Finger Nail 3 Feet 6 Inches Long
WORLD'S LONGEST FINGER NAIL
SHANGHAI, Sept. 5.— The longest finger nail in the world has just been discovered by an American missionary at Chowkiow, in Hunan province.
An old Chinese gentleman of leisure in that inland city, now ravaged by floods, has petted to maturity a finger nail that is now 3 feet 6 inches long—and still growing.
Along about the time that it became the general custom in China for girl babies to have their feet bound until they were merely little living stumps on which they ambled along as though they were walking on eggs, as evidence to the world that they were truly "treasures of the inner chamber" and never, never turned a hand in manual labor, the gentlemen of leisure in China emulated their example by growing finger nails to such a length that work with their hands was simply impossible.
Down through the endless ages finger nails cultivation in the Middle Flowery Kingdom became one of the fine arts of the Chinese until the foreigner with his mechanical devices, his progressive Western ways and his desire to get out and "do nothing," gradually caused it to become more or less a passe.
In most places, and especially in the cities where foreigners now congregate along the China Coast, long finger nails have gone out of style, but in Hunan province they still grow them long.

BABY DIES AFTER TWO STORY FALL
PORTLAND, September 8.— A fractured skull proved fatal to little Moriko, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. K. Yamamoto, who was injured Saturday when her mother leaped from the second story of the Merchants hotel. The baby died yesterday morning at St. Vincent's hospital. The mother, though she suffered several broken bones, will recover. The body of the baby was taken to the morgue.
