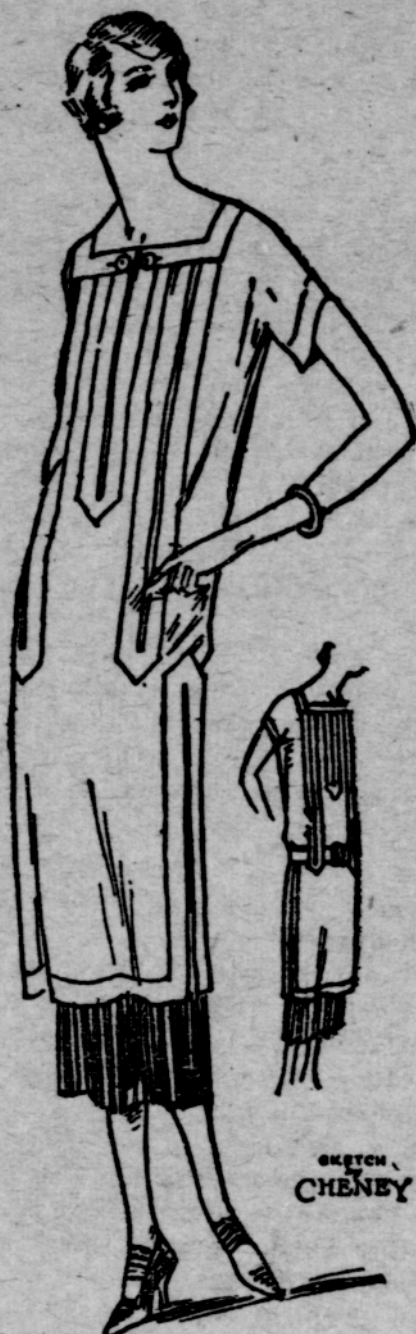

THREE TOWNS IN OREGON POWERLESS

CANYON CITY, Or., August 16—The box factory at Prairie City was totally destroyed by fire early yesterday. The loss was estimated at \$25,000, partially covered by insurance. The original of the fire was not determined. The shortage of water in the John Day river has made it necessary for the Prairie Power & Light company to suspend and for a few hours each night they have been using the steam power plant at the box factory. With the water supply gone and the box factory burned the towns of Canyon City, John Day and Prairie City will be in darkness and without power until rains afford relief.

THIS VERSATILE TUNIC PROVES WILLING TO PLEASE



THE designing little blouse pictured here, artfully helps you to "assume a boyishness, tho you have it not," for it generously subtracts just about ten years from your age, and, incidentally, ten pounds from your weight.

Long tunic blouses are in the front rank of fashion and are as practical as they are chic, for they admit of a great deal of variety in the wardrobe, and several can be used with the same skirt. The original of this blouse, observed in Paris by Henri Creange, Cheney fashion authority, was in grey Frookrepe, with bands of the same material. It was worn over a black satin pleated skirt. The disposition of the bands is ingeniously calculated to enhance the slenderizing effect of the line, and the deep openings at the side of the tunic not only add the desired Chinese note, but give more freedom to the wearer.

That this blouse is also obligingly versatile is proved by the smaller illustration, where a belt is added for the encouragement of those women who find the beltless mode somewhat trying. The belt, of the same material, is passed under the long bands and the tunic allowed to blouse slightly over it.

The buckle of the belt is a clear red, and the cool grey of the blouse is further set off by two buttons of red galsalit at the center of the square neck, and a matching set of red bracelet and ear drops.

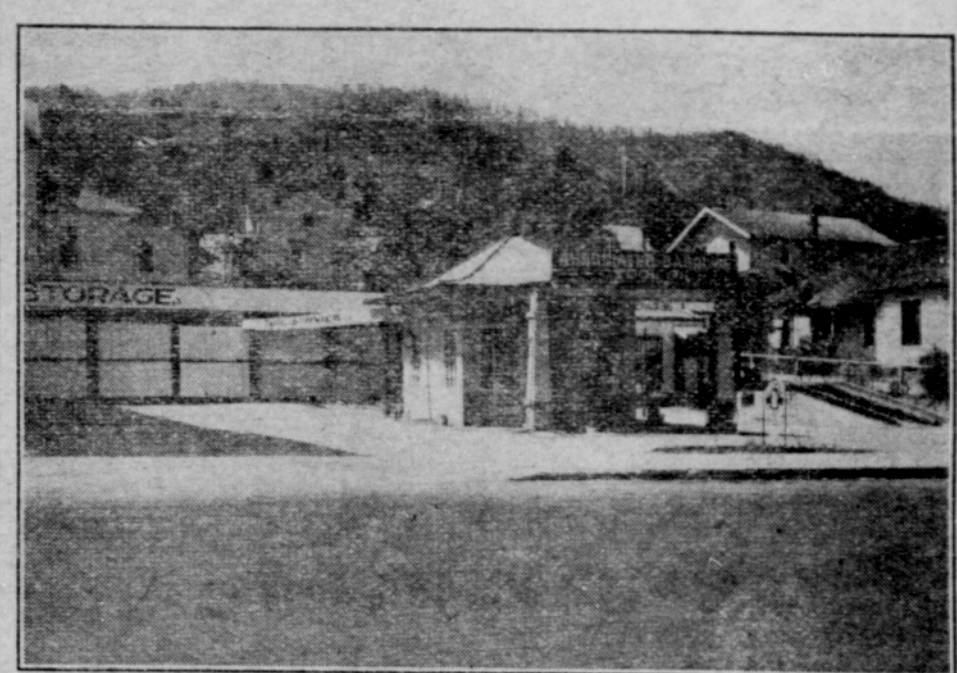

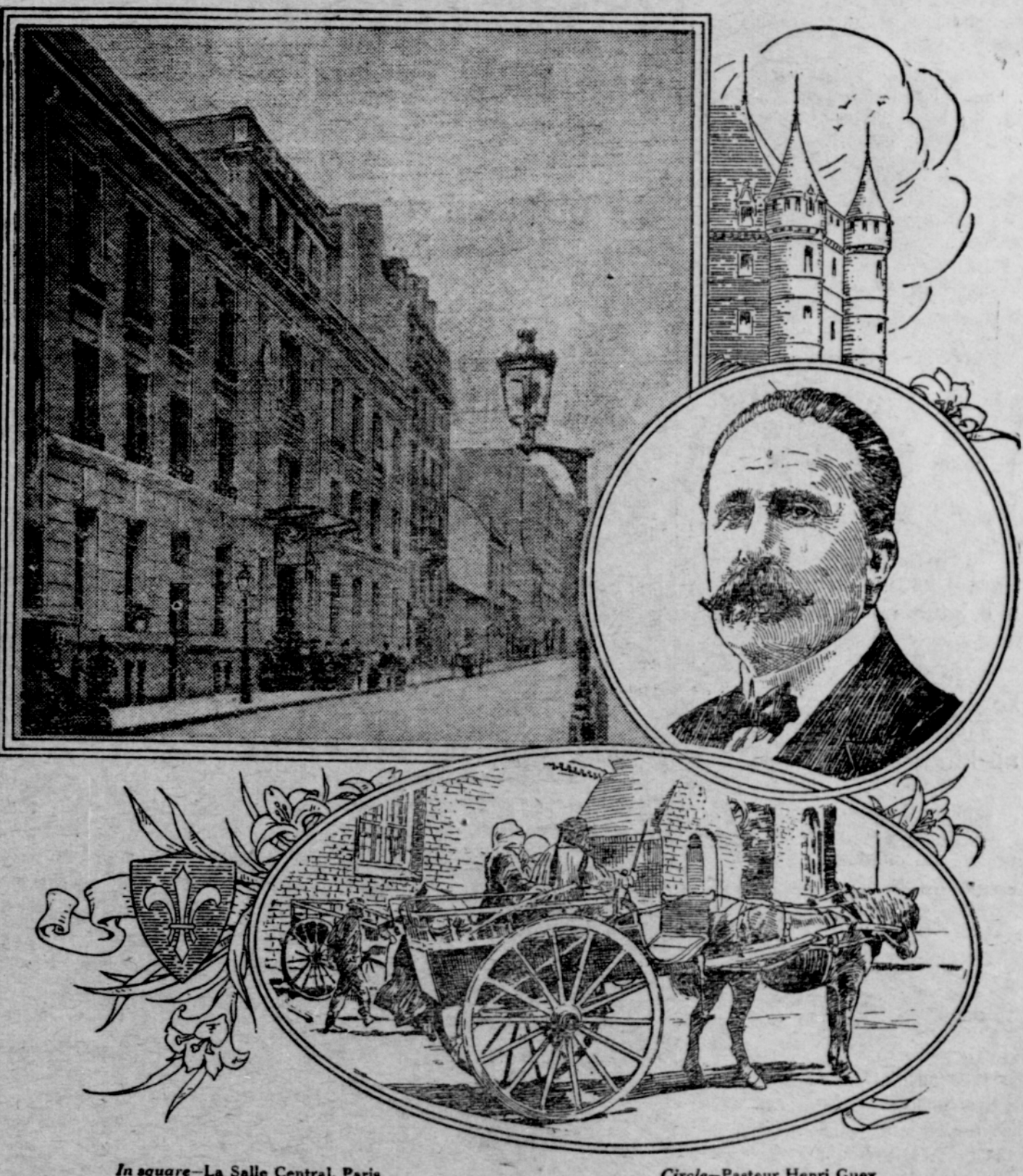

AMERICA AIDS CHURCHES OF FRANCE

Field Secretary of the American McAll Association, recently sailed for France to assist in promoting a program meant to extend and improve an already important system of Christian community centers, popularly known there as "La Mission Populaire." For many years the American McAll Association has linked the evangelical churches of France and America in support of this mission, which was started by Dr. Robert Whitaker McAll while Paris was still in the throes of the Commune. The little hall in which McAll first carried on, preaching a "gospel of reality" to skeptical and war-weary Frenchmen, have been largely replaced by modern buildings, "feyers du peuple" or "Paternites," which are at once places of worship, of recreation, and a varied social service. The work is

interdenominational and all the evangelical churches of France share in the benefits of its influence on individual character and community life. Since 1883 the American McAll Association has cooperated with the French organization, and is now undertaking to make the enlargement of facilities for the fraternities its special care. Especially since 1914 have these establishments proven their value to the French people, and there is urgent need for more of them. Therefore, at its annual meeting at Troy, N. Y., the Association made more and better buildings for this community work year. A sum of \$50,000 has been made available as the nucleus of a fund for the purpose, \$25,000 having been given by a friend of the Association, and a like amount pledged by the members.

A \$100,000 building, La Salle Centrale, in Paris, was a gift by means of which the American McAll Association commemorated the fortieth anniversary of the mission. The American McAll Association, directed by women of international sympathies, is headed by Mrs. Frank B. Kelley, of Elizabeth, N. J., as President; Mrs. James C. Colgate of New York City as Vice-President; Mrs. Abraham R. Perkins, Germantown, Philadelphia, Treasurer; Miss Helen B. Strong, Philadelphia, General Secretary; Mrs. Edward Yates Hill, Philadelphia, Recording Secretary; Miss Ednah Farrier, New York, Secretary for Junior Auxiliaries. The Paris Comité has immediate oversight of the Mission's activities throughout France, with M. Le Pasteur Henri Gues in active charge.
