WOMAN BURNED TO DEATH IN HOUSE

OREGON CITY, Sept. 6.—Mrs. Laura Wilcirt, 28, was burned to death today in a fire which destroyed the home of E. W. Meeks at Milwaukie. Neighbors who rushed in to save furniture, did not know Mrs. Wilcirt was in the house. Her body was found in the ruins by O. A. Pace, coroner of Clackamas county.

Mrs. Wilcirt, who was a widow, had been staying with the Meeks family. When the house took fire presumably from the explosion of an oil stove, young Frank Meeks hurried to inform his father, who was working in a nearby field. Before Mr. Meeks reached the house it was in flames. Neighbors had removed considerable furniture.

Mr. Meeks was unable to find any trace of Mrs. Wilcirt and it was only after considerable difficulty that the body was located.

COOS BAY TO GET AIRPLANE SERVICE

MARSHFIELD, Sept. 4.—Coos bay is to have a commercial hydroplane and the stock company headed by E. F. Smith, which is promoting the enterprise, sees a good business for it in this section. Prices have been set tentatively as \$50 to Portland, \$150 to San Francisco and \$20 to points like Bandon on the coast.

Smith was two years on the front in the world war and spent four years after the war in commercial flying. The company is being stock for \$1500, but expects to enlarge soon after opening for business.

CRUELTY REPORTED

CHEHALIS, Wash., Sept. 6.—Some brute in human form peppered with buckshot a fine team of horses owned by Michael McDonald and Michael O'Brien, who live near Morton. Both eyes of one animal were blinded and its mate badly injured. The animals were especially prized by their owners, who can conceive of no possible reason for such wanton cruelty.

AFTER PLANE TO WATCH NEW FIRES

One of the government planes stationed at Eugene has been sent for by the forest service, says the Mail Tribune, and is expected here this afternoon. It is so smoky that the look out stations are unable to tell whether there are any new fires or not, so Hugh B. Rankin, the Crater National forest supervisor, will go up in the plane, and make a trip over the entire Crater National forest lands for the purpose of finding, if possible, any fires which have not been discovered.

There is a rather large fire in the Crater National forest, near Crater Peak. The national forest road crew has been sent to put it under control. The fire, which started Wednesday was caused by lightning.

CRANE STARTS HIS SENTENCE IN JAIL

KLAMATH FALLS, Sept. 6.—His business affairs settled, H. E. ("Blondy") Crane appeared at the sheriff's office this morning to start serving a six months' sentence in the county jail. He was taken to the jail immediately and as soon as the iron door had clanked behind him the "Kangaroo Court" went into executive session.

After hearing his case, the exalted prisoner judge of the court assessed Crane's fine at \$5, which "Blondy" cheerfully paid.

Crane was arrested on the night of July 9 on three charges—possession of liquor, maintaining a nuisance and conducting a gambling game. When he pleaded guilty to the possession charges, the gambling and nuisance charges were dismissed. He was fined \$500 and sentenced to 60 days in jail by Justice of the Peace R. A. Emmitt.

SAYS ELECTRIC SHOCK NOT FATAL

BERLIN, Sept. 6.—"Electric shocks do not kill men. Numerous persons 'executed' in the electric chair have not exactly been killed, but only brought into a state of death-like stiffness, with all the symptoms of death. Thus it has been assumed that several hundreds of criminals and others accidentally 'killed' by an electric shock have been buried alive."

This is the declaration of Professor Jellinek, director of the Vienna Electric-Pathological Institute, who asserts he proved it by restoring the life of several persons decreed death by other doctors.

Vienna experts, professors of Vienna University, are at present investigating the sensational theory.

FIRE FIGHTER DIES FROM HIS INJURIES

EUGENE, Sept. 6.—John H. Richey, world war veteran who was injured at 5 o'clock Monday morning while fighting the Salmon creek timber fire above Oakridge, died at a local hospital early today as a result of his injuries. A burned snag struck by a large rock rolling down a mountain side fell upon Richey, breaking a shoulder and arm and fracturing his skull.

Little was known of Richey here and an effort was made by Coroner Branstetter to find his relatives. It was known that he enlisted in the army at Billings, Mont., and in his pocket was found a letter mailed at Morton, Wash. He was about 25 years of age.

Hardly a week was out before dozens of smart young golfers were attired in similar sweaters, and a real industry has been created in the Fair Isles, the demand for the sweaters being enormous.

HERRIOT OPPOSED TO A CONFERENCE

Plan Rapped By French Leader At League Of Nations; Scores Macdonald

GENEVA, Switzerland, Sept. 6.—Premier Herriot, socialist head of the French government, is directly opposed to the suggestion of Premier Macdonald, of England, for a world disarmament conference.

Addressing the League of Nations today, Herriot declared that the proper place for a disarmament conference is within the League. He declined to work for another conference, such as the one recently held in Washington. The speech is believed to sound the death knell for such a conference.

Before an applauding assembly, Macdonald voiced a demand for a world conference on land disarmament and called upon the League to prepare the ground for such a convocation, that it might not fail.

"America has taken the first step toward reduction of naval arms," declared the Premier. "The subject of land armaments is more complicated. If such a conference were summoned now, it would fail."

"The role of the League is to prepare the ground. All nations present here must aid in the preparation. Two points are essential. All countries must be represented. The conference must be held in Europe, where the heads of governments here can participate."

NEGRO WED TO WHITE WOMAN

VANCOUVER, Wash., Sept. 6.—The difficulty experienced by couples of mixed races in finding a minister or official to marry them in Clarke county was obviated today by Charles R. Banister, negro, 31, and Mrs. Margaret E. Rogers, a white woman, 32, who brought with them Rev. E. J. Magruder of Portland, who married them at the court house. Banister said he was a bus boy and Mrs. Rogers gave her occupation as waitress. Both gave their address as 509 Tillamook street, Portland.

SUNDAY SCHOOL WILL HOLD CONFERENCE HERE

There will be an all day Sunday School Conference at the Presbyterian Church Friday, September 12. This will be composed of Sunday School workers from Jackson, Josephine and Klamath counties and is the only one to be held in southern Oregon. The principal speaker of the evening will be A. M. Locker, field secretary for the International Council of Religious education and successor of the late Marion Lawrence. Mr. Locker will speak on "A New Day in Religious Education." Dr. Walter L. VanNuys will address the meeting with the topic "Week Day Church School" and Dr. Fred Grey will talk on the "Value of Interdenominational Organization." Mr. W. S. Burt of Benton County and Rev. Chas. C. Hulet of Klamath County will also speak. Mrs. Jean M. Johnson, state secretary will attend the meeting.

YOUNG BOY SHOT BY HIS PLAYMATE

SALEM, Sept. 6.—Edward Snyder, 15, son of Simon N. Snyder, was in a hospital here tonight suffering from the effects of a bullet wound inflicted by Andrew Jairo. Jairo also is about 16 years of age. Snyder was said to be in a serious condition.
