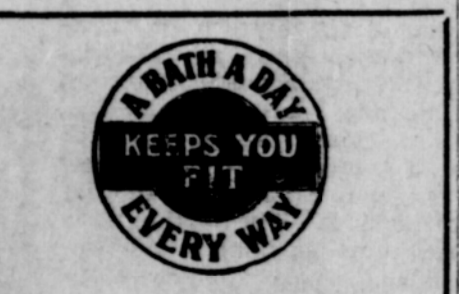

Health Hints

by the Father of Physical Culture

Proper Physical Culture is not merely a matter of exercises for the development of particular muscles of the body or of the muscular system as a whole. Physical Culture includes every known curative and hygienic method of promoting the welfare of the body.

There are many systems of exercises, almost all of which were originated for the sole purpose of increasing strength by developing the muscles. Of course, when muscular development is the sole object sought, motions which call into play the muscles of the body will achieve that object if practiced systematically and regularly. But one certain system of exercises cannot be made applicable to everyone indiscriminately. If the best results are to be expected, the exercises should be adapted to the individual condition. There is a vast difference in the physical strength of different men. One man may have well-developed arm muscles and undeveloped leg muscles, whereas, in another, the development may be just the reverse. Naturally, the first man would have to exercise the muscles of the leg to make them proportionate in dimensions with those of the arms, and the other person would have to exercise the arm muscles in order to make them symmetrical with the leg muscles. The object to be aimed at in the development of the muscular system is symmetry. Spasmodic training should not be attempted.

One cannot through exercise alone recover lost health. With exercise must be included hygienic methods of living. These are Nature's ways of keeping the body in normal condition.

Exercising for muscular development alone is bad practice. It ranks with the habit of overindulgence in eating and drinking. Huge muscles alone do not show "condition," nor are they to be taken and as an indication of vitality. Muscular strength should grow with vitality, and not at its expense. Strength which is built up at the expense of vitality is a source of weakness and danger. Of the first importance in the care and treatment of the body is temperance—temperance in everything. Temperance, especially should be observed when developing the muscular system.

A Chronicle of Events Occurring in World Centers of Population

LISBOND, Aug. 25.—The bullfight in Portugal is supposed to be more humane than the same thing as conducted in Spain. In Portugal they do not kill the bull, nor are the horses "guted". This is the word used in speaking of this feature of the fray and is the only work that is adequate.

The horns of the bull in Portugal are padded. Therefore, in attacking the defenceless, blindfolded horse, which can do nothing but stand in his tracks, the bull merely lifts the steel clear off his feet, or pushes him all over the place and attempts to trample on him. While the attack on an unsuspecting and unseeing horse is the only thing to arouse objection to the Portuguese bullfight, this heartless, unfair and unsportsmanlike charge makes an Anglo-Saxon, at least, grit his teeth in fury. The men on the horses are supposed to spear the bull to avoid having the horse tossed, but in most cases the man is as old and emaciated as the horse, than which there are no older, because only old ones are used for this part of the program, and in too many cases the man with the spear misses the bull entirely. The result is that the horse and the man get a good tossing, which, after all, is perhaps what the public wants.

The horse is slightly protected by a heavy leather saddle, with suspended leather flanks, and the man is encased in leather armor, something like a knight of old. It is almost impossible for him to get hurt, and when toppled to the ground, he cannot arise unaided because of his encumbrances but has to be lifted and stood upright by aides. Mounted on his rickety old steed, with his long spear in his hand, he makes one think of how Don Quixote or Sancho Panza must have looked.

In Spain the horns of the bull are not padded, and he is killed, after he has been played out, by the toreador planting a sword in a vital spot at the top of his spine. And the old horses, because of the unpadded bull's horns, are "guted." Large rips are often torn in them, but they are sewed up again, as a sack of meal would

be, and are sent back into the fray blindfolded. These are always old horses for which there is no more use.

The real sport in a bullfight lies in the agility and dexterity of the toreadors, who are on foot. They are so skillful that from a position directly in front of a charging, mad bull, they simply step a pace to one side or the other and let the bull plunge by. After fifteen minutes of "playing" the animal, they usually have so much the upper hand in wits that they can stand right in front of the bull and place their hands on him without the latter so much as making an attempt to move.

The toreador usually begins these didos by pulling the infuriated bull's tail. And it takes an expert to maneuver into that position where he has the bull completely turned away from him. Then the bullfighter gets closer and closer, through confidence and keener wits, until eventually he teases the bull right at the animal's head. One toreador went so far that, with the bull apparently hypnotized into submission, the man knelt on the ground at the bull's head, placed his hand on one horn and with the other mopped his own brow with a handkerchief. He even looked away from the bull momentarily to bow to the raving audience and, by that act, demonstrated the fact that he had reached the highest point in the bullfighter's knack.

The enthusiasm of the crowd at a bullfight is tense, but orderly. Spectators pitch their hats into the ring with the same regularity, when a toreador has subdued a bull sufficiently to put one of the hats on the animal's head, that the fans do in an American ball park when Babe Ruth hits a homer.

The bullfight continues to be the chief sport in Portugal, just as it is in Spain.

FOREST SERVICE

TRIES NEW PLAN ON FIRE HAZARD

The Forest Service has just written to seventeen of the largest tobacco manufacturers of the United States requesting them to insert warning cards in every package of cigarettes they put out, cautioning the smokers to be careful with fire in the woods. The service has also suggested that a fire warning slogan should appear on all of their billboard advertising. In support of this request the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce has written to one hundred and twenty-five commercial organizations in the State of Oregon requesting them to write letters or telegrams to the same manufacturers urging compliance with the Forest Service request. A similar campaign is being inaugurated in the State of Washington through the Washington State Chamber of Commerce.

Cause Danger The reason for this is that in studying the problem of fire prevention in the Pacific Northwest, the Forest Service has been forcibly impressed with the hazard of forest fires by thoughtless smokers. Figures recently compiled covering the situation on the National Forests of Oregon

and Washington showed that twenty-five percent of the fires had been caused by smokers. Experiment and observation by our field men conclusively point to the fact that so-called "tallor-made" cigarette is more apt to cause fire than any other form of smoking material.

Practical Way The Forest Service believes that the practical way to eliminate this smoker's fire hazard is by education,—by so impressing the smoker with the seriousness of the situation that he will be sure his cigarette is out before he throws it away. The only other solution would be drastic restrictions on all smoking in the woods. The public, and particularly the business interests of this part of the country are becoming more and more aggressive on the subject of man-caused forest fires. The forest represents the basic wealth of this region. After going through a serious fire season just as we have experienced this year the public should, and we believe will, demand the taking of whatever steps may be necessary to eliminate man-caused fires,—particularly such needless fires as those caused by smokers.
