the greatest reform legislation for the disabled since the creation of the Veterans' Bureau. "The other outstanding achievement was the enactment into law of the adjusted compensation bill. Not so important from our viewpoint as the Reed-Johnson Bill, or as vital as other victories we have obtained, the adjusted compensation bill nevertheless, took on added importance in the public eye because of the enemies it made. Instead of crushing our organization, our enemies proved our inherent strength. Instead of destroying us, they made us cohesive."
