STRAIGHT TALKS WITH AUNT EMMY ON INVESTING THE LEGACY

"I really wish I could understand investments, Aunt Emmy," said Jana. "Since we received that legacy I have tried to get some money sense into my head. The financial pages in the papers are just a jumble of words to me. I can't make out the difference between stocks and bonds nor for the life of me see what makes one thing an investment and another a speculation."

Aunt Emmy laughed. "Lots of people puzzle over those things, my dear. But your first problem is simple enough," she said. "Suppose you buy a bond, a \$100 Liberty Bond. What you really do is to lend Uncle Sam \$100 on his promise to pay that money back on a given date and to pay you a specified sum each year—that is, interest—for the use of your money. If your \$100 bond pays four and a quarter per cent you get four dollars and a quarter every year you hold it until it reaches maturity—that is, the date when the time of your loan is up and Uncle Sam returns your money."

"When a bond reaches maturity it should be turned over to your bank for collection, because after maturity you will get no more interest on the money invested. Therefore when a bond matures take it to your bank, have the money placed to your account and

consult your banker about reinvesting it.

"Of course, all bonds are not good securities. If you buy the bonds of a sound government or of a sound corporation you are safe. Bonds vary in price, even good ones, according to conditions. Unless you really know about the condition of the concern or government offering bonds do not buy them without consulting your bankers."

"When you buy stocks you buy a share of a business. Corporations issue stocks as well as notes and bonds, but governments only issue bonds or notes. You do not get any promise that your money will be paid back when you buy stock. To get your money back you have to find a buyer for your stock. If the business prospers you participate in the profits according to the amount of stock you hold. If the business suffers losses you share the loss with the rest of the stockholders. So again it is not wise to buy stock in a company you do not know all about unless you first get your banker's advice."

"Thanks, Aunt Emmy. I think I know the difference between stocks and bonds now," Jana said. "If you buy stock you buy a share of a business and take your chances with that business for success or loss. If you buy a bond you really don't buy at all, only get a sort of receipt for your money and promise that you will get it back at a given time and receive interest meanwhile."

"Yes—but remember the promise behind a bond is good only if the government or the corporation issuing the bond is good," said Aunt Emmy. "Next time you come I'll tell you more about money and finance."—ANNA B. AYMES.

INDIANS WERE PYGMIES OR ELSE CUT OFF LEGS

COSHOCOTON, Ohio, Aug. 12.—That a race of pygmies once inhabited Ohio, or else Indians, who may have populated the village, observed a custom of cutting off the legs of their dead at the knee, for the purpose of deceiving as to height, is indicated by skeletons found at Rock Run, near here.

This is the opinion voiced by members of the Coshocton high school historical class, who are preparing a dramatization of Coshocton County history, under the direction of Dr. A. E. Wagner, Ohio State University.

The skeletons according to information obtained by the class members, were not more than four feet in height. All of the skeletons lay in the same position with head to the west.

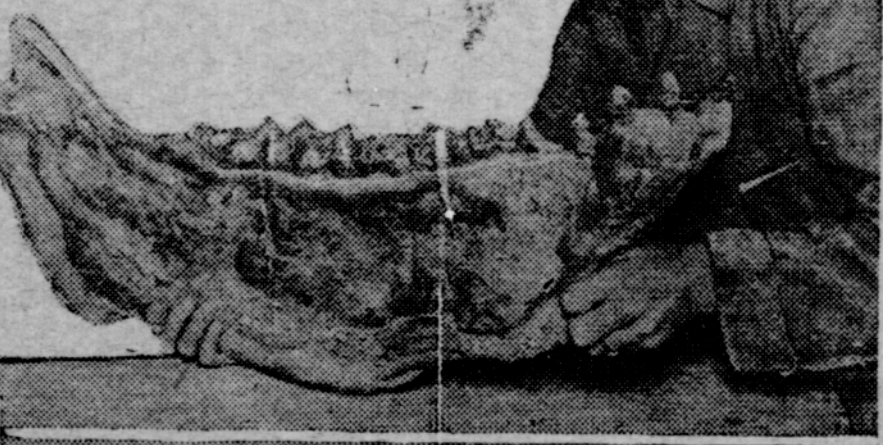

Fossil Teeth Preserved for Ages

FOSSIL OF 6,000,000 YEARS OLD TEETH.



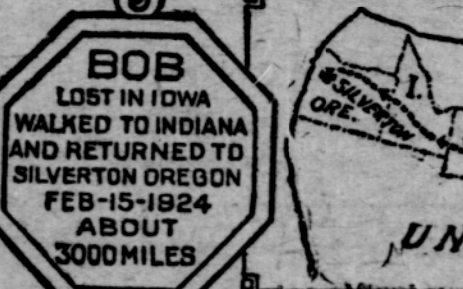
Nature for more than 6,000,000 years—so the scientists tell us—has preserved in remarkable fashion the lower jaw and teeth of a giant Titanotheres, which lived in the Eastern hemisphere many glacial ages ago. The jaw was found on a recent Asiatic expedition in Mongolia.

This extinct species resembles somewhat the present-day rhinoceros, only it was of a much larger type. J. McK. Young, fossil expert and assistant to Roy Chapman Andrews, noted explorer, is pictured cleaning the prehistoric jaw of the Titanotheres.

Dog Travels Three Thousand Miles to Home and Gets Medal

Bob, a Scotch collie, recently traveled approximately 3,000 miles to return to his home in Oregon after



having been lost in the middle west. Its owners had taken it with them on an automobile trip, and while they were crossing Iowa, Bob strayed away. After an unsuccessful search, they went on to Indiana and then, drove back to the Pacific coast, never expecting to see their pet again. Six months after their return, Bob came trotting home, weak from fatigue, footsore and with claws worn short. It developed that the animal had trailed the automobile from Iowa to Indiana and then had started back on the long trip to Oregon. The state humane society, after investigation, presented the dog with a medal and school children petitioned the village council to give it the freedom of the streets for the rest of its life.

Weather Superstitions Are Disproved by Science

Several common superstitions concerning the weather have been dispelled by the weather bureau at Washington. In both Europe and America there is an old belief that a severe storm—the so-called "equinoctial gale"—is due about the date of either equinox, that is, March 21 or Sept. 22.

According to scientists there is no maximum of storm frequency either in this country or abroad close to the date of either equinox. Of course, in the long run, storms do occur about these dates, just as they occur at all other times in the

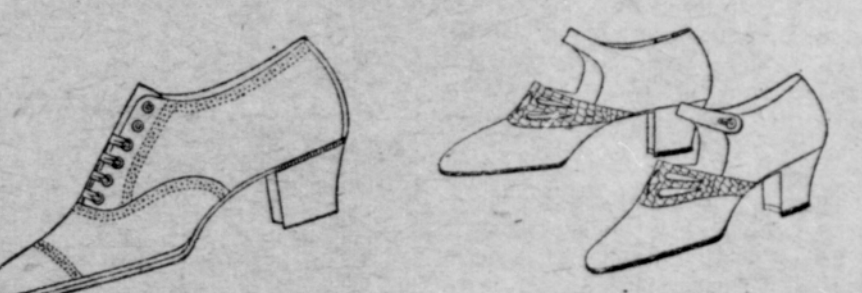
Handy Orchard Ladder

Pruning and fruit picking can be accomplished in a shorter time and with less damage to the trees with the specially devised ladder shown in the illustration, than is possible with the use of an old-style ladder. Upon the upper end of a common ladder a forked extension, made from a length of 2 by 2-in. oak and two lengths of wire iron, is hinged to swing up and down. It is controlled from below by a lever and ratchet fastened to the side of the ladder, about 4 ft. from the lower end, a discarded cultivator lever being used for the purpose. The lever is connected to the extension by means of a 1/2-in. steel rod, so that the movement of the lever causes a corresponding movement of the extension. The object of the extension is to hold the ladder at convenient distances from the trunk so that any part of the branches can be reached. The extension, being inserted in a crotch, will form a safe support and
