AN UNENVIABLE POSITION

While clever attorneys, the best legal minds that money can hire, are staging a sensational fight in Chicago to save the lives of young Richard Loeb and young Nathan Leopold; while the boys upset carefully laid plans by declaring to reporters that they "don't give a damn if old Franks and his family eek tomorrow," there sits in the background of America's most sensational court case, Judge Caverly, in whose hands rest the lives of the two admitted cold-blooded murderers.

Of all the figures in the case, Judge Caverly occupies the least enviable position. When all the sensational charges and counter charges have been made, one man will decide the fate of the two who killed for sport. If he believes the murders insane, his is one authoritative voice against the millions who demand the death sentence. Only the highest character, backed by the fullest majesty of the judicial robes, would pronounce a life sentence instead of death. Denunciations from the press, possibly a recall election will face Judge Caverly if he is convinced the boys are mentally irresponsible and has courage in his convictions.

Should the Judge side with the State, and pronounce the maximum penalty, he will be the target of cranks who will bewail the fate of the "superintellectuals."

The position of Judge Caverly is without doubt the most difficult in which an American judge has ever been placed. For the first time in history, one man will decide a case which a nation watches with breathless interest, and that one man has no one but himself to consult or fall back on.

THE RADIO'S FUTURE

Crepe hangers are predicting that the radio craze is booked to fizzle out. They are wrong. Unquestionably, interest in the radio, is experiencing a slump at the present time. It is only a natural reaction, due for most part to the fact that to those who grasp only a few of its possibilities, it is becoming commonplace. Only a few months ago it was heralded as a marvel as great as though a man had arrived from Mars.

Manufacturers of radio equipment are of the opinion that the slump in wireless enthusiasm is due in part to the summer season. Their theory is that most people desire to spend the evenings out of doors, and they predict that the autumn will bring a revival of interest.

An old handbill comes to light in the East advertising one of the early demonstrations of the telephone at the city hall in Lawrence, Massachusetts, May 28, 1887. The handbill reads:

"The miracle telephone! Wonderful discovery of the ages! Prof. A. Graham Bell, assisted by Mr. Frederick A. Gower, will give a wonderful exhibition of his miraculous discovery, the Telephone, before the people of Lawrence, when Boston and Lawrence will be connected via the Western Union Telegraph, and vocal and instrumental music and conversation will be transmitted a distance of 27 miles and received by the audience at the city hall. Prof. Bell will give an explanatory lecture with this marvelous exhibition."

The telephone at that day was considered a marvel and swept popular fancy overnight. Then it suffered a slump. Many predicted that it would never develop into commercial use and that it would soon pass the way of countless other inventions of that and preceding times, just as similar predictions are being made now with respect to the radio. But the telephone became one of the greatest blessings of mankind, as will the radio. The radio, weird and as marvelous as it seems, is still in its infancy as was Bell's telephone in 1877.

WHEN CIVILIZATION QUAKES

Threat of the passing of General Smedley Butler as director of public safety of Philadelphia is a discouraging omen.

Philadelphia has experienced difficulty with its criminals. Crime was openly and successfully carried on there until recently. Vice was not under control. Conditions went from bad to worse until General Butler was inducted into office as director of public safety.

Since that time Philadelphia has been the battleground between crooked politicians, representing the underworld, and General Butler. Every device known to crooks and politicians has been employed to effect the removal of the director of public safety. He has refused to yield. And he has, in six months, cut crime to less than one half in the Pennsylvania metropolis. But the politicians have kept up the fight until, recent reports say, General Butler may be removed.

His removal would not only be a blight on the name of Philadelphia, but it would be a scandal in the eyes of the entire country. It would mean that the underworld

and the petty politicians are stronger than the law. It would mean that vice and crime in the larger cities can not be controlled. When that point is reached, chaos comes into being and civilization hangs by a thread.—Oregon Daily Journal.

CORRECTION

Editor Tidings:—I noticed the Tidings comment on the agates I exhibited at your office. It contains some errors which I desire to correct. Your reporter did not fully understand me.

FIRST, the headline is as follows: "Agates and Jasper found in shale rock." These agates and jaspers are NOT FOUND IN Shale Rock. They are found, generally on and near the surface of the ground that overlies the shale.

SECOND, I am quoted as saying that these stones are formed of silica, "WHICH THE OCEAN CARRIED IN SOLUTION and deposited when it covered this territory." Your reporter misunderstood me. It is regarded as true that agates, and other formations of like character, are formed from silica held in solution, but not in the OCEAN water. The water that deposits this material is believed to be water heated, perhaps by volcanic action, and, coming in contact with these mineral substances dissolves them, in which condition they are held in solution until they reach some crevice, or cavity, where they are deposited in the forms we find them. Chemical action, that is continually going on in these operations because of the varied character of the dissolved mineral contents, produces these variegated stones, called Agate, Jasper, Chalcedony and other forms, the chief contents of which is silica.

If the water is not charged with impurities, but simply with pure silica the deposit will be without coloring matter and will be a pure white, sometimes slightly opalescent. Dark, brown, and yellowish markings that make agates so attractive come, generally, from oxide of iron held in the solution. It must be remembered that the earth contains every mineral substance known, whether liquid, gaseous, or solid, and that all are subject to change produced chemically in the earth. Many of these mineral substances and gasses, when dissolved and held in solution in super heated water, enhance the power of such water to further decompose the harder mineral substances, like silica. In this condition the hot water percolating through the crevices and veins, gathers constantly all kinds of mineral which, when deposited and consolidated produce the great variety of water formations, that differ from each other, because of this mingling of substances, and are given different names dependent on their content.

Pardon me for the space I have taken in this explanation. I am prompted to it because I note so much of misunderstanding, or rather, lack of any kind of understanding along these lines, and besides, I do not wish to be made responsible for expressions so entirely out of line with present scientific understanding. ELK'S PLUNGE OVER BANK IS FATAL

WHEELER, Or., July 28.—A buck elk, frightened at sight of several persons, leaped over a bank and fell about 40 feet, landing on a rock ledge so forcibly that it was killed Friday near Earl Parker's North Fork camp. The animal was running ahead of Parker's automobile and almost entered the camp.

Frank Patchell immediately notified Game Warden Smith, who took the carcass away. It was a 4-year-old buck weighing around 900 pounds. Its horns were in the velvet and perfect. Elk are numerous hereabouts and either because of the dry weather or because no one hunts them, are becoming quite tame.

TWO ESCAPED OREGON CONVICTS ARE TAKEN

SALEM, July 28.—Robert Burns and Dale Arthur, two of a trio of convicts who escaped from the state prison brick yard here July 3, have been captured at Ogden, Utah, according to telegraphic information received by Warden Dalrymple Friday night. William Anderson, the third escape, is still at large. Burns was serving a term of 15 years for assault and robbery, sent up from Marion county March 24, 1923. Arthur was received at the prison, September 30, 1922, from Clatsop county to serve a term of five years for burglary.

DUNSMUIR-REDDING DETOUR IS GOOD

DUNSMUIR, July 28.—The California State Automobile association is anxious to correct erroneous reports being circulated among tourists that the highway and detours between here and Redding are dangerous for travel.

The detour is in excellent condition and there are no ruts and the road is wide enough for two cars to meet and pass without difficulty. It is kept sprinkled to keep down the dust.

The highway is in good condition also. It is not sprinkled and there is considerable dust.

REDDING REPORTS A DEATH OF INFANTS

REDDING, Calif., July 28.—Face suicide apparently has hit Redding for four weeks, or until yesterday. Not a single baby was born in this city, though the average for the past year has been one a day.

The baby born yesterday really does not belong in Redding, the mother coming here from Millville for the event. Prior to that the last baby arrived in Redding on June 27th.

GRANTS PASS TO BE CONVENTION CITY

GRANTS PASS, July 28.—Grants Pass was unanimously selected for the 1925 convention city by the Oregon State Press Association, which held its final session at Tillamook last Saturday. Hall Hoss, of Oregon City, was re-elected President of the association on Saturday.

"PUSSYFOOT" JOHNSON TO REFORM MOSLEM WORLD

NEW YORK, July 29.—W. E.

"Pussyfoot" Johnson, prohibition crusader, who sailed on the liner Leviathan yesterday, said he expected to devote his efforts during the next few years to an attempt to convert the Moslem world to abstinence from alcohol. He would be assisted, he said, by English prohibitionists in a campaign in Egypt and India. Johnson said that while the Mohammedan peoples did not use wines, they were "great whisky drinkers."

Irregular teeth do not "occlude" properly—that is the grinding surfaces do not come together. Hence there is poor mastication of the food, and consequently a lowered power of digestion and assimilation. Hence again, a general deficiency in the development and "tone" of the entire body. The bones and muscles of the jaws suffer also from this general malnutrition, and the teeth become even more irregular and lacking in their essential salts, as a consequence. The bones that support the teeth do not grow large enough to accommodate all of them in the normal position.

In some cases the jaw bones are so small that many of the teeth cannot find a place to come through at all, and they remain impacted in the jaw giving rise in later life to chronic neuralgias, headaches and many grave nervous and physical disorders.

Such a condition may even give rise to that agonizing condition known to doctors as the doloureux. This is characterized by a twitching of the facial muscles on the side affected, accompanied by the most terrible pain known to human beings, with possible exception of angina pectoris. Or it may produce conditions which find their expressions in various reflex actions such as twitching of the muscles and limbs, or even such grave disorders as melancholia.

Again, the normal physiological relations between the mouth and the nose are also affected, causing a profound disturbance in the function of the breathing apparatus, and resulting in the narrowing of the air passages. This causes mouth breathing. The air enters the lungs improperly warmed, unfiltered and unmoistened. The blood is insufficiently supplied with oxygen. Shoulders become rounded, chest flat, faulty positions in standing and sitting are acquired, resulting in many cases, in spinal curvature.

Most serious of all, the brain does not develop properly, and the mentality of the child suffers. Also, irregular teeth are kept clean with great difficulty, and the problem of repairing or replacing them later becomes more complex for the dentist.
