SHANGHAI, Aug. 30. - Foreign intervention to stop the im pending civil war between rival Chinese factions for control of the Shanghai district, in which is located one of the largest foreign settlements in China, was asked today by the Chinese Chamber of Commerce: Such intervention however, was considered unlikely by foreign observers here.

The opposing lines of the Kiankseu and Chekiang forces are now drawn up in the vicinity of Soochow, only a few miles apart. It is estimated that the Kiangseu army now totals 65,000 and that the Chekiang forces number fully as many.
