FIRE LOSSES IN STATE TOTAL \$908,410

SALEM, Aug. 13.—Fire losses in Oregon, exclusive of Portland, during the month of July aggregated \$908,410, according to a report prepared here today by the state fire marshal's department. The two most disastrous fires were at Baker and Rainier. Each of these fires resulted in a loss of \$200,000. There were a total of 108 fires reported. The case of 25 of these fires was not given in the report.

Health Hints by the Father of Physical Culture

When the child reaches school age, the mother, especially in rural communities where visiting nurses and health officers are conspicuous by their absence, should be most vigilant in the matter of proper provision for the child's health.

We all remember the old-fashioned, low desk over which the child would be required to sprawl or stoop interminable hours every day. There is not a particle of doubt that thousands of cases of spinal curvature and prolaps of the abdominal organs have resulted from the manner of sitting and entirely unjustifiable contrivances for the torture of youth.

Thousands of cases of eyestrain and chronic disorders of the eye have had their beginnings in the abuse of the eye during the child's school life, because of the neglect to insure proper seating and lighting facilities.

Another point of great importance to the child in school is that it answer the calls of Nature when they arise. Failure to do so may lead to serious disorders of the bladder or kidneys through the retention of poisons, of the digestive apparatus and the entire organism. It may result, too, in chronic constipation, for there is no precaution against this troublesome complaint which it is more necessary to observe than the practice of evacuating the bowels at the first intimation that this is needed.

KILLING SQUIRRELS ADVISED BY AGENT

"There is a good supply of poison barley that can be obtained at cost in various parts of the county and there is no reason why every farmer should not make a special effort during the next week to poison all the squirrels that he can find.

Free Poison Furnished

"The government will furnish poison free of charge to any farmer who will poison government land. All that is necessary is to send description of land to the county agent's office and poison will be supplied for this purpose. Notices have been given with reference to poisoning diggers and the county can now enter upon any premises that have not been poisoned and carry on this work and charge the owner of the land with cost of it. This work will be started after this campaign has been going and the owners have had an opportunity to cover their lands."
