SCHOOLS TO OPEN
SEPTEMBER EIGHT
SAYS STATEMENT

Ashland schools will open Monday, September 8, according to an announcement made today.

Children who will enter the first grade as beginners should, if possible, be at school on the first day. All children who are six years old on or before October 1, 1924, may have a place in the first grade, but must not apply for admission later than September 21, 1924.

This is necessary from the standpoint of the child's welfare and the efficiency of the teacher. After the class is well started the teacher cannot have a group of children wait while she tries to instruct a child in work that has been gone over in the previous days, and no child can get a proper knowledge of the fundamentals of reading without beginning at the beginning. For these reasons all parents will, in the largest way, cooperate with the schools by starting all beginners on the first day and will avoid disappointment later. Do not try to start children if they are not six by October 1, 1924. It is not best for them for you to do so, and the teacher will be under the

necessity of returning under-age pupils to their homes.

The dividing line for all grades, from one to six, inclusive, will be Pioneer Avenue to Main, then Oak street from Main to the city limits. This line will be adhered to except the grades in which crowded conditions exist. Then, in fairness to all, those living nearest the building where there is room will be sent to that building. Nothing else can be done and a cheerful compliance with such unfortunate conditions will help very materially.

PARSON-ATHLETE TO SAIL FOR JAPAN TO GIVE EXHIBITIONS

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, August 22. — Ralph Spearow, holder of the world's intercollegiate record for the pole vault made during the past year at the University of Oregon, will sail for Japan September 10.

Mr. Spearow, who recently returned to his home at Cottage Grove from the Olympic games in Paris, has been invited by the Japanese government to give a series of exhibitions in Japan.

"There will be no competition in Japan," he said, "but will be purely exhibition work.

Speaking of the Olympic Games, Mr. Spearow stated that he was most impressed by Nurmi, the hero.

To be called a "sweet thing" is a compliment rather than a term of cherishment to excite masculine resentment, scientists now tell us. For the sweetest are the bravest, they say, or words to that effect. Anyway, they are quite certain, and have proved by tests, that it is the amount of sugar in our blood that makes the measure of our courage. And here's the reason, as told to the American Chemical Society by Dr. Edwin E. Slosson, of Washington, a noted scientist:

"A variation of a few hundredths of 1 per cent in the glucose of the blood may make the difference between cowardice and courage, may determine whether a man shall be shot as a slacker or medaled as a hero. Courage is not a matter of 'sand', but of sugar. In the excitement of combat the secretion of adrenalin is stimulated and this causes more sugar to be released to the blood and so strengthens a man's valor and endows him with greater strength."

And the synonym for fear? "Insulin." Dr. Slosson declares that diabetic patients taking insulin tell him the first effect of an overdose is "the feeling of a formless fear, a vague apprehension, a sense of futility and failure, a shiver of anxiety." Their courage, he says, can be quickly restored by food containing sugar, such as bottled carbonated beverages.

Speaking of bottled carbonated beverages which have high sugar content in the most easily assimilated form, Doctor Slosson says: "The food value of these beverages comes from their sugar content. The ordinarily half-pint bottle contains usually about 0.4 to 0.9 of an ounce of sugar, about two heaped teaspoonfuls per drink. This gives between 4.3 and 101 calories of energy, generally about 70 to 80 calories per glass."
