OBITUARY Eli Albert, born March 20, 1837, Lower Mt. Bethel township, Northampton county, Pennsylvania; died August 5, 1924, 7 P. M. His parents were of German birth; the father, John Albert living to be 91 years of age and blessed with 15 children, Eli Albert being the 8th born of six boys and 9 sisters. Survived by a sister, Elizabeth Mosser, of Mechanicsburg, Pa., the youngest of the family.

Sarah E. Albert, wife of Eli Albert, departed her life November 22, 1898, being blessed with four sons and two daughters; two sons and two daughters now living. One daughter in Ashland, the other in California; one son in Central Point, Oregon and the other in Ashland, Oregon.

Eli Albert, a member of the Burnside Post No. 23 G. A. R., Ashland, in good standing, was a teacher by occupation and at the age of 25, Mr. Albert taught school in the "Pokonos" in Pa., when he volunteered his services to his country in the Civil War in 1862 and served 9 months as sergeant, Co. K, 153rd Regiment of the Pennsylvania Volunteers, being honorably discharged in July 1863 and in 1865 was married to Saran E. Ackerman. He was engaged in the tanning business in Pennsylvania, where they lived and where two sons were born. Then they came to Iowa, near Red Oak, with near \$500 to the good in 1868, and withstood the hardships of frontier life with patience, being "dried out," "huffed out," "drowned out" and eaten out, slick and clean, by grasshoppers.
