KLAMATH FALLS

BACK TO SCHOOL

One of the most significant events of the year occurred today when the school children of the city marched back to their class rooms. Children of all classes, religions and races trooped into the schools, side by side, without any distinction, all imbued with the inherent sense of trust democracy. All barriers that might have separated the children during their vacation were forgotten as they return to the public schools. Freedom from class consciousness, snobbishness and all other traits which are foreign to American democracy are cast aside in this great training school of democracy.

OBSOLETE POLITICAL METHODS

Samuel G. Blythe, writing in The Saturday Evening Post under the caption of "The Political One Horse Shay," gives a graphic outline of the obsolete methods the political parties employ in naming their presidential candidates, although he does not suggest any new plan which would eliminate the objectionable features of the present system. He says in part:

"The point about our political system is not that the results cannot be obtained, but that the obtaining of them is in no way in keeping with our progress in other directions.

"The truth is that so far as our political expressions and machineries are concerned we hold to obsolete methods, operating under archaic conditions, tied to antiquated organizations and rigid in the systems that outlived their usefulness and adaptability forty years ago.

"The politics of the United States is a creaking, cumbersome, ancient, illogical, nonprogressive and unpliant survival, so far as its great-party demonstrations are concerned, of a system that was evolved in the days of stage-coaches and tallow dips, and no more in step with the needs of the present times than an oxcart is a substitute for a flying machine.

The outstanding fact is that our national-convention system has broken down and that some new system must be devised if we are to continue to have coherent politics in this country.

"Even the seemingly orderly procedures of Senator La Follette, in his project of running as an independent, are open to none but men with national reputation like La Follette, and it will be discovered that the processes of placing La Follette's name on the ballots in this country, as an independent candidate, will cost a very large amount of money.

"What we have now is the ratification convention, like the one at Cleveland, which is no convention at all, and is simply a rubber stamp, or the rigidly ruled and absolutely unprecedented convention, like the one at New York, which is not a convention, either, and is a rabble.

"Neither is a deliberative assembly. Neither is representative of anything but machine politics of one sort or another. Neither has any popular feature."

There is good advice in the suggestion of a writer that you should not lose eagerness—should not lose your appetite for peaches in December by having them too often. It is better to always have an ideal of attainment before you.

It is reported that the political parties are finding difficulty in putting the usual pep into the campaigns this year—partly because they haven't the usual limited flow of cash and the disclosures of campaign contributions of the last sessions make them hesitate about tapping the financial fountains.

SHALE PROJECT AT ELKO NOW RUNNING

That the Catlin shale oil project at Elko, Nevada, is a commercial success was the report made to The Tidings by Frank Ross, who recently returned to Ashland after a visit in Nevada and California.

"When I visited the Catlin project I was surprised," declared Mr. Ross. "It certainly proved to me that extracting oil from shale and refining it is commercially possible."

The following, from the Nevada Mining Press was given the Tidings for republication by Mr. Ross:

ELKO—Experiments conducted over a period of nine years, involving repeated new mechanical installations, the scrapping of nearly new equipment to make way for improved devices and the attendant heavy expense of construction and purchase of machinery, have resulted in perfecting processes to recover high-grade products from deposits of oil-bearing shales near here. The Catlin Shale Products Co., headed by R. M. Catlin and under the management of W. L. Sheeler, starting with a small experimental plant nine years ago, is now operating the only plant in the United States that is producing oil and other products from shale on a commercial scale.

The company is now putting on the market gasoline, engine distillate, fuel oil, paraffine waxes and a high-grade lubricating oil of five different grades. Shale bodies of great volume and of uniform oil content have been developed by more than seven miles of underground workings, extending from a 750-ft. incline shaft. The mine is equipped with electric hoists and electric drills are used underground.

In addition to two 100-ton retort units, the company has installed a complete refining plant in which the crude oil, distilled from the crushed shale, is treated by various processes to separate the wax and make the several refined products now being supplied to the market. The retorts produce approximately 3000 gallons daily of crude oil having a paraffine base.

Exact tests of the company's products show them to rate among the best produced from any source, the lubricating oils having been used extensively by airplanes and racing automobiles, while the wax produced by the plant is in demand for uses where the highest grade product is required and carload consignments have been shipped to Europe and Japan. It is the intention of Manager Sheeler to place his company's gasoline and lubricating

oils on the market throughout Nevada in the near future, at prices that will compete with those of California products.
