NEWS LETTER DUBLIN, Sept. 17—For some years strikes have been ruining Ireland's industries. Scarcely one new enterprise has been started in any part of the country. Capital has been tied up by the fear that no sooner would a factory be declared. Dockyards and factories have been closed, and industrial distemper set in. About a year ago a more reasonable attitude was taken by the trade union officials and strikes became more uncommon. Then came James Larkin on the scene after his release from Sing Sing Prison in America. He immediately started a new trade union and has to his credit about fifty strikes in the last twelve months. His propaganda was openly "Red." He claimed to be the member for Moscow in the Soviet. He fought with the regular trade union officials and ended up in several libel actions, in all of which he was beaten. He has now left Ireland and is understood to be in Russia, but his lieutenants carry on his work here. Recently they tried to shut down the principal railroad in the South of Ireland and tried to intimidate the other workers, but the regular trades union men met them with a flat contradiction, and though violence was attempted by the Larkinites on a few occasions, they were worsted and two or three of them found themselves in the Liffey. Ireland is probably seeing the last of Larkin's rule. We have a good job printing department.

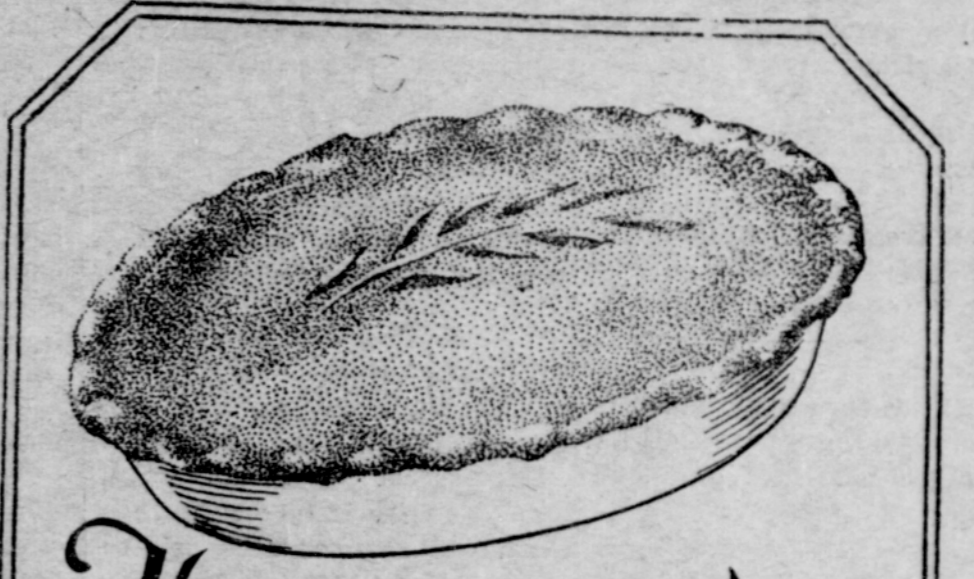

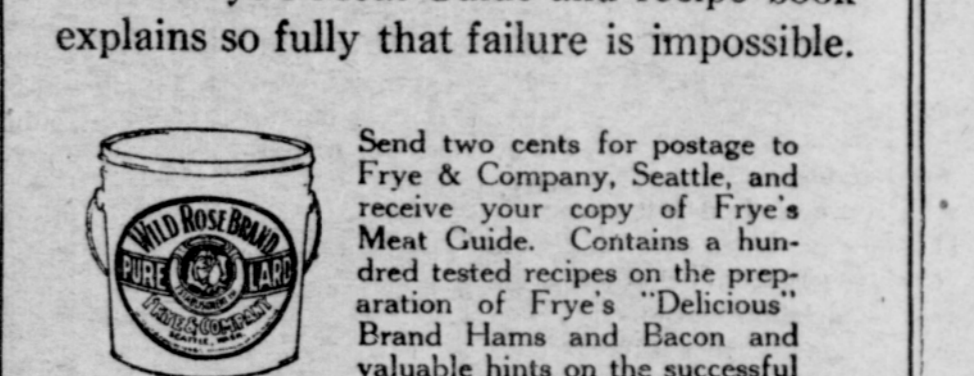
