Night-terrors must not be confused with ordinary nightmare, which is merely a distressing dream, the evil influences of which disappear almost immediately on awakening. In nightmare the child is usually able to state the cause of its fright, while in nightterrors there is usually no ability to assign a definite cause for the

These attacks may occur once or more a night, or at intervals of a week or thereabouts. In some rare instances, attacks in every way similar to night-terrors may even or during his play.
