SISTERS, 88 AND 86 DIE IN ONE WEEK

ANDERSON, Cal., August 18—The deaths of two aged sisters in the east occurring in the same week was the sad news that has just been received here by Chas. M. Palmer, a veteran of the Civil War. Word came that Miss Jane Palmer, aged 88, died in Chicago the first of last week and now comes the information that another sister, Mrs. Harriet Dewey, aged 86, passed away in Massachusetts the last of the week. Both sisters have visited their brother here in years past. Palmer is 84 years of age and enjoys comparatively good health.

ASHLAND RIFLEMEN OFF TO CLACKAMAS

RECORD BROKEN IN FLIGHT TO EUGENE

EUGENE, Aug. 17.—What was thought to be record time between San Diego and Eugene by airplane was made by Sergeant Fred Kelly of the forest air patrol yesterday. Flying time for the trip was 9 hours and 35 minutes. One stop, at San Francisco, was made, where Kelly's plane stayed for one hour and five minutes. He left San Diego at 6 o'clock yesterday morning and arrived in Eugene at 4:40 in the afternoon. Sergeant Kelly flew to San Diego Monday to get a new Liberty motor for his plane.

WASHINGTON, August 18—John J. Keegan, former organizer for the International Association of Machinists and now a member of the United States employes, compensation commission, today made public a letter to Samuel Gompers, declaring that six of the 11 members of the executive council of the American Federation of Labor which recently endorsed the La Follette-Wheeler presidential ticket at Atlantic City, would not vote for these men in the election.

ASHLAND RESIDENT CLAIMED BY DEATH

T. T. Reeder died at 5 o'clock Sunday morning after an illness of a month. He was 71 years old, and had lived in Ashland 19 years. Heart trouble was the cause of his death. Funeral services will be held from the Stock undertaking parlors Tuesday at 11 a. m., under the auspices of the Christian Science church. Interment will take place at the Mountain View cemetery.

EXPLOSION KILLS KELSO YOUNG MAN

KELSO, Wash., August 17—An attempt to solder a gasoline tank on his automobile at a service garage in West Kelso this afternoon caused the death of Sam McGladdery, 23. The explosion shattered McGladdery's body, killing him instantly and seriously injured an eye of A. Collins, proprietor of the garage, who had given McGladdery permission

to do work in his garage. Clifford Cook, who witnessed the accident, was uninjured. Collins had warned McGladdery to use caution before attempting to solder the tank. McGladdery was unmarried. His parents reside in Saskatchewan, Canada, and Hugh McGladdery, a brother lives here. He has worked for the Long-Bell company and was preparing for a trip.

CITY INSTALLING NEW STEEL POLES

Actual construction work on the placing of steel poles on the municipal power line was started recently, and is going forward at a rapid rate. Some time ago, it was found that it was necessary to replace the present wood poles, and steel poles were ordered. They are being put in from the power plant up Ashland creek, and will run to the substation on Second street. The new poles will last much longer than the wooden ones, and in the long run, will prove much more economical.

RAIN GENERAL IN NORTHWEST

Coming as a welcome relief after over two months of drought, it started raining in Ashland early this morning, and a continual drizzle has kept up since. At the local government weather bureau, records were not complete, so that it is not known how much rain has fallen.

PORTLAND, Aug. 18. General rainfall is reported in many sections of the Northwest, breaking a long dry spell. Kelso reported the heaviest rainfall, with .95 of an inch. Portland had a precipitation of .36; Roseburg, .22; Albany, .61; Salem, .42. The only moisture officially reported East of the Cascades was at Yakima, where .12 of an inch was measured. A trace of rain was recorded at Baker, and a slight fall is reported from Northern California points.

CLEVER SWINDLER HELD IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Aug. 18.—Emery Salyards, said to have 20 aliases and believed by police to be one of the most clever swindlers in the country, is held in jail here after being arrested in Roseburg early this morning by a Burns agent, when Salyards took a stroll from the train to the station platform. Salyards is said to have defrauded three Portland banks in 1918 and who has been in five prisons for forgery and burglary, including a term in the Walla Walla penitentiary where he escaped in 1915.

NEVADA MINER IS UNUSUALLY LUCKY

VIRGINIA CITY, Nev. Aug. 18.—Steve Eliades, employed in the United Comstock Mine, had a miraculous escape from a horrible death when an exploding dynamite cap failed to detonate forty sticks of giant powder he was carrying under one arm. Eliades was about to enter the cage to go down the Jacket shaft when one of the dynamite priming caps he had in his hand came in contact with his light. Several men were standing near the shaft.

PEACE DAWNS WITH SIGNING OF PROTOCOL

(Continued From Page 1)

a year, in spite of the strong campaign waged by the Germans to force the earlier removal of the troops from German soil.

Formal Signing August 30
The formal signing of the complete pact arranged by the conference will take place August 30 and under the promises of Premier Herriot and Premier MacDonald some of the important German cities will be relieved from military occupation immediately after that date. These cities are expected to include Ruhrort, Dortmund and Dusseldorf, with a number of other less important towns and cities in and out of the Ruhr.

Under the arrangement signed today the French agree that evacuation shall be effected within a year from August 15, Premier MacDonald agrees that Britain will see that this agreement is carried out, together with the earlier evacuation of important cities as outlined, and the Germans, protesting the illegality of the Ruhr occupation, agree to return to Berlin and hasten the passage of laws to make Dawes' report effective.
