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CHINESE WAR BREAKS OUT NEAR CANTON

Forces of Sun Yat Sen and Volunteers in Battle; Business Suffers

AMERICANS ARE SAFE Morgan Instructed to Attempt to End Civil War in Honduras; Others to Aid

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.—Stockley Morgan, American Charge D'Affairs, in Tegucigalpa, was today instructed by the State department to use his good offices in an effort to bring about an agreement to end the civil war in Honduras.

Other central-American governments have been invited to cooperate in settling the dispute between the warring factions in Honduras.

Fighting in China LONDON, Aug. 30.—Fighting has broken out between the forces of Sun Yat Sen and volunteers in the Canton district in China, according to a Central news despatch received today from Hong Kong. The fighting is reported to have no connection with the threatened clash of rival factions in the Shanghai district.

Business Suffers American business interests are suffering with the tie-up of the Shanghai-Peking railroad. The 3,000 Americans in Shanghai, including more than 100 women and children, are believed to be safe, according to reports received by the State department.

Want Aid SHANGHAI, Aug. 30.—Foreign intervention to stop the impending civil war between rival Chinese factions for control of the Shanghai district, in which is located one of the largest foreign settlements in China, was asked today by the Chinese Chamber of Commerce.

Impressing Women According to reports brought in by the steady stream of refugees pouring into Shanghai, the Kiangsu forces are impressing women as well as men at Soochow as coolies to carry the military munitions and supplies to the front.

Mobilization of all military resources of the two provinces is proceeding as rapidly as possible.

RACERS ARE READY FOR SPEED EVENT

DENVER, Aug. 30.—With the roaring motors of 17 powerful automobiles already in training over the hazardous course, the annual Pike's Peak automobile climb will be staged Monday, September 1.

The hill climb has been called one of the most spectacular events in American automobile racing, the course being over a distance of 12 and one half miles of the world's highest highway. It is a double-track boulevard 20 to 50 feet wide all the way, and is smooth and even as pavement.

NINETEEN INJURED WHEN TRAINS SMASH

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Aug. 30.—Nineteen persons were injured, one probably fatally when the "Detroit," west-bound, crashed into the rear of the Lake Shore Limited train two miles east of Havana, New York, this morning.

The engine of the Detroit-er ploughed 25 feet into the rear end of the Lake Shore train. The wreck was caused when the air line on the Limited broke, causing the brakes to automatically set.
