FIRST RIPE GRAPES

GRANTS PASS, August 8—The first grapes of the 1924 season were brought to Grants Pass today by George Barton of the Top o' the World ranch, near here. The grapes were of the Sweetwater variety. The Flame Tokays are beginning to color, but will not be ready to market for another month.

PEAR HARVEST AT

Up to yesterday 120 cars of this season's estimated valley crop of 1200 cars had been shipped to eastern markets. Last season's crop was 1820 cars.

She was accused of accepting a married man's attentions. The case is similar to that of Dorothy Grandon of Frederick, Md., recently stripped, beaten and tarred, after being accused of having an affair with a married man.

YOUTH LOSES WAY;

WITHOUT FOOD 36 HOURS

LODI, Calif., August 8—Gus Siebel, 17, is in a serious condition as a result of being lost from his companions while hunting deer in Hospital Canyon near Tracy and walking for thirty-six hours without food and with but little water. His legs are so badly swollen that he cannot stand on his feet. He suffered from heat and thirst also.

His boy companions, James Wood and Lawrence Jones, started a search party for him after he failed to return to camp and found Siebel in a deserted cabin, where stockmen had placed him while they went for help.

PLANE HITS FENCE;

OCCUPANTS UNINJURED

THE DALLES, August 7—An airplane piloted by Kenneth Guyer was partly wrecked last night when a barbed wire fence was struck while landing in a field near here. In the plane with Guyer at the time were two passengers.

Guyer had sought to land in one field, jump the fence and come to a halt in another, but the lower part of the plane caught on a strand of wire, causing the machine to crash to the ground. All of the occupants escaped uninjured.

HALF BREED INDIAN

FUGITIVE IS CAUGHT

KLAMATH FALLS, August 8—Albert Dean, half-breed Indian, an escaped maniac from the California insane asylum at Stockton, was arrested here yesterday evening by Sheriff L. L. Low. Dean will be held here until the arrival of Siskiyou county authorities. Committed to the asylum from Siskiyou county after a murderous assault, this is his third escape. He was at liberty nearly two weeks.

BELIEVE GIRL MET

WITH FOUL PLAY

FALLON, Nev., August 8—Fearing her daughter, Mrs. Gladys Simon, met with foul play while attempting to earn her way to Yakima, Washington, Mrs. H. Ross has appealed to the authorities for assistance.

The aged mother, who with her husband, is stranded in an automobile camp near Fallon, says her daughter and 4 year old granddaughter were deserted at Reno by the husband and father, W. E. Simon.

All the parties in the case formerly lived at Stockton. The young mother is said to have vanished at Winnemucca three months ago after leaving her child with a Reno family.

NEWSPAPER BRINGS

BACK DAYS OF 1898

An interesting side-light on the life of twenty-six years ago is contained in the Fossil Journal, which in the issue of August 1, reprinted some news of 1898. According to the 1896 paper, "Another cut has been made in transcontinental railroad rates. You can now go to Chicago, or come from there, for \$18." Wool, which now brings from 29 to 37 cents a pound, was sold at 14

cents. Dress suits were advertised at \$3.50 and up. One news item said, "The Portland horse canning factory is to start up again in a few days. Dr. Hess, government inspector, will be present to see that only sound meat is put up."

Health Hints
by the
Father of Physical Culture

The habit of judging of the richness and value of milk wholly by fat content is based on a misconception of the relative worth of the various ingredients of whole milk.

The so called richer milks have a little larger percentage of butterfat than others, but if better and green vegetables, be used in the diet as a source of the fat-soluble vitamins there is no particular advantage in using such milks. The milk proteins and milk salts are found in the non-fat elements, or skim-milk portion and these are not so easily replaced as is the fat. Milk and cheese should not be cooked too much. Plan to use a goodly portion of both in your diet uncooked; and when they are cooked do not cook them too long.

The general principle that fresh foods are best may, if interpreted too strictly, shut out the use of many splendid forms of food. Thus milk is unquestionably at its best when it is fresh, but fresh milk contains 87 percent of water and this limits its use in cooking to watery dishes, or to those containing only a small quantity of it. The various processes by which part or all of the water is removed from milk greatly increase the range of dishes into which it can be introduced.

In your own kitchen you cannot take the water out of milk, except by excessive boiling and this would lower its nutritive value and probably burn it. Therefore, in all recipes where the large water content of the milk is objectionable, you will do well to use the more concentrated forms of prepared milk.

The most common of these are the so-called "evaporated" canned milks. The better brands are of high quality. Being prepared in dairy regions, they have probably suffered less deterioration than the average milk as received in cities. Evaporated milk can be used freely in all cookery.
