ROSEBURG, July 30. — Jose Osuno, a Mexican section hand, was drowned late yesterday, while swimming near the old brickyard in this city. Officers are investigating Refugio Basques and Aljo Muello, who are suspected of having plundered the dead man's clothing after the accident.

Both witnessed the drowning but the occurrence was not reported for some time, and as neither of the Mexicans who saw the accident could swim nothing was done to save Osuno. He was known to have money and a good watch in his clothing but they are missing.

SAYS OREGONIANS USE MORE OREGON PRODUCT

That a decided tendency of Oregonians to patronize Oregon products has been noted in the past few years was the statement today of G. E. Nelson, district sales manager of Nestle's Food Company.

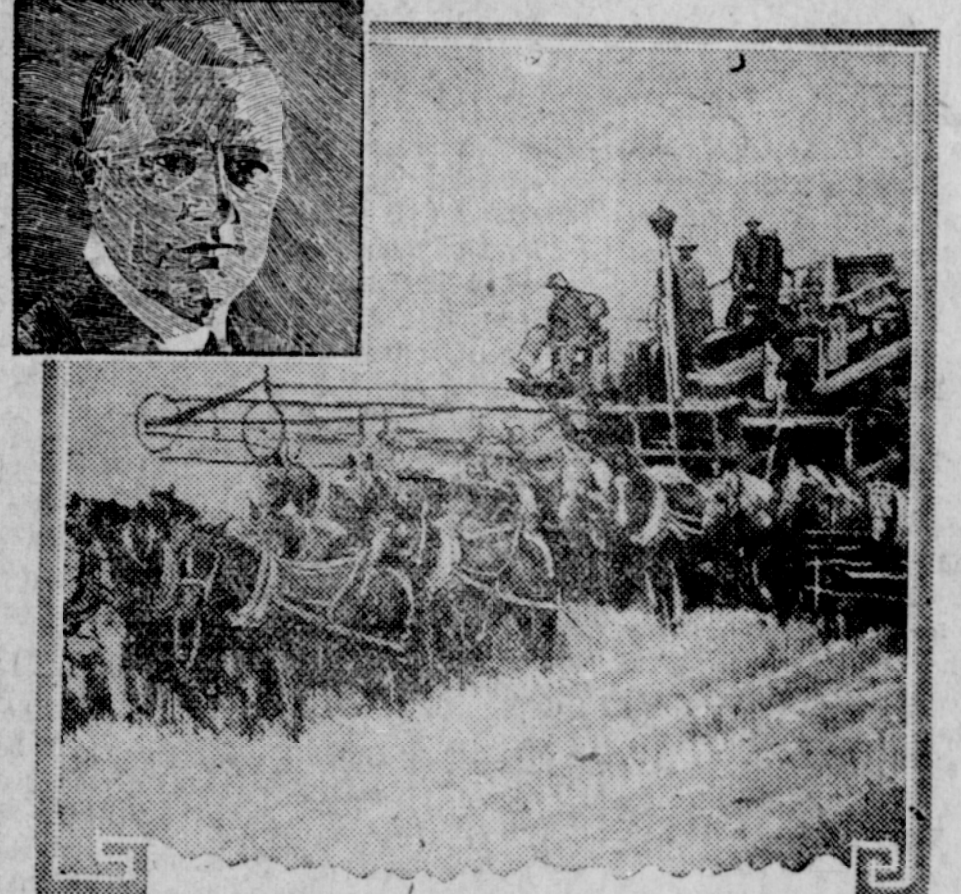
