Chances for Recovery Good
LOS ANGELES, Aug. 4. — Norman Ross and Mr. and Mrs. Sam Schapp, who were shot yesterday by Kid McCoy, following his alleged murder of Mrs. Teresa Mors, have fair chances of recovery, according to attending physicians. Of the three, Ross is the most seriously injured, but it is believed his chances for recovery are good.

A peculiar situation in connection with what came near being a quadruple murder, was that McCoy's alleged victim, Mrs. Mors, was proprietress of an antique shop, and that the three he attempted to kill are all proprietors of antique shops.
McCoy is a prize fighter and for many years was prominent in pugilistic circles. His matrimonial career has been stormy, having been married nine times.

PORT ORFORD, Ore., August 14.—(Special)—Advises received from President G. A. Gardner of the Southern Oregon Highway Association are that the County Courts in Coos, Jackson and Josephine counties will all be represented at the meeting of the association here Saturday afternoon, August 16th.
County Judge Eelus Pollock and Commissioners W. F. McCabe and J. S. McFadden of Josephine county have accepted an invitation to be present. President Gardner will represent the County Court of Jackson county. Coos and Curry are likewise expected to have one or more of their members present.

Chambers of Commerce in the cities in the district covered by the association are taking an interest in the Saturday meeting, and have indicated that a number of their members will attend.

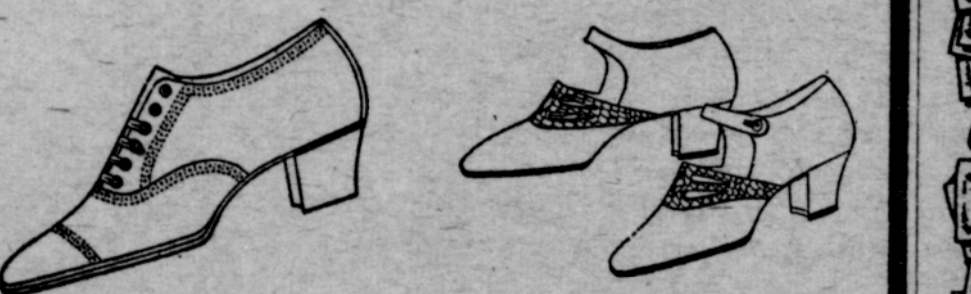
