Brown, chief deputy game warden, and Warden Cornell and Herring, according to report made today at the headquarters of the state game commission.

PORTLAND, Sept. 20.—Recommendation that the minimum salary of ministers be placed at \$1400 and that all churches adopt the budget system of operation, was made today at the opening of the United Brethren conference, Oregon district, in the Tremont United Brethren church, 71st street and 59th avenue.

\$576,000 ASKED FOR SCHOOL FOR THE FEEBLE MINDED

SALEM, Sept. 20.—Operating expenses and plant outlay for the state school for feeble minded for the biennium of 1925-26 will cost \$576,100, according to the budget submitted to the state budget commission by Dr. J. W. Smith, superintendent. The expenses for the last two years was \$432,874.

An increase of about 75 patients is anticipated and several improvements are asked. The population of the institution at present is approximately 800. A probation officer to cooperate with this institution and the state industrial school for girls, the expenses to be equally divided, is asked by Dr. Smith.
