OVER 100 CARS AT ASHLAND AUTO CAMP

With the exception of the night of July 4, when many persons from Medford, Grants Pass and other valley points stopped at the Ashland auto camp, making a total of 129 cars, last night was the biggest this year. 107 cars, representing only five states stopped. There were fifty-seven cars, and over 200 persons, from California. There were seven cars from Oregon, two from Illinois, four from Washington, and one from North Dakota. The North Dakota machine was driven by A. K. Krohn, of Williston.

Beside this number, there were twenty-nine cars of hold-overs from the day before.

BABY ISLAND HAS NO APPARENT OWNER

SOUTH BEND, Wash., July 28.—Baby island, a three-acre, semi-wooded tract above tide water in Shoalwater bay, is apparently without an owner. At least consistent efforts to find one have been without avail to C. E. Thew, manager of the South Bend and Raymond exchanges of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company.

The state of Washington, through Clarke V. Savidge, informs Thew that the land very likely belonged to the federal government if above the highest high tide land. But when Thew offered to purchase it from Uncle Sam, government authorities wanted to be shown that it belonged to the United States. Land Commissioner Savidge's statement did not suffice.

Affidavits must be presented from Willapa harbor residents that the island belonged to the government and was at its approximate present elevation at the time Washington was admitted to the Union. Finally one was secured but the government asked for two more. It was too much for Thew — he has temporarily ceased negotiations.

POPULAR OFFICER MAKES LAST VISIT

Major Dusenberry in Ashland For Last Time in Official Capacity; Given "Feed"

Major Dusenberry, one of the most popular officers ever attached to the Oregon National Guard was in Ashland for the last time in his official capacity last night when he attended the regular drill of the Ashland company.

After several years of service in Oregon, the Major is going back "in the line," to assume command of a battalion in the regular army. Before that, he will attend military schools at different forts.

Major Dusenberry occasionally visited Ashland in his official capacity, and was extremely popular with both officers and men. Whenever drill attendance fell off, he was sent down to see that it was picked up again, and he usually accompanied the inspecting officer when annual inspection was held.

Last night, the Ashland company gave a "feed" in his honor at the army. Another feature of last night's drill was quarterly pay day, when over \$800 in pay checks were given out.

At the annual encampment this summer, Major Dusenberry earned a place for himself in the hearts of the Oregon artillerymen at Fort Casey when he spent his vacation at camp with the boys.

SALVATION ARMY TO START DRIVE SOON

That a drive in Ashland for \$2000, to be used in Salvation Army relief work will begin August 1, and continue until August 9, was the statement this morning of one of the workers, Captain Graves, campaign man for Oregon will be in Ashland to assist in the drive, it was announced.

A statement of relief work accomplished in Ashland during the past twelve months shows that the army has given 131 persons meals, 65 lodging, 297 groceries, 170 Christmas dinner, 220 clothing, found employment for 88, interviewed 199 persons, and received five girls at the rescue home. The total number of persons helped in Ashland is 1,175. To carry on the work next year, the drive for funds is being made.

MINISTER'S MISSING SON FOUND IN NAVY

THE DALLES, July 29.—Howard Bogue, son of Pastor John L. Bogue of the First Baptist church here, for whom a coast-wide search has been made in the interests of his parents for the past fortnight, is enlisted in the radio branch of a naval organization, it was stated in a communication received here during the past week. Young Bogue dropped from sight a few weeks and it was feared he had drowned.

JAPANESE MAY LEASE HOTELS, IS RULING

SALEM, July 29.—Japanese may lawfully lease hotels or apartment houses, either directly or indirectly, under the Oregon law, according to Attorney General Van Winkle, who has so advised Herbert Gordon of Portland, state representative from Multnomah county. In his opinion Van Winkle points out that this right is guaranteed under existing treaties between the United States and Japan. The treaty leaves the right of the ownership or leasing of agricultural lands by Japanese to individual states.

WHITE MAN'S BRIDE IS HALF CHINESE

WEAVERVILLE, Calif., July 29.—While a state law prohibits the marriage of Mongolians and whites, the marriage of George S. Hayes, confessed bootlegger, and Mrs. Isabelle Thomas, commonly called Chinese, in this place last Friday was made possible because Mrs. Thomas is only half Chinese, County Clerk Carter, in issuing the license, held that inasmuch as Mrs. Thomas was half Chinese, she was white rather than Mongolian. She was born and reared in this country.

It was a bit out of ordinary that Justice of the Peace Barber, who fined Hayes \$250 early in the week, should be acceptable at the close of the week to officiate at the wedding.

Hayes is aged 62 and his bride 52. They will make their home near Buckhorn station.
