 350 miles and make arrangements upon arrival, as suggested in your letter of June 7th. Please understand that this team did not demand any remuneration whatsoever, but that if any receipts were forthcoming we desired our share. We had not yet purchased uniforms, which would be a necessary expense in connection with the proposed trip, and if no means were forthcoming from this game to assist in defraying that expense, we should then have to find recourse in some other manner to raise the funds. Therefore, it was necessary to know a sufficient time in advance just what arrangements you had made, and it would seem to savor of sharp practice on your part not to have notified us as to this point.

Be that as it may, in looking over the entire file I find no definite statement that the game was to be played or any definite promise that we would make an appearance. The whole proposition was tentative as far as we were concerned, and if you have any definite promise that we would make an appearance. I should be very glad to have the facts. True, you stated what train you would arrive in Ashland on, but in the same letter you asked that we furnish you the same information, which we could not furnish until definite arrangements had been made, and at no time did we set a time for arrival.

ALABAMA SHERIFF TO

TAKE CAMERON BACK

PORTLAND, July 28.—Oliver Cameron, haunted for 22 years with the thought that he was a murderer and who tried to still his remorse in a leap from the Portland Steel bridge about ten days ago, must play a role after all in the "murder" episode. He was taken this morning to Birmingham, Ala., to answer to a charge of assault with intent to kill.

After Cameron was released from the river by a passing boat he grieved for days as a patient in the emergency hospital over the "murder" which he insisted he was guilty of despite efforts of police to locate the crime and the victim. However, the Birmingham case came to light in which it was learned that Cameron has assaulted W. J. Gay in a fight that occurred near the Alabama city.

At first it was believed no action would be taken, but Gay, now 81 years old, put forth yearning for vengeance and so Cameron will face trial for a crime of years ago.
