WILL DEVOTE LIFE TO FINDING MOTHER

however, after hearing of the plight of John Lester Butler, nineteen year old Washington boy.

For eighteen years Butler has given the love and devotion of a son to Mr. and Mrs. Charles T. Butler, whom he thought were his parents. Now he has discovered that they are not of kin to him. Although Mrs. Butler has filled the place of a mother to him, young Butler's heart, after nineteen years, cries for the woman who bore him, who answered not when police were trying to find her and restore to her the six-day old John Lester Butler who was abandoned on a Washington doorstep on March 13, 1905.

The discovery of the foundling was given wide publicity at that time. All efforts to find the mother were without result.

Now, with positive proof from the Board of Children's Guardians that he is not the son of the Butlers, the youth is endeavoring to find his blood mother.

The youth believes his name to be Chester Benton, or Fenton. He has nothing tangible on which to base that assumption.

The person who put him on the doorstep of a boarding house left him in a chip-basket. There was no note pinned to the baby clothes.

The finder of the basket and its baby was Alexis Marceron, who lived in that house. Young Butler has found him as the first step in his search, but Marceron was unable to give him a clew to his parents.

Butler now is employed by a telephone company. He married Doris Palmer, daughter of the superintendent of a Washington department store.

"I know my real mother has not forgotten me," he said. "I am going to search for her the rest of my life."
