TOOLMAKER SUES HENRY FORD FOR \$500,000

DETROIT, Aug. 7.—Warren W. Ayers, a toolmaker, who charges that he engineered the deal whereby the stock owned by John and Horace Dodge was sold to the Ford interests in 1919 for \$26,000,000, filed suit today in the Wayne circuit court against the Ford Motor Company for \$500,000.

Ayers in his petition claims that he worked for six months negotiating the sale and then had to return to his trade as a toolmaker in the Ford plant without a commission.

TRENCH MOUTH DISEASE FATAL TO WOMAN

MARSHFIELD, Aug. 7.—Mrs. Albina Anderson, of Haynes Inlet, died at the Keizer hospital of trench mouth disease. The disease, as relatives of Mrs. Anderson had been afflicted, although they recovered. Mrs. Anderson leaves five small children.

MEDFORD MAN BEATEN BY WOULD-BE THUG

MEDFORD, Aug. 7.—At his home on King's Highway lies Rankin Estes, proprietor of a Medford soft drink establishment. Rankin is battered and bruised about the head as the result of a desperate encounter with a highwayman early Sunday morning. According to Estes, he was riding a bicycle home when another man rode up and told him to hold up his hands. Estes had \$900, the day's receipts, in his pocket, and not wishing to lose it, swung at the bandit, who shot at him, but missed. Estes was hit over the head with the butt-end of the gun, and one ear was nearly torn off. After fighting some time, the assailant took Estes' bicycle and rode off.

STREAM DRY FIRST TIME ON RECORD

MILLVILLE, Calif., August 7.—For the first time in sixty-one years, or since the Reinekes settled on Clover Creek east of this place, that stream is bone dry at the Reineke home. At this time last year the creek had eighteen inches of rapidly flowing water.

WIND IS BLAMED FOR FATAL PLUNGE

RENO, Nev., Aug. 7.—A violent gust of wind striking the wings of his plane at an altitude of 600 feet caused the death of William Blanchfield, aerial mail pilot, in Reno Friday afternoon. Such was the evidence given by witnesses at the coroner's inquest. Eyewitnesses said Blanchfield strove to right the plane, which dropped into a nose dive and crashed into the home of A. B. McKinley, bailiff in the district court, after falling through a network of telephone and electric light wires.

Blanchfield is believed to have been killed instantly by a terrific blow on his forehead from the control lever before the plane struck. The coroner's jury found death was due to an unavoidable airplane accident.

VICTIM OF RIFLE SHOT IN CRITICAL CONDITION

HOOD RIVER, August 7.—William Gallantne, White Salmon rancher, accidentally shot in the abdomen by a young brother-in-law last Thursday while trying out a new rifle, is in a critical condition. An operation after the man arrived here revealed that several intestines had been punctured. Mr. Gallantne is married and has one small child.

GIRL'S BODY FOUND BY DRAGGING LAKE

KLAMATH FALLS, Aug. 7.—The body of Elenor Lindblum was found Monday in Lake Ewauna, near this city. The little girl left her parents, who were camping in the park, and disappeared. The lake was dragged, and the body finally recovered.

MANY UNLICENSED DOGS IN COUNTY

MEDFORD, Aug. 7.—If all the unlicensed dogs in Jackson county were converted into "hot dogs", it is estimated that there would be enough of the popular picnic food to reach across the county fifteen times.

So far this year, about one-half of one percent of the dogs in the county have licenses. There have been 111 licenses issued, while it is estimated that there are over 3000 dogs in Jackson county. Of the dogs licensed, about 85 per cent are hunting dogs, and the remainder are house pets. The common "mutt" is by far the leader in numbers, and is unbothered by license requirements.

MEDFORD BAKER SUES DOCTOR AND HOSPITAL

MEDFORD, Aug. 7.—Suit against Dr. Mc M. Dow and the Medford Hospital society for \$986 special damages and \$7,500 general damages was recently filed in the circuit court by Emil Herschen, Medford baker.

Herschen claims that about March 1, he underwent a surgical operation, and alleges that "a certain sponge, or sponges, and a piece or pieces of surgical gauze" was left in the incision, making another operation by a different surgeon necessary. The defendants have filed a motion asking for information stating the number, size, texture and piece or pieces of surgical gauze" and have demanded that the sponges and gauze be procured.

gar is being marketed, as to ruin the domestic business and thus thwart the plans of American growers.

"It is understood three members of the Tariff Commission have recommended to President Coolidge that the tariff on sugar be cut to \$1.35 a hundred pounds, while two members have filed a minority report urging the tariff be left where it is.

"The newspapers and business men throughout the Northwest should join the farmers in appealing to the President to stand by the minority report as a means of assisting farmers to work out their own salvation, with a profitable cash crop which will benefit greatly the land when grown in rotation with wheat."

Declaring that "all business rests fundamentally on agriculture and can enjoy no permanent prosperity while the farmer is pursuing a policy of economic ruin," President Allen commented North Dakota newspapers which have advocated "production of milk, butter, cheese, eggs, wool, sugar and other farm crops that contain little fertilizing elements", instead of "selling crops taking much fertility from the soil."

Health Hints
by the
Father of
Physical Culture

Nutrition in its broadest sense embraces not only digestion and assimilation of food, but also the excretion of the end-products of metabolism, and the elimination of tissue waste. The body has but two channels by which building material may enter, the trachea for air and the esophagus for food; there are four by which the unused and excess material as well as waste substances are ejected—the lungs, skin, kidneys and bowels—thus showing that Nature puts twice the stress upon the output that she places upon the intake.

While it is important that the purity and wholesomeness of the air and food supplied the body be ensured, of vastly greater importance is the efficient elimination of the constantly accumulating substances which are of no further use in the economy system. Food left alone will never hurt us, but waste left in the body will surely poison us. Elimination is a function that must be maintained at its highest perfection if normal health is expected. The efficient bowel elimination is an important factor in the prevention of disease and the maintenance of health cannot be disputed as is evidenced by the fact that the relief of chronic constipation often brings about a cure of many chronic conditions.

Often have we seen nervous conditions relieved by correcting faulty bowel elimination, and skin diseases cleared up by the same method.

About eight out of ten cases of chronic disease give a history of constipation. This does not mean, however, that constipation is necessarily a cause of or even a symptom of the disease that is present, but simply that the bowels are weakened along with the other organs of the body. Many people, however, attribute their illness to their constipation, it becoming almost an obsession with them. If it is the one symptom about which they worry and lament.

When the fundamental basis of constipation is clearly understood, and the treatment in accord with the physiology the intestines employed, I believe there is no case, not due to organic causes, that cannot be relieved.

For the purposes of this article we would say that there are but two causes of constipation—nerve and muscular atony.
