GRANTS PASS CHAMBER SECRETARY RESIGNS

GRANTS PASS, Aug. 7.—A. M. Simmons, secretary of the Grants Pass chamber of commerce for nearly a year, has resigned. The resignation will take effect as soon as accepted by the board of directors, and as yet, no arrangements have been made to appoint a successor for the position.

Mr. Simmons resigned due to the fact that he was forced to take back some property recently sold in California, and will have to give all his time to handling it.

DAZED WOMAN IS TRACED BY OFFICERS HARRISBURG, August 7.—The unidentified woman, who was found practically nude and in a dazed condition on the Oregon Electric railway between her and Junction City late Saturday and who is now in a Springfield hospital, is known to have been in this city between 7 and 8 o'clock Friday evening. She asked for food at the home of Will Gillenwater and though she was questioned by ferrymen while hanging on the ferry she would not say a word.

CATTLE MALADY PROVES TO BE VERY COSTLY OAKLAND, August 7.—That the foot and mouth disease in California has cost about \$5,000,000 to date and has made necessary the slaughter of 102,000 head of livestock was the statement made here yesterday by Dr. J. R. Mohler, chief of the bureau of animal industry of the United States Department of Agriculture. He is directing the government campaign against the disease.

There are still 208 men in the campaign, although 14 counties have been released from quarantine, Dr. Mohler said. The farms tested and restocked number 151.

CALIFORNIANS LEAD IN CRATER LAKE TRAVEL KLAMATH FALLS, August 7.—Of 676 tourist cars registering here during the past month, 608 were from California points. Fifteen were from Washington and fifty-three from states through the East and Middle West. With but six exceptions all who registered here were on their way to Crater Lake.

WALLA WALLA CITY EMPLOYEES MUST REGISTER WALLA WALLA, August 7.—Mayor Hill announced today that the city commission has decided to discharge all city employees who are not registered by August 19.

"In this way the commission hopes to aid in the registration campaign now on throughout the state," said the mayor.

SOUTH UMPQUA RIVER IS HELD POLLUTED ROSEBURG, August 7.—Following the filing of an official report by the county health department concerning the bad condition of the water in the South Umpqua river, the city council has instructed the police to prohibit bathing in the stream.

Samples taken from the river at various points between Roseburg and the forks show the stream to be badly contaminated. Further tests are being made up stream from Roseburg.

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THE ONLY WAY Education Pays in Leadership, Influence and Honors

An investigation published by the United States Bureau of Education shows that of all the people in the United States who have performed distinguished service and received high honors that there was:

- One person out of each 150,000 who had no schooling.
One person out of each 37,500 with a common school education.
One person out of each 1,724 with a high school education.
One person out of each 187 with a college education.

The above lines show the comparative chances of no schooling and with the different grades of education. Parents who give their children a common school education give them four times the chance to become a leader and receive distinction that the child with no schooling has. Those who give their children a high school education give them 87 times the chance, and the parents who sacrifice and give their children a college education give them more than 800 times the chance of the child without schooling.—E. J. Bodman in Banker-Farmer.
