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Kroner characterizes his appointment as a campaign manager as "a call to perform a public duty."

Portland, Oregon, Aug. 16.—The address of Senator Henrik Shipstead at the city auditorium, Portland, last Friday evening, opening the La Follette and Wheeler campaign in Oregon, and the appointment of Ernest Kroner as campaign manager for the state were outstanding occurrences in politics for the week.

Promise of a red hot campaign is seen in the opening of state headquarters by the republicans nearly a full month before the date first announced. It is generally believed that the unexpected activities of the La Follette-Wheeler forces prompted the republican state committee to get into the fray earlier than had been intended when it was still thought that the fight would be between the republicans and democrats.

The republicans say their fight in Oregon is to beat La Follette. The democrats declare the contest is between Davis and La Follette. This recognition of the La Follette strength has developed in the past three weeks.

For the La Follette and Wheeler forces, State Manager Kroner has started the battle in a statement issued the day after his appointment by the National Committee was announced. Kroner castigates the two old party tickets with equal vigor and predicts victory for the Independent ticket.
